# **North Carolina Innocence Inquiry Commission Brief**

# State v. Robert Charles Bragg Watauga County – 94 CRS 4929

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## I. Format for Brief and Hearing

On August 31, September 1, and September 2, 2016, the North Carolina Innocence Inquiry Commission ("Commission") will conduct a hearing in this case. Pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 15A-1468(a) this hearing is open to the public. A court reporter will be present at the hearing and if the Commission decides to refer the case to a three-judge panel, all documents considered by the Commission and the transcript of the proceedings shall become public record once filed with the Clerk of Superior Court in Watauga County.<sup>1</sup>

This brief is submitted to the Commissioners prior to the hearing with the request that each Commissioner carefully review it in preparation for the hearing. The brief covers information about the case available prior to the investigation by the Commission staff. The hearing will focus on evidence uncovered during the Commission's investigation. The Commission has subpoenaed witnesses for this hearing.

This brief is formatted to be read from start to finish with the attachments inserted directly into the body of the brief.

The Commission will be asked to consider the following options:

- Conclude that there is sufficient evidence of factual innocence to merit judicial review and refer the case to a three-judge panel pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 15A-1468(c).
- 2. Conclude that there is not sufficient evidence of factual innocence to merit judicial review and close the investigation pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 15A-1468(c). Evidence

favorable to the convicted person shall be disclosed to him and his attorney pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 15A-1468(d).

 Direct the staff to conduct further investigation into this case and continue the hearing to a later date.

#### **III. Introduction to Case**

At approximately 6:30 PM on Thursday, December 8, 1994, the body of Marvin "Coy" Hartley, W/M, age 76, was found in his mobile home in Boone, NC by his neighbor, Larry Joe Grimes. The Victim was lying face down in the living room of his mobile home. A pool of blood was at his head and blood spattering was observed on the curtains above and to the right of the Victim. One spot of blood was observed on the ceiling. The cause of death was determined to be blunt traumatic injury to the head from multiple blows.

Although it is unclear why, law enforcement initially focused on two suspects: Robert Bragg and Kenneth Coffey. After focusing on these two individuals in the hours immediately after the crime, law enforcement located and interviewed Coffey on the morning of Friday, December 9, 1994. Coffey implicated himself, Bragg, and Joe Cothren in the crime. On Saturday, December 10, 1994, Bragg was arrested in Mountain City, TN. Upon his arrest, Bragg provided a statement to law enforcement denying his presence in Boone at the time of the crime and providing details of his whereabouts from the time he left Boone on Wednesday, December 7, 1994 up until the time of his arrest. Cothren was later cleared of the crime after law enforcement spoke to him and he stated that he had not been in the area at the time of the crime. Coffey gave multiple statements to law enforcement, eventually removing Cothren as having been present, and implicating Rhonda Carson. Coffey's statements to law enforcement

and his testimony at Bragg's trial have many inconsistencies; however, he consistently states that both he and Bragg were present during the crime.<sup>2</sup>

Coffey and Bragg were tried separately. Coffey testified at Bragg's trial after being given use immunity. Other evidence against Bragg included Rene and Jeffrey Nelson, a mother and her young son, who testified to seeing Bragg and Coffey together, walking behind the Victim on the afternoon of the crime.

Bragg has maintained that he was in Mountain City, TN from the late afternoon/early evening of Wednesday, December 7, 1994 until his arrest on Saturday, December 10, 1994.

Multiple alibi witnesses testified that Bragg was in Mountain City, TN on the day of the crime.

After a trial, a jury convicted Coffey of First Degree Murder under the first degree felony murder rule. Coffey was given a sentence of Life Without Parole. After a trial, a jury convicted Bragg of First Degree Murder under the first degree felony murder rule. Bragg was given a sentence of Life Without Parole.

The Commission has conducted additional DNA testing in this case and interviewed multiple individuals including Coffey and the Nelsons. The results of the DNA testing, along with the Commission's investigation, will be presented in the upcoming hearing.

# **IV. Law Enforcement Investigation**

### **Timeline**

This timeline is intended to provide a detailed outline of the law enforcement investigation.<sup>3</sup>

12/06/1994 9:45 AM-UNK	According to Henryk Ossowski's 12/15/1994 interview, Ossowski stated that Bragg and Coffey came to his trailer around 9:45 AM. They had a bottle of wine and he allowed them to drink it there. Bragg left about 12:30 PM. Coffey left shortly after 1:00 PM. Around 4:00 PM, Ossowski saw Bragg at the Harris Teeter. Bragg was buying beer. Around 6:00 PM, Jolene called him five times and he heard Coffey in the background talking. 12/06/1994 was the last day that he saw Bragg.
12/06/1994 2:10 PM	According to Rhonda Carson's 12/15/1994 interview, Carson says that the last time she saw Bragg was on 12/06/1994 day when the police picked him up after her son, T.J., called the police. Carson recalled that Bragg was wearing a tan trench coat and Coffey was wearing a blue vest.  According to Rhonda Carson's 01/09/1995 interview, Carson stated that the last time that she saw Bragg was on 12/06/1994 when the police were talking to them together.
12/06/1994 2:12 PM	Boone Police Department officers arrive at The Pantry/Peddler after receiving a 911 call from Carson regarding Kenneth Coffey and Robert Bragg. Coffey and Bragg are arrested for public intoxication.
12/06/1994 2:45 PM	According to Watauga County Sheriff Department records, Bragg and Coffey are received into custody.
12/06/1994 7:00-8:00 PM	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg went to Marvin "Coy" Hartley's (Victim) trailer. Bragg asked the Victim if he could spend the night and the Victim agreed. Bragg went to the store for the Victim and purchased a six pack of Bud and a loaf of bread. He also went to Joe's (LNU). He returned to the Victim's trailer and they ate supper.
	Interview included in brief.

12/06/1994 10:00 PM- Midnight	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg and the Victim went to sleep at the Victim's trailer.  Interview included in brief.
12/07/1994 3:00 AM	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Coffey arrives at the Victim's trailer. Bragg and Coffey stay up the rest of the night.  Interview included in brief.
12/07/1994 6:00-6:30 AM to 10:00-11:00AM	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg and Coffey leave the Victim's trailer and walk to the A & P. When it opens at 7:00 AM, they buy two bottles of wine. Coffey and Bragg stand outside drinking the wine until 10:00-11:00 AM.
	Both then walk to Henry's residence (later determined to be Henryk Ossowski) in the Greenway Trailer Park. Coffey stays at Ossowski's house but Bragg leaves and takes the AppalCART (city bus) to the Harris Teeter.
12/07/1994 Morning- Afternoon	According to Carmen Turbeville's 12/09/1994 interview, Turbeville stated that she saw Bragg Wednesday morning or afternoon around the Holiday Inn, hitch-hiking north on Highway 321. Rhonda Carson and Kenneth Coffey were around this area.
12/07/1994 After 2:00 PM	According to Henryk Ossowski's 12/15/1994 interview, Ossowski stated that he was at the Fair Value, walking north to catch the bus. He saw Coffey, Bragg, and Rhonda walking toward Greenway Trailer Park. Coffey was wearing a navy jacket. Bragg was wearing a long tan-looking coat. One of them was carrying a grocery bag.
12/07/1994 3:00-4:00 PM (or earlier)	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg sees Gary Edwards and Darlene (Laney) at the Harris Teeter. Edwards gives Bragg a ride to Mountain City, TN.  Interview included in brief.
12/07/1994 4:00-5:00 PM	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Edwards and Bragg arrive in Mountain City, TN at Jay Manuel's house.  Interview included in brief.
12/07/1994 After 5:00 PM	According to Bonnie Jean Crawley's 02/06/1996 interview, she contacts the District Attorney's Office on this date because she learns that Gary Edwards has been subpoenaed as a witness in the pending Bragg trial. Crawley has heard that Gary Edwards plans to testify that he (Edwards) had taken Bragg to Mountain City, TN before the Victim was killed. Crawley stated she doesn't know when Edwards was to have taken Bragg to TN but she remembered that the day before the Victim was killed, she saw Bragg in Boone. It was Wednesday, close to 5:00 PM when she left

	walking from her residence to the Fair Value Grocery on a path which is behind the trailer park. On her return, she walked up the 321 way and cut behind the Scottish Inn and Pepper's Restaurant. It was getting dark and about this time, Bragg stepped out from behind a metal shed and startled her. Bragg was very drunk and Coffey was sitting on the ground with a liquor bottle next to him. Coffey had his back against Pepper's Restaurant. Crawley knew Bragg and Coffey from her previous work at the Hospitality House in 1990/1991. Bragg gave Crawley a hug and she stepped back. Bragg asked Crawley about getting a haircut and she told him to come by sometime Friday evening. Crawley said she knew Bragg did not know where she lived. Crawley later heard that Bragg was arrested in Mountain City, TN.
12/07/1994 7:00-7:55 PM	According to Jay Manuel's 12/10/1994 interview, Manuel is arrested in Mountain City, TN for public drunkenness. Manuel originally says Bragg arrives at his house on Tuesday, December 6 <sup>th</sup> . After police tell Manuel that Bragg was arrested in Boone, NC on that date and they are conducting a murder investigation, Manuel says that Bragg was there yesterday and today, and that Bragg and Judy Thomas spent Friday night in Manuel's back bedroom.
12/07/1994 9:00-10:00 PM	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg and Manuel walk to the Town and Country Bar & Store in Mountain City, TN. Bragg and Manuel get separated and Manuel is arrested. Bragg says that he waits for Manuel to get out of jail and possibly then they went back to Manuel's residence. John and Jackie Shoemake arrived at Manuel's residence with a key. John Shoemake had a key even though he did not live there.
12/07/1994 9:30 PM - Midnight	Interview included in brief. Arrest records for Manuel included in brief.  According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg gets a ride with three guys to his brother, Jim Bragg's house in Mountain City, TN. Jim Bragg was watching a Clint Eastwood movie when he arrived. Paul (LNU) came to Jim Bragg's and they sat and talked in the basement. Bragg went to bed around 11:00 PM-Midnight.  Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 9:45 AM-UNK	In his 12/10/1994 interview, Henryk Ossowski stated that Bragg and Coffey came to his house in Boone, NC around 9:45 AM. Bragg left around 12:30 PM. Coffey left around 1:00 PM. Later that day he saw Bragg and Coffey walking toward the Victim's trailer. Bragg had been staying at the Victim's trailer.  According to Henryk Ossowski's 12/15/1994 interview, Ossowski stated that these events occurred on 12/06/1994 not 12/08/1994.

	On 12/28/1994, Ossowski was re-interviewed concerning his statements and stated that he is sure Coffey and Bragg were at his house on Tuesday 12/06/1994.
12/08/1994 5:30-6:00 AM	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Jim Bragg drops Bragg off at the 24 hour store and Bragg walks to Jay Manuel's house. The door was unlocked and Bragg went inside.
	Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 Remainder of the day	According to Robert Bragg's 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg provides details in his interview regarding these events and who he was with.  Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 7:45 AM	According to a copy of Rhonda Carson's timecard from the Quality Inn that Detective Harrison obtained on 01/13/1995, Carson goes to work.
12/08/1994 8:00-10:00 AM	According to Coffey's 12/09/1994 interview, he went to the Amoco and bought a 12 pack of beer. Coffey took the beer to the Victim's trailer and drank it with the Victim. He then went to Richard Rominger's and Jolene's. Coffey got a ride with Jim Earp to the pawn shop downtown. He sold a ring to Earp and pawned a ring. He then went to Attorney Diane Griffin's office. While walking back to the Victim's trailer, Coffey was stopped by two deputies who served a subpoena on him to be in court.
	Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 9:05-9:10 AM	According to Jim Earp's 12/11/1994 interview, he went to the A & P and Coffey was out front wanting a ride. Coffey first wanted a ride to the Wildcat Flea market and Earp told Coffey he was already late for work. Earp takes Coffey uptown and Coffey tries to sell Earp a ring for \$20. Earp buys the ring for \$10.
12/08/1994 9:30 AM	According to Marie Potter's 03/20/1995 interview, she sees Coffey walking across the field and head up the street, cutting across the neighbor's yard. (Potter lived on the next street over from the Victim, which is Summer Drive).
12/08/1994 9:30 AM	According to Nancy Horton's 12/16/1994 interview, she sees the Victim in the trailer park walking down the street.
12/08/1994 Around 10:00 AM	According to Betty Grimes' 12/09/1994 interview, she sees the Victim at the bridge by K-Mart.  According to Judy Wolber's 12/08/1995 interview, she sees the Victim at
	the bridge at the back of K-Mart.
12/08/1994 10:30-11:00 AM	According to Coffey's 12/09/1994 interview, Coffey is back at the Victim's house after stopping to buy a 12 pack of beer from the Amoco. Coffey drank 4-5 beers while the Victim drank the rest.

	Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994	According to Lisa Hanes' 12/21/1994 interview, she sees the Victim
Before 12:00 PM	walking in the trailer park in the morning before noon.
12/08/1994	According to Nancy Horton's 12/16/1994 interview, she sees Coffey by K-
Around 12:00 PM	Mart in Boone, NC.
12/08/1994	According to Cherie Gray's 12/09/1994 interview, she sees the Victim
12:00 PM	walking up Winter Drive toward his trailer.
12/08/1994	According to Gloria Parlier's 12/30/1994 interview, she sees the Victim
12:45 PM	walking down the road (location not stated in report).
12/08/1994	According to handwritten notes of a 12/09/1994 interview of ABC Store
1:00 PM	employee Steve Combs, the Victim came in at approximately 1:00 PM.
12/08/1994 1:49 PM	According a copy of Rhonda Carson's timecard from the Quality Inn that Det. Harrison obtained on 01/13/1995, Carson gets off work.
12/08/1994	According to Tony Triplett's 12/10/1994 interview, he sees the Victim
Around 2:00 PM	walking South on 321 towards the ABC store.
12/08/1994 Before 3:00 PM	According to Coffey's 01/09/1995 interview, Coffey met with his attorney Diane Griffin regarding his disability claim that morning. At 9:00 AM he caught a ride with Jim Earp from the A & P to the pawn shop where he pawned a ring. He sold also sold a ring to Earp. He walked back from town and was stopped by two deputies and served with subpoenas for court. He went to Murphy's Restaurant where he had left his coat and a bottle of medicine. He got his jacket and went to Bojangles for a drink. Coffey then went to the Victim's trailer, took a nap, and woke up at 3:00 PM
	Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 3:00 PM	According to Coffey's 03/21/1995 interview, the Victim gave him \$3.35 and Coffey went to the ABC store to purchase the Victim a bottle of Popov vodka. Coffey saw Bragg on his way back and Bragg told him he (Bragg) was going to rob the Victim. Coffey first protests and then agrees. Bragg hit the Victim twice in the head with a trailer ball hitch. Bragg gave Coffey \$265. Coffey went to the A & P and called Shirley Faircloth. Coffey later adds to the interview that Rhonda Carson walked into the trailer when Bragg hit the Victim.
	Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994	According to Rene Nelson's 12/09/1994 interview, sometime after 3:00
After 3:00 PM-	PM but before she left to go to the daycare about 5:15 PM, and before
Before 5:15 PM	dark, she saw Coffey come out of the Victim's yard. Coffey was walking
	fast toward Greenway Drive and "looking wild." Coffey knows not to say
	anything to her. She does not like him and thinks he is "trash." Coffey

	was possibly wearing a dark color flannel shirt or jacket. Nelson does not recall any of his other clothing.  Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 After 3:15 PM	According to Jeffrey Nelson's 12/15/1994 interview, Jeffrey rides the bus home and gets home between 3:12-3:15 PM every day. On this day, Jeffrey can't recall what reading he had to do, but it did not take him very long and he did not have to change clothes before he could go outside and play. Some of his friends (named in interview) and Jeffrey played soccer in Jeffrey's yard and he saw the Victim walk by with his cane, which looked like a walking stick. When the Victim was halfway to his trailer, Jeffrey saw two men, Coffey and Bragg. Bragg had something hanging out of his pants in the front that kind of looked like a stick. Jeffrey saw them go up the Victim's steps and inside. Jeffrey then went back down the road and did not see them leave the Victim's home.
12/08/1994 3:30 PM	Interview included in brief.  According to Coffey's 12/09/1994 interview, the Victim gave him \$3.35 and Coffey walked to the ABC storeto purchase the Victim a bottle of Popov vodka. At the intersection of Greenway and Winter Drive (the end of the Victim's road), Coffey met Bragg and Joe. They followed him and entered the Victim's trailer behind him. Bragg hit the Victim with the
	trailer hitch ball in a sock. Bragg picked up a black wallet that fell off the Victim. Coffey saw only one hit and then fled to the A & P and called Shirley Faircloth. Within 10-15 minutes, Joe and Bragg arrived at the A & P and Bragg gave Coffey \$260. Bragg threatened Coffey about saying anything, and then Bragg and Joe walked off. Faircloth arrived and they (Faircloth and Coffey) went to Woodlands (an upscale restaurant) and Ichabod's (a bar/pool hall) in Blowing Rock to eat and drink. They then stayed the night at Faircloth's.
	Interview included in brief.
12/08/1994 3:30 PM	According to Linda Wilcox's 12/16/1994 interview, Wilcox saw Coffey going up the street with a can of beer, wearing some type of white shirt and blue jeans. Wilcox could not say for sure that Coffey went to the Victim's trailer, but he went up that way.
	Wilcox stated she saw the Victim pass by that day when she went to have coffee with Jettie Sheulls (no time provided).
	Wilcox stated she has known Coffey for a couple of years and he had lived in the trailer park but there was a lot of fighting and drinking. Wilcox stated she would still see Coffey in the trailer park 2-3 times a week.

	Wilcox saw Bragg's photo in the Watuaga Democrat newspaper on Wednesday after he was arrested for murder. Wilcox said she had seen Bragg once before, right before Thanksgiving, around the Pic 'N Pay and later when he came around the Victim's trailer.
	Wilcox said her grandson, Jeffrey Nelson told her that he heard the Victim and Coffey arguing one time. Wilcox is Rene Nelson's mother.
12/08/1994 After 3:30 PM- Before 5:00 PM	According to Rhonda Carson's 12/15/1994 interview, Carson walks to the A & P and while she was standing at the A & P, Coffey came walking around the A & P from the field side and walked up to her. They spoke and he hugged her. Coffey then walked toward Fair Value Grocery. About 15-20 minutes later, Coffey came walking back and went to the pay phone. At this time, Carson was sitting in a girl's car (later identified as Christy Osborne's car). After Coffey used the pay phone he went back up toward the end of the A & P toward the field. After Coffey left, Carson waited at the A & P until about 5:00 PM when her landlady picked her up.
	In her 1/9/1995 statement, Carson added that she bought beer for Christy Osborne on that day. Osborne was 17 or 18 years old at the time. She further added that she was at the A & P for around 45 minutes before she saw Coffey the first time. On this date, Carson says that her new landlady picked her up at around 4:45 PM. Carson stated that she hadn't seen Bragg at all on this day.
12/08/1994 3:30-4:00 PM	According to Shirley Faircloth's 12/09/1994 interview, Coffey calls her and asks her to come pick him up. She asks Coffey where he is, and he replies The Pantry. Coffey tells Faircloth he is on his way to the Victim's to bring the Victim his liquor. Faircloth tells Coffey to call her back in 20 minutes (Coffey does not).
12/08/1994 3:30-4:30 PM (Closer to 4:00)	According to Christy Osborne's 07/11/1995 interview, she sees Rhonda Carson in the A & P parking lot. Osborne is with Kanessa Hamby. Osborne and Carson knew each other. Osborne has also met Coffey before. Osborne gives Carson a twenty dollar bill to buy them beer at the A & P. Carson returns to the car with the beer and the three of them sit in Osborne's car drinking. Carson points out Coffey at the far end of the building and states "That's my ex-boyfriend, Kenneth, I don't like him anymore." Osborne recalls Coffey wearing dark jeans and a dark colored light coat or jacket.
	According to Kanessa Hamby's 07/13/1995 interview, the time is after 3:00 PM. While in the car drinking, Carson says that a man walking to the pay phones at the A & P is her ex-boyfriend. Hamby states it was a

	white male with shoulder length hair, wearing a light jacket and painting clothing. Hamby states the man used the phone twice.
12/08/1994 3:30 PM	According to Carmen Turbeville's 12/09/1994 interview, she stated that Shirley Faircloth told her that Coffey called her around 3:30 PM and said pick him up at the A & P. He told Faircloth he had to go to the ABC store to get the Victim some liquor. Coffey told Faircloth he had \$400. Faircloth said that the day before, Coffey had no money. Faircloth has the clothes that Coffey was wearing at her house.
12/08/1994 4:10-4:45 PM	According to Nancy Horton's 12/08/1994 interview, (conducted at 9:14 PM, shortly after the crime), at 4:10 PM, Horton saw the Victim walking out of his trailer. At 4:45 PM Horton saw a white male going into the Victim's trailer. Horton has seen this man before and was looking out the door at him.
	Horton's Description: "6'1 or 6'2, bushy hair, brown in color, he had a hat on, jean jacket (faded), and was carrying a brown bag, very small. No facial hair, ruddy looking skin."
	According to Nancy Horton's 12/16/1994 interview, she arrives home between 4:10-4:15 PM and sees the Victim coming down the street from his trailer. Horton says hello to the Victim, goes inside her home, and begins cooking supper. During the next 10-15 minutes, Horton sees a man out her window walking down the street towards the Victim's trailer. Horton states she has seen this man in the past going to the Victim's trailer.
	Horton's Description: white male, late 30's, rough looking, dark skin, about 6' tall, medium build, black and gray hair and his hair is real thick looking. The man was carrying something in his hand which she thinks was a brown paper bag, maybe the size of a 5 <sup>th</sup> bottle. She also recalls the man had a cap or hat on.
	Nancy Horton was cooking dinner in her trailer when Rene Nelson arrived and asked for a ride to Rainbow Daycare to pick up her kids.  Horton stated that they were gone for approximately 20 minutes.
12/08/1994 4:00-4:30 PM	According to Steve Combs' 12/09/1994 interview, Coffey comes into the ABC Store and asks what kind of liquor the Victim likes. Coffey pays exact change (\$3.35) for a bottle of Popov vodka.
12/08/1994 4:00-5:00 PM	According to Russell Swift's (manager of the A & P) 1/27/1995 interview, he sees Coffey in the store picking up a six pack of beer. Swift tells Coffey to leave or he would call police. Coffey puts the beer back and

	leaves. Swift saw Coffey go towards the pay phones. Swift did not know Rhonda Carson by name but remembers seeing a woman coming in and out of the store until about dark. Swift mentions that this woman has a teenage son who is with her a lot.
12/08/1994 4:40-5:00 PM	According to Shirley Faircloth's 12/09/1994 interview, Coffey calls her back and she picks him up at the A & P. He gets into her car and says he wants to take her out and have a Merry Christmas. He also says he wants to get Crystal (his daughter) a baby doll. Faircloth asks if he has money and he says he does. They sit at the A & P for 15-20 minutes and then go to Woodlands (an upscale restaurant in Boone). While there, Coffey gives the guitar player \$7.00 to pay a song. 12/08/1994 4:50-5:00 PM	According to Rene Nelson's 12/15/1994 interview, between 4:50-5:00 PM she went to the daycare and was gone maybe 10 minutes. A few minutes later, her son Jeffrey called her outside and said he wanted to know "why that damned old Kenneth Coffey and Big Bob were following him (Coy) up the road." Jeffrey wouldn't shut up until she came outside. Nelson saw Coffey and Bragg. The Victim was almost at his trailer and Bragg said something like "ain't that right", "ain't that right, you son-of-a-bitch, Coy" and Coffey was laughing. She could tell they were drunk. Nelson said Jeffrey got on his bike and told her that he saw them go into the Victim's house. Nelson saw Bragg swinging something in his right hand and it had something round in it and the sock was dark in color.
	Nelson describes the clothing of Bragg and Coffey.  Nelson states that Agent Steve Wilson came and interviewed her on Friday morning and she told him that she had seen Coffey but she was too scared to say anything else. Nelson describes a previous incident between herself, Rhonda Carson and Coffey in which Coffey threatened her and was evicted from the trailer park.
	Nelson states she saw yesterday's Watuaga Democrat and it had Bragg's photo in it.  Interview included in brief.
12/00/1004	The state of the s
12/08/1994 5:00 PM Or After	According to Phyllis Knight's 1/27/1995 interview, she is a neighbor of the Victim and spent most of the day sleeping. She recalls hearing a noise over at the Victim's trailer and the time may have been 5:00 PM or a little after. She describes the noise as maybe a knocking on the door.
12/08/1994 5:10 PM	According to Nancy Horton's 12/16/1994 interview, she sees the Victim walking down the road to his trailer. Horton calls her son to eat dinner and does not know anything else until the ambulance arrives.

12/08/1994 5:10 PM	According to Cherie Gray's 12/09/1994 interview, she sees the Victim going up the steps to his trailer. She says he is wearing a green jacket and jeans and carrying his walking stick or maybe something with a brown handle.
12/08/1994 5:00-5:35 PM	According to James "Bo" Tugman's 12/09/1994, 12/16/1994, 07/18/1995 interviews, he sees the Victim at the ABC Store and holds the door open for the Victim. Tugman states that he got off work at 4:45 PM and arrived at the ABC between 5:00-5:30 PM. Tugman stood in line to purchase his item and Coffey was in line alone behind Tugman.
12/08/1994 5:25-5:30 PM	According to Nancy Horton's 12/08/1994 interview (conducted at 9:14 PM, shortly after the crime), she sees the Victim going back to his trailer.
12/08/1994 5:30 PM	According to Shirley Faircloth's 12/10/1994 interview, Faircloth wakes up from her nap and the phones rings. It is Coffey telling her to pick him up from the A & P. When she arrives, Coffey is drunk and they sit in the car talking about where they want to go. Coffey tells her, "Shirley, you always tell me that I owe you something and we are going to have a Merry Christmas."
	They go to Woodlands (an upscale restaurant in Boone). Coffey bought beer for two people at the bar. They stayed and listened to a couple of sets of a man who was playing the guitar. Faircloth said Coffey had four \$100 bills in his sock and gave her \$20. They go to Ichabod's (bar/pool hall) and play pool. She believes they stayed about an hour and Coffey drank two beers. On the way home, Faircloth stops at The Pantry on State Farm Road and Coffey buys beer. Faircloth says she now only sees two \$100 bills in his sock.
	They go to Faircloth's apartment and Coffey calls his father (Jack Coffey) at 10:25 PM. She hears him tell his father "Dad, I'll pay you that \$126.00 that I owe you." She also hears him say "Me and Bobby Bragg did something to come into some money." Jack Coffey asks Faircloth if Coffey can spend the night and she says yes. Coffey spends the night at her home.
	Faircloth states that the last time she saw Bragg was a week prior.
12/08/1994 5:45-6:00 PM	According to David Doss' 12/09/1994 interview, he arrived home at his trailer and saw a tall man walking up toward the end of the street and walk to the left toward the Victim's trailer. Doss said the man had a dark color coat and blue jeans. Doss does not know what trailer this person went to.
12/08/1994 5:30-6:30 PM	According to Bradley Wheeler's 01/13/1995 interview, he went to his girlfriend's home on 12/08/1994 (Judy Wolber). Wheeler and his friend were watching TV. Wheeler hears Joe Grimes knocking on the Victim's

	door and calling for the Victim. Wheeler mentions that on that Tuesday (12/06/1994), he had heard some yelling and knocking coming from the Victim's trailer.
12/08/1994 6:15 - 6:30 PM	According to Larry Joe Grimes' 12/08/1994 interview, he went to the Victim's home to bring him supper and the front door was closed. He went inside and saw the Victim lying on the floor face down. Grimes got his wife Debra and they called 911. Grimes stated he saw the Victim walking two or three times that day prior to 1:00 PM, but does not provide specific times.
	According to Debra Sue Grimes' 12/21/1994 interview, her husband went to bring the Victim dinner between 6:15-6:30 PM. He returned stating something was wrong with the Victim and she accompanied her husband to the Victim's trailer. The Victim was wedged in the corner. Her husband left to call 911 and she checked the Victim for a pulse. There was no pulse. When she touched his forehead, her hand had blood on it. Debra stayed with the Victim until first responders arrived.
12/08/1994 6:20-6:30 PM	According to Cherie Gray's 12/09/1994 interview, she left her home between 6:20-6:30 PM to take her daughter to the skating rink. She saw lights on inside the Victim's trailer and the lights looked pretty bright. Gray stated that she had seen a couple of guys walking in and out of the trailer park. One of the guys had dirty blond hair with a leather jacket with things hanging off of it. She recalls seeing this guy walking by himself.
	Cherie Gray was re-interviewed on 10/11/1995, when Gray was contacted at the request of the DA regarding her prior statement "concerning seeing two people in the trailer park between 6:20-6:30." Gray states that as she was getting ready to leave to take her daughter to the skating rink between 6:20-6:30 PM she looked out her window. Gray saw a white male with collar length blond hair, maybe 5'10, not heavy, walking down the street toward the highway. She said he had on a black leather jacket with chains and do-dads hanging off of it, and he may have had on blue jeans. Gray did not remember anything about the other person, but stated that both guys were walking down the street, but they were not together.
12/08/1994	Boone Police Department receives a call and police arrive at the Victim's
6:41 PM	home. The Victim is pronounced dead on arrival (DOA).
12/08/1994	Boone Police Department Detective Shook and Detective Harrison arrive
7:20-7:46 PM	on the scene.
12/08/1994	Detectives Shook and Harrison processed the crime scene. This consisted of taking photographs and preparing sketches with measurements.

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7:55 PM-the early morning hours of 12/09/1994	EMS workers take the Victim's body to the Watuaga Medical Center for the autopsy. Detectives Harrison and Shook attend the autopsy. Dr. Brent Hall performs the autopsy and determines the Victim died from blunt force trauma. The detectives collect the Victim's clothing from the autopsy and take the clothing to the Boone Police Department. There they meet with SBI Agents Pam Tully and Steve Wilson (approximately 2:30-3:00 AM). All four return to the crime scene where they collect additional evidence and conduct a search of the scene.
12/08/1994 9:14 PM	Detective Shook goes to the home of Nancy Horton and briefly interviews her. According to Detective Shook's notes, "During the interview of Nancy Horton, she gave a description of a possible suspect."
	This interview states that at 4:45 PM Horton sees a white male going into the Victim's trailer. Horton has seen this man before and was looking out the door at him.
	Horton's Description: "6'1 or 6'2, bushy hair, brown in color, he had a hat on, jean jacket (faded) and was carrying a brown bag, very small. No facial hair, ruddy looking skin."
	Horton's interview states that shortly after this, between 5:25-5:30 PM, she sees the Victim going back to his trailer.
12/08/1994 9:20 PM	Detective Harrison interviews neighbor Judy Wolber who has just arrived home at 9:00 PM. Wolber states she has not seen anything.
12/09/1994 4:35 AM	According to Detective Shook's notes "NOTE The description given by the interview of Nancy Norton matched the description of Bobby Bragg."
12/09/1994 5:11 AM	Detective Shook called the Watauga County Jail to see if they had a picture of Robert Bragg. Jailer Patti Eller said that they did not.
12/09/1994 5:18-5:30 AM	Detective Shook called the Watauga County Jail to see if they had a picture of Kenneth Coffey. Jailer Patti Eller said that they had one photo but she could not let him take it from the jail. Detective Shook made a copy of the photo and copied Robert Bragg's jail records.
12/09/1994 5:47 AM	Detective Harrison learns of the copy of the photo of Kenneth Coffey.  Phone calls are made to the Watauga County Jail to obtain the original.
	Detective Harrison's notes state "Information is received that Coffey and Bragg might be staying at the Red Carpet Inn." The source of this information is not listed.
12/09/1994	Detective Shook obtains the original photo of Kenneth Coffey from the
5:55 AM	Watuaga County Jail.
12/09/1994 7:30 AM	Detective Shook calls the Red Carpet Inn to see if Coffey or Bragg are staying in a room there. They are not.

12/09/1994 7:40 AM	Detective Shook, Detective Harrison, and Agent Wilson go to the Longvue Motel to see if Coffey and Bragg are staying there. They speak with the manager, Betty Triplett, and she advises that they are not there. Detectives then check door-to-door and speak with the motel occupants with negative results.
12/09/1994 8:00 AM	According to later interviews with Rhonda Carson's co-workers at Quality Inn, Carson arrives at work and tells details about the crime to them.  News and details of the crime have not been reported in the newspaper yet.
12/09/1994 8:05 AM	Detectives Shook, Detective Harrison, and Agent Wilson start to conduct interviews on Winter Street.
12/09/1994 8:30 AM	According to a 12/12/1994 interview, Belinda Reece stated that on either Thursday 12/08/1994 or Friday 12/09/1994, around 8:30 AM, Bragg came into the Department of Human Services office in Mountain City, TN, to apply for Medicaid. Bragg asked Reece for a couple of dollars and she gave it to him. Bragg carried on a normal conversation with Reece. Bragg had an odor of alcohol and was wearing a tan winter coat and dark pants, possibly blue jeans. Bragg was carrying his guitar in a black case. After speaking with other secretaries in the office, they stated that it was 12/09/1994 when Bragg came to the office.
12/09/1994 9:00 AM	According to Jim Earp's 12/11/1994 interview, Coffey calls Earp at work from Faircloth's residence. Coffey states he wants to get back the ring he sold to Earp because he had come into some money.
12/09/1994 10:00 AM	Junior Coffey (Kenneth Coffey's brother) calls Shirley Faircloth's house and tells Faircloth and Coffey that police are looking for Kenneth Coffey.
12/09/1994 10:10 AM	Detective Shook and Detective Harrison ride to King Street in an attempt to locate Coffey and Bragg, but are unable to locate them.
12/09/1994 11:24 AM-1:00 PM	Detective Shook calls a detective with the Watauga County Sheriff's Dept. to assist in locating Coffey in the Sampson area. They ride to Coffey's address, but he is not there. They then go Coffey's father, Jack Coffey, at a Christmas tree lot. He advises that Coffey is at Shirley Faircloth's.
12/09/1994 11:30 AM	According to Jim Earp's 12/11/1994 interview, Faircloth calls Earp and says she is scared. She says Coffey had \$400 and that she had picked him up at the A & P at 6:30 PM on December 8 <sup>th</sup> and Coffey told her they could go and eat.
12/09/1994 1:17 PM	Detective Shook, Detective Harrison, and others arrive at Shirley Faircloth's residence and locate Coffey. They transport him back to Boone Police Department.
12/09/1994 1:48-7:00 PM	Interview of Coffey. Coffey implicates himself, Bragg and Cothren.  Interview included in brief.

12/09/1994 7:30 PM	Detective Harrison and Agent Wilson call ADA Gerald Wilson at his residence and brief him on information from the interview.
12/09/1994 7:45 PM	Coffey calls his father, Jack Coffey, from Detective Harrison's office to pick him up at The Pantry.
12/09/1994 7:55 PM	Agent Wilson and Detective Shook (with others) call DA Tom Rusher and relay the case. Rusher tells them to obtain a first degree murder warrant for Robert Bragg. Rusher tells them at this time he does not want Coffey charged with anything and for them to schedule a polygraph of Coffey.
12/09/1994 9:20 PM	Detective Shook, Detective Harrison, and Agent Wilson go to the magistrate's office and obtain a first degree murder warrant for Robert Bragg.
12/09/1994 11:13 PM	Detective Harrison issues a BOLO (Be On The Lookout) for Robert Bragg and Joe Lee Cothren.
12/10/1994 11:59 AM	According to Judy Thomas' 12/10/1994 interview, Bragg was in Mountain City, TN sometime after 8:00 AM on Friday, 12/09/1994. She had been in Mountain City, TN since Wednesday, 12/07/1994. On 12/09/1994 she had gone over to Jay Manuel's trailer to clean. She gave Bragg \$3.00 to get cigarettes. Bragg told her that he borrowed \$5.00 from Belinda at Human Services when he was up there to get Medicaid. Bragg brought the papers back and got Thomas to fill them out and mail them. Thomas stated that she had spent the night with Bragg at Manuel's trailer. Detective Harrison obtained Bragg's clothing from Thomas at her residence.
	At 2:40 AM on 12/11/1994, Thomas was re-interviewed by Detective Harrison and Agent Wilson, after Agent Wilson completed his interview of Bragg. Thomas stated that she saw Bragg sometime Friday morning. He had mentioned that he and his brother Jim were not getting along. Bragg pulled a trailer hitch out of his pocket. She asked him what he was doing carrying a trailer hitch and he said he had been moving some trailers.
	According to Judy Thomas' 2/12/1996 interview, Thomas stated that she saw Bragg on Friday morning. She was sweeping off the porch at Joe Smith's residence and Bragg walked up the street and brought her the application for the Medicaid card. Thomas sat on the porch and filled out the papers. Afterward, Bragg left and said he was going back to Human Services to turn in the papers. Later in the day, Geraldine Thomas, who lives across the street from the Smith's, called to her to come across the street because Bragg was there and Geraldine wanted her to listen to the song Bragg was playing on the guitar. Thomas stated that sometime late that evening she went over to Jay Manuel's trailer which is just down the street. She cleaned Manuel's trailer and cooked

	supper for Manuel, Bragg and herself. Bragg and Manuel had been drinking beer. Thomas spent the night at Manuel's trailer, and she and Bragg slept in the back bedroom together.
12/10/1994 5:55 PM	Based on an interview of Tony Triplett indicating that the Victim hid his money, Detective Shook, Detective Harrison, and Agent Wilson return to the Victim's home with a search warrant. They "mainly" look for money which the Victim had supposedly hidden. They look in the front bedroom closet and under the kitchen sink. No money was found. In the trash, Agent Wilson found an empty Budweiser carton, 11 empty Budweiser 11 oz. bottles, a small empty Jack Daniels shot bottle, and one Budweiser bottle cap on the kitchen table.
12/10/1994	Detective Freddie Ainsworth of the Johnson County Sheriff's Department called Jim Bragg and told him that he was looking for Bragg because BPD had a homicide warrant for him. Jim Bragg told Ainsworth that he hadn't seen Bragg for two to three months.
12/10/1994 7:50 PM	Detective Harrison is informed that Robert Bragg has been arrested in Mountain City, TN.
12/10/1994 8:05 PM	Detective Harrison calls the Johnson County Sheriff's Department and advises them they will be in route shortly. Detective Harrison and Agent Wilson drive to Mountain City, TN.
12/10/1994 9:28 PM	Agent Wilson interviews Robert Bragg in Mountain City, TN.  Interview included in brief.
12/11/1994 12:00 PM	According to Cora Teague's 01/17/1995 interview, around noon, she, Coffey, and Greg Richardson were behind the A & P waiting until it was the legal time that they could buy beer. While they were waiting, Coffey pulled out a pearl-handled pocket knife and handed it to her and stated, "Here cuz, I didn't get you a Christmas present." Coffey placed the pocket knife in her hand. Teague recalled that the Victim had the same type of knife and she believed it was his knife. Teague stated she saw a gold nugget ring in the field beside the A & P.
12/12/1994	According to Bonnie Mae Brumfield's 12/19/1995 interview, Coffey came to her house on 12/12/1994 and brought a newspaper that had the article on the murder. She asked Coffey who he thought did it and Coffey said, "Bobby Bragg." Brumfield is Coffey's first cousin.
12/12/1994 12:12 PM	Jewell Triplett stated she was off this past Friday. The writing on the gas voucher looked like that of the custodian, Violet Eller. Triplett works Monday through Thursday. Violet works Tuesday through Friday.
12/12/1994 1:30-2:00 PM	According to Henryk Ossowski's 12/15/1994 interview, Ossowski saw Coffey on the steps of the Hospitality House. (He believes it was 12/12/1994). Coffey wanted to know if Ossowski had heard about the Victim. Ossowski replied that he had, and that he knew that Coffey had

	been there. Coffey got in Ossowski's face and said, "but I left." Coffey stated that the police had already questioned him.
12/12/1994 2:10 PM	Detective Harrison and Detective Shook take custody of Robert Bragg in Mountain City, TN and take him to Boone, NC. Bragg waived extradition.
12/13/1994	According to Bonnie Mae Brumfield's 12/19/1995 interview, Coffey came back to her house on 12/13/1994. Bonnie asked Coffey what Bragg killed the Victim with. Coffey said that Bragg had a trailer hitch ball in a sock. Coffey said that the morning after the Victim got killed, Coffey woke up with over \$600 on him. Coffey said he didn't know where it came from. While there, Coffey opened his wallet. Brumfield saw a lot of money. There were a bunch of \$20 bills and at least one \$50 bill. Brumfield, David Auton, Bryant Auton, and Chucky Brumfield were there during this time.
12/12/1994 3:18 PM	Robert Bragg is served the warrant officially charging him with first degree murder.
12/13/1994 1:45 PM	Detectives serve a search warrant on Bragg for all inventory and items seized during his arrest.
12/14/1994	According to his 12/16/1994 interview, TJ Carson stated that he called David Coffey and Harley Coffey. Harley Coffey told TJ that he saw money that Kenneth Coffey had while Coffey was partying at his house. Harley said that David Coffey's mother saw \$50's and \$20's while Coffey was flashing the money around. David Coffey said that his mother saw the money.
12/15/1994 9:03 AM	Detective Harrison is notified by Detective Charlie Danner that Coffey called the jail "to see how Bobby Bragg was doing." This call came in on Wednesday, 12/14/1994 (time unknown).
12/15/1994 9:00-10:00 AM	In his 12/16/1994 interview, TJ Carson stated that he saw Coffey at the courthouse. He and Coffey were outside smoking around 9:00 AM, when TJ asked Coffey if he knew how the Victim was beaten. He asked Coffey if he was there and Coffey initially said "No." Coffey then said that he saw blood and ran behind the A & P. Coffey said that Bragg told him if he said anything, he would kill him. Coffey said he had proof that he was with Shirley Faircloth when it happened.
	At around 10:00 AM, TJ saw Coffey in the break room at the courthouse. He saw Coffey pull out his wallet. There was a lot of money in it. TJ told Coffey, "I bet I've got more money in my wallet than you do." Coffey said "I don't think so." TJ asked if Coffey had been working for his dad cutting wood, and Coffey responded "I have a little bit." TJ then asked "Did you get your disability yet?" and Coffey said, "No." TJ asked Coffey if Bragg had given him money and Coffey didn't say anything. TJ stated that the money he saw in Coffey's wallet was straight money that didn't have any wrinkles on the bills.

12/16/1994 1:14 PM	Nancy Horton was interviewed again on December 16, 1994. During this interview, Horton told investigators that she went to the A & P and got the Watauga Democrat out of the newspaper rack. While at home with her friend, Shannon, she looked at the newspaper and Horton said "That's that son-of-a-bitch that killed Coy." Horton stated that she had known Bragg for five years. Bragg used to come to her home when she "used to drink real bad" and there were a lot of drunks there. Horton further stated that she had given Bragg a ride in the past. Horton told police that she had a photo of Bragg at her home. Horton stated she would swear in a court of law that Bragg is the same person that walked by her trailer on the evening of December 8 <sup>th</sup> .
	At 1:14 PM, Nancy Horton provides a photograph of Robert Bragg and detectives take the photo into evidence.
12/20/1994 3:04 PM	Patrolman Gerald Hayes is interviewed about his 12/06/1994 arrest of Bragg and Coffey. Hayes stated that he responded to a two intoxicated persons call at The Pantry beside the Peddler. Patrolman Hayes recalled one of them saying "We can go to Coy's." Patrolman Hayes remembered seeing the Victim walking south toward The Pantry. Both Coffey and Bragg were placed in handcuffs. Patrolman Rasnake patted down Bragg and found a white sock that contained a trailer hitch ball in it. This was located in the right pocket of Bragg's brown coat. Rasnake asked Bragg "Why are you carrying something like this around?" Bragg said, "I never know when I might need to use it on somebody." Rasnake possibly said, "You could kill somebody with that thing." Hayes and Rasnake asked Bragg, "Where did you get that?" Bragg said, "I found it." In route to the jail, Hayes asked Bragg, "Why do you carry something like that with you?" Bragg said, "Man, you never know; you might need it out here."
12/21/1994 10:30 AM	Detective Shook and Harrison pick up Coffey and serve him with a search warrant to obtain a blood sample. They transport him to the hospital to obtain his sample. While in route, they ask Coffey if he is still willing to take a polygraph and he stated he would be but was a little nervous about it. Detective Harrison tells him the test will be scheduled.
12/22/1994 11:58 AM	Detective Harrison and Detective Jim Wilson search the field adjacent to the Greenway Trailer Park (Summer Street) and the A & P. While searching, they locate a white and red sock on the ground that appears to have a possible stain and did not appear to have been laying on the ground very long. They collect the sock. The remainder of the search reveals negative results.
12/22/1994 3:55 PM	Detective Shook interviews Lisa Hanes. According to her interview, Thomas Pope told Lisa that a lady that used to live in the trailer park was standing on the front porch when the Victim was killed. She doesn't recall who the lady is.

12/25/1994 – 12/28/1994	According to Henryk Ossowski's 01/05/1994 interview, he stated that on Christmas day, Coffey, Cora Teague, Greg Richardson, and Shirley Faircloth were at Ossowski's trailer. They asked Coffey what happened. Coffey said he went to the liquor store and when he got back, he saw Bragg hit the Victim and blood flew. He then got scared and left. After telling the group this, Coffey struck Greg Richardson and left with Shirley Faircloth.
	Henryk Ossowski stated that Coffey came back on the evening of 12/26/1995. Ossowski asked Coffey to leave. Coffey refused. Ossowski called the police. The police arrived and took Coffey to jail.
	Note: According to Detective Harrison's notes, Coffey is arrested by Boone Police in the Greenview Trailer Park and placed in 24 hour hold until he is sober. This occurs on 12/26/1994 at 7:24 PM.
	According to Henryk Ossowski's 01/05/1994 interview, on 12/27/1994 or 12/28/1994, Coffey came back to his house. Cora Teague and Greg Richardson were there. They asked Coffey again what happened to the Victim. Coffey said he wasn't there and that the Victim was like a father to him. When Ossowski confronted Coffey with what Coffey told him on 12/25/1994, Coffey didn't say anything else. Every time Ossowski asked Coffey about it, Coffey gave a different answer.
12/28/1994 10:45 AM	Detective Shook and Detective Harrison interview Jolene Latty. Latty states she can't remember what day it was, but Coffey came to her trailer around lunch and drank some Jack Daniels. Her on-again/offagain boyfriend, Richard Rominger, came by about 2:00 PM and was mad Coffey was there drinking. Coffey spent the night, and the next day went to Ossowski's trailer. When he returned, he said Robert Bragg had been there at Ossowski's trailer also.
12/29/1994	According to Cora Teague's 12/29/1994 interview, she saw Coffey in the field beside the A & P. Coffey came up to her and said, "I swear cuz, I didn't do anything." Teague told Coffey she knew he was over there. Coffey said that he, Bragg, and Joe went to the Victim's trailer together. He said that when he got back, he saw Bragg hit the Victim. He told Teague that he tried to get Bragg off of the Victim and Bragg threw him up against the wall. He said that Bragg and Joe both turned on him and he left. Coffey told Teague that he went to get a girl named Chris and that he stayed all night there. Teague stated that she had talked to Chris and Jack Coffey (Coffey's father) and they both said that Coffey stayed there all night. Coffey told her that during the day, Bragg was talking about trying to rip Henryk Ossowski off. Bragg had gone to Longvue Motel to see Elaine and Kenny Jones on that Thursday (12/08/1994). They wouldn't let him in that day. Coffey told Teague that Bragg used a

01/03/1994 9:30 AM	Detective Harrison testifies to the Grand Jury regarding Bragg. He testifies about the statement that Kenneth Coffey had given to Agent Wilson and Harrison. Detective Harrison states he didn't give Coffey's name at the Grand Jury but advised them that they had a statement from a witness that was there when the Victim was beaten at his residence. A true bill of indictment was returned on Bragg.
01/04/1995 9:45 PM	Jolene Latty calls Detective Harrison intoxicated. She "made mention that Kenneth Coffey said he hit Coy (Victim)." She was very intoxicated and said she was scared.
01/05/1995 2:48 PM	Detective Harrison, Detective Shook, and Agent Wilson ask Coffey about the polygraph and he states he doesn't have to take the test. Coffey is in the Watuaga County Jail on a probation violation. They tell Coffey that he (Coffey) said he would take the test to verify the statement he provided to Agent Wilson and Detective Harrison on 12/09/1994. Coffey said he wasn't going down for the test.
01/05/1995 3:30 PM	Detective Harrison calls ADA Gerald Wilson and relays that Coffey is refusing to take the polygraph exam, the fact that Coffey has been spending money, that Coffey has told different tales about how he came into the money, and some inconsistencies about Coffey's statements.  ADA Wilson advises Detective Harrison to meet with him the following morning.
01/06/1995 10:45 AM	Detective Harrison, Detective Shook and Agent Wilson speak with ADA Gerald Wilson. ADA Wilson advises them to obtain a first degree murder warrant on Coffey.

01/6/1995	Detective Shook and Detective Harrison obtain a first degree murder
1:00 PM	warrant for Kenneth Coffey.
01/06/1995 1:57 PM	Detective Shook and Detective Harrison interview Coffey (after transporting him to the Boone Police Department). Coffey states that on 12/08/1994, he woke up at Jolene Latty's trailer, and then walked to the A & P. He saw Jim Earp and Earp took him up town. Coffey sold two rings.
	Coffey then went to Attorney Diane Griffin's office, stopped at Boone Drug for a cup of coffee, and walked on downtown. He was stopped by two deputies and served with subpoenas for court. He walked to Bonjangles for a drink and tried to call two people. He spoke with a man at Harris Teeter and then walked over to the Victim's. The Victim said he would like to have some beer, so Coffey walked to the Amoco station and bought a 12-pack of Budweiser. They sat around drinking and talking. 01/11/1995 1:32 PM	Detective Harrison (with Lt. Willie Watson) interviews Billie Greene. Greene worked at the Quality Inn with Carson. Greene stated on the night of the crime at approximately 8:00-9:00 PM, Carson called her at home and said "you wouldn't believe what happened." Carson said a Bragg boy and her boyfriend (Kenneth Coffey) killed the Victim. Carson said they hit him once and blood went everywhere. Carson told Greene that she (Carson) was standing in front of the A & P and "she said the old man tried to talk to her to her and she ignored him and if they want to question me, that they can talk to that manager because she (Rhonda) was right at the door and Rhonda was pacing up and down in front of the store."

	Detective Harrison took Teague and Greg Richardson to the field beside the A & P. Teague showed Detective Harrison the location where she had seen the ring. Detective Harrison was unable to locate anything.
	At 2:00 PM, Teague and Richardson went with Detective Harrison to the residence of Conrad Cox. Teague went inside. At 2:08 PM, Teague came back out of the apartment and handed Detective Harrison a pearl-handled pocket knife. Detective Harrison had Teague sign a property report. Teague stated that when Coffey gave her the knife, it looked like it had blood on it. Note: This item was tested and failed to reveal the presence of blood.
02/12/1996	According to Judy Thomas' 02/12/1996 interview, she had been interviewed by PI Jerry Vaughan (who she thought was a lawyer) and attorney Vince Gable on 01/30/1996. Thomas told Detective Harrison that they asked her questions and that she thinks she told the attorneys that she thought that she talked to Bragg on a Wednesday but she's not sure what Wednesday she saw Bragg.
02/27/1995 6:05 PM	Crimestoppers receives a tip involving Rhonda Carson.  Information included in brief.
02/28/1995 9:45 AM	Crimestoppers receives a second tip involving Rhonda Carson.  Information included in brief.
03/01/1995 9:43 AM	Detective Shook and Detective Harrison interview Fredrick Calhoun after picking him up at the Watauga County Jail. Calhoun was in jail with both Coffey and Bragg. Calhoun heard Bragg denying involvement in the crime and said Coffey must have done it. Bragg called Coffey a liar.
03/13/1995 11:20 AM	According to Tammy Pollard's 03/13/1995 interview, she has heard a couple of stories about the Victim's death.
	The first is that Coffey was there and Coffey ran, and Bragg chased Coffey down and was beating Coffey and Coffey got away from him and Bragg ran Coffey down at the A & P and Bragg threatened to kill Coffey if Coffey told anyone.
	The second is that Coffey had stayed at the trailer about twenty minutes after Bragg had left the Victim's trailer. A few days later, Coffey was bragging about the murder of the Victim.

He went back to the trailer and Bobby Bragg came in. Bobby and Coy start arguing and Bragg started hitting Coy. Kenneth said he got scared and ran away."
03/20/1995 1:20 PM	According to Jack Coffey's (Coffey's father) interview, on the day the Victim was killed, Coffey told him that he went to the liquor store and got the Victim a pint of liquor and that while his son was there, that the Victim turned around to Bragg and said to Bragg, "You son-of-a-bitch, get out of my house." He said according to Kenneth, that Bragg pulled out a trailer hitch ball and Bragg hit the Victim and blood splattered. Kenneth told Jack that he ran to the A & P and was sitting on the bank, Bragg came around the A & P, threw down a \$100 bill and Bragg ran on. According to Kenneth, Tony Triplett and his wife saw him at the A & P. Kenneth told Jack that there was also a blond-headed man at the Victim's trailer.
03/21/1995 2:45 PM	Detectives interview and polygraph Coffey.  Interview included in brief.
03/23/1995 3:30 PM	Detective Harrison went to Rene Nelson's home and spoke with her and her sister (name not provided). Detective Harrison asked both of them if they had seen a female in the trailer park in the afternoon on the day that the Victim was killed. They said they had not. Detective Harrison asked if they knew Rhonda Carson and if they had seen her that day. Both stated that they had not seen her that day.
03/24/1995 3:10 PM	Detective Harrison returned to speak with Rene Nelson and her mother, Linda Wilcox. Harrison asked Nelson again if she had seen a female in the trailer park on the day that the Victim was murdered and she stated she had not.
04/20/1995 9:58 AM	Defense Attorneys for Bragg viewed the physical evidence and requested that latent lifts be taken from the vodka bottle collected from the Victim's home.
05/01/1995 10:40 AM	Detective Harrison and Detective Shook process the vodka bottle for prints.

	Note: Boone Police Department had the one identifiable print located on the vodka bottle compared to Coffey, Bragg, the Victim, and two employees who were working at the ABC Store and handled the bottle on 12/08/1994. All five individuals were excluded as matching this print and the print remains unidentified.
09/01/1995	Jonathan Harmon was interviewed. Harmon was in jail awaiting his court date on 09/06/1995. Harmon stated that while he was in jail, he was in a cell across from Coffey. Approximately two and a half to three weeks prior, Coffey started talking to Harmon. Harmon stated that Coffey told him that he was drunk, and around 5:00 PM Coffey went over to a guy's trailer. He thought that Coffey said the guy's name was Cory. Coffey told him that the guy had been getting checks, had been saving money, and had around \$1,500. Coffey then told Harmon that he "killed the man" or "killed the old man" and got around \$1,500. He said that he hit him and that he didn't mean to kill him. Harmon stated that Coffey told him that he left and went to The Pantry and called a woman by the name of Rhonda to come and pick him up. After she picked him up, Coffey went back to his house in Sampson. He got scared, took a shower, and burned his shirt and pants. Coffey told Harmon that after that, some woman took him to a bar in Blowing Rock and he stayed there until 11:00 or 12:00.
	Harmon further stated that later in the day, Harmon was telling Dwayne Barksdale what Coffey had told him. He thought that Coffey was asleep, but Coffey got up, gave him a look and went to the telephone. 
#### **Agencies and Agents**


After the Victim's body was discovered, the Boone Police Department (BPD) and the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation (SBI) began investigating this case. Detectives Jim Harrison and Mark Shook of BPD were assigned to the case. Agent Steve Wilson of the SBI also responded to the crime scene and assisted with the field investigation. Agent Pam Tully of the SBI assisted with processing the crime scene.

#### **Initial Investigation**

On the evening of Thursday, December 8, 1994, Detectives Shook and Harrison of BPD arrived at the scene and began their investigation. In the early morning hours on December 9, 1994, Agents Wilson and Tully of the SBI arrived at scene and began their investigation. This involved taking crime scene photographs, measurements, and collecting items of physical evidence. A diagram of the crime scene is included below.


# CRIME SCENE: 12-8-94 ()C/# 9416953 MURDER 193 WINTER DIR. ⇒ STREET


































## Coffey Interviews, Arrest, & Polygraph

Coffey was initially interviewed on Friday, December 9, 1994, the afternoon after the crime occurred. Coffey was interviewed again on January 6, 1994 and was subsequently arrested after that interview. On March 21, 1994, Coffey took a polygraph. Coffey made several comments to the polygraph examiner, Agent Jonathan Jones of the SBI. He then gave a statement to Detective Shook. A copy of each of Coffey's statements, along with the results of his polygraph examination, are included below.

Harrison while in Detective Harrison's office at the Boone Police Department in Boone, North Carolina. Also present at times during this interview was Detective M. Shook.

Detective R. O. Halle, of the Watauga County Sheriff's Office in Boone, was contacted by investigators due to his being familiar with the Coffey family who reside in the Sampson Community of Watauga County. SA Wilson learned that Kenneth Coffey does not have a valid driver's license. SA Wilson learned that Kenneth Coffey does not have a valid driver's license. SA Wilson traveled with Detective Halle in an attempt to locate Coffey at his residence with negative results. Detective Halle was operating his burgundy unmarked patrol car and investigators were dressed in plain clothes and without their weapons being visible.

Detective Halle located Jack Coffey at a road side sales operation near Tweetsie Railroad on Highway 321 and was informed that Kenneth Coffey was at the Shirley Faircloth residence in the Perkinsville Community. Jack Coffey gave Detective Halle directions to the residence. Jack Coffey told Detective Halle in SA Wilson's presence that Kenneth was hiding because Randy Townsend (parole officer) has Kenneth on probation and is wanting to send him off on January 6, 1995. Jack Coffey said that if Kenneth was not at Faircloth's, then he may be at Coy Hartley's trailer located on the second drive on the left traveling from the A & P Grocery Store.

Coffey was initially contacted at the residence of Shirley 000019

Faircloth at 107 Cole Street in Boone, by Detective Halle and SA Wilson at approximately 1:24 p.m. Detective Halle asked Faircloth if Coffey was there and she responded that he was. Coffey came to the door and then walked outside to speak with Detective Halle and SA Wilson. Detective Halle told Coffey that SA Wilson was needing to speak to him about a homicide case being worked by the Boone Police Department. Detective Halle asked Coffey if he would accompany investigators to the police department to answer questions. Coffey responded that he would and was told that investigators would return him to the destination of his choice. Coffey was asked by Detective Halle if he was carrying any weapons and he responded no. Coffey was not handcuffed or restrained before getting into Detective Halle's vehicle purkicute y like y m Delektive on i- asked

While en route to the police department, Coffey, who was seated in the right rear passenger seat, asked investigators what was going on. SA Wilson responded that Coy Hartley had been found dead at his mobile home last night (Thursday, December 8, 1994). Coffey stated that he had heard that Coy was dead from Faircloth after she received a telephone call from Hazel Byers this morning. Coffey said that he heard that Coy died of natural causes or something else; that people weren't sure how he died. SA Wilson stated that the cause of death was homicide, but did not elaborate. SA Wilson thanked Coffey for his cooperation and agreeing to accompany investigators to the office for an interview. Coffey responded to the effect, "Sure."

Investigators arrived at the police department at approximately 135 p.m., and entered the Investigations Division. Coffey was asked by SA Wilson to have a seat in Detective Harrison's office for a few minutes and SA Wilson exited the office. The door to Detective Harrison's office was left open and Coffey was alone. Coffey had not been told to remain in the office or that he could not leave if he so desired At ho time was he handcuffed or was he restrained in any manner. Coffey was asked if he wanted something to drink of his choice by Detective Harrison. Coffey indicated that he did not need to use the rest room.

The formal interview of Coffey began at approximately 1:48 p.m., as Detective Harrison asked him personal data relating to his as Detective Harrison asked him personal data relating to his address, height, weight, et cetera. Coffey stated that he is 5'9" tall and weighs 180 pounds.

Coffey was dressed in a sweat shirt jacket, light blue warm-up

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type athletic pants, and a navy winter vest.

The formal interview of Coffey began at approximately 1:48 p.m.

Coffey was again told that investigators appreciated his assistance by consenting to be interviewed on this date. Coffey was also told that he was not under arrest and that if he needed anything he would need to tell investigators. Coffey indicated that he understood this.

Detective Harrison initially asked Coffey personal data questions pertaining to such facts as his full name, date of birth, address, telephone, et cetera. Coffey indicated that he was 5'9" tall and weighed 180 pounds. His Social Security Number is

Coffey stated that he has known Coy since Coy was about 70 years old. Coy is at the ABC Store several times a day. Hazel Byers called and said that Coy was dead. He has never had words (arguments) with Coy.

Yesterday (Thursday, December 8, 1994), he was at the A & P on two occasions. He asked Mr. Swift, the manager, what time it was and he said 3:45 p.m. He said not to be in the A & P or he would call the police.

The last time he saw Coy was at about 3:30 p.m., (Thursday,

The last time he saw Coy was at about 3:30 p.m., (Thursday, December 8, 1994). He had gone by to just tell Coy Merry Christmas. Coy asked him to go to the ABC Store for him and gave Coffey \$3:35 to buy vodka. Coy took the money from his pocket. He did not see a wallet. Coy looked pretty drunk. When he left Coy's trailer, Coy was sitting at his table.

He had Faircloth pick him up at the A & P at about 3:45 p.m., Thursday: He called Faircloth at her home, telephone: 704-262-5408, from the A & P.

While he was at Coy's, Bobby Bragg was there with Joe Cocker, he is not sure of Joe's last name. Joe is a blond headed guy. He doesn't really know Joe and has seen him twice. He used to date his wife. Bobby and Joe actually came up to Coy's trailer as he (Coffey) was leaving. They were walking up towards Coy's. Bobby was wearing one of those long ryder jackets.

When Faircloth picked him up at the A & P, she drove to Blowing

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Rock where they went into Woodlands for a couple of hours. They then went to Ichabod's for an hour or an hour and a half.

He (Coffey) had a couple of hundred dollars on him yesterday. He had done some work for Jeff Greene in Blowing Rock and was paid on Wednesday in the amount of either \$280 or \$286. He was paid in cash. He had met with Greene behind Makotos Restaurant; he can't say about a time, but it was between 9 a.m., and 9:30 a.m. After leaving, he caught a ride in a brown Bronco to Aho Motel and walked the rest of the way to his trailer in Sampson. By Thursday morning he had spent the money and was broke.

He had left Joleen's (phonetic spelling). Richard Rominger stays there sometimes.

He went to the Amoco and bought a 12-pack of Budweiser beer in bottles. He went to Coy's arriving around 11 a.m., and drank with Coy. He drank four or five of the beers, while Coy drank the rest.

He went to the Amoco between 8 a.m., and 10 a.m.

He had been to Attorney Diane Griffin's office that morning. Griffin is working on his disability. He went to set up an appointment for next Tuesday, December 13, 1994, at 11 a.m. (Coffey shows investigators a business card with this date and time.)

At 9 a.m., he caught a ride with Joe Earp from the A & P. Earp gave him a ride to the Golden Pawn, High Country Gold and Pawn. He sold two rings. One of the rings he sold to Earp and the other he pawned.

While walking back from town, while in the vicinity of the McDonald's, two deputies stopped him and served Subpoenas on him to be in court.

He then walked over to Murphy's Restaurant because he left his jacket and a bottle of medicine there. When he got there, Murphy's was not open, but he knocked on the door. A lady let him in and he asked them if they had seen his medicine. His medicine was on the back of the counter, but he didn't get it. He got his jacket and walked to Bojangle's and got a drink.

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Bragg is carrying a white sock containing a chrome trailer hitch and is designed to screw down on a stud for mounting on a bumper. Bragg also carries a knife with a handle like a set of "brass knuckles."

He did not see Bragg hit anyone. Bragg has hit on separate past occasions Doyle Pitts, Roger Winkler, and Louise Coffey (Kenneth's ex-wife). Louise had to get several stitches.

At another point, investigators asked Coffey to repeat details regarding his activities on December 8, 1994. Coffey stated that sometime between 8 a.m., and 10 a.m., he went into the Amoco and bought a 12-pack of beer and took it to Coy's trailer. He drank the beer with Coy. He then went by Richard Rominger's and Joe Lynn's (phonetic spelling). He went uptown getting a ride with Jim Earp to the pawnshop downtown on King Street. He sold a ring to Earp and the owner of the pawnshop for \$10 each. He then went to Diane Griffin's office to set up an appointment with her through her secretary. He has that date and time on the card shown to investigators. That date and time is 11 a.m., on Tuesday, December 13, 1994. While walking back to Coy's, he was stopped by two deputies who served a Subpoena on him to be in court. He was right below McDonald's when the deputies stopped him. By 10:30 a.m., to 11 a.m., he was back at Coy's. It was right before going back to Coy's this time that he stopped at the Amoco and bought the 12-pack of beer in bottles.

He drank four or five beers while Coy drank the rest of them.

Coffey made an admission that he was present when Bobby Bragg assaulted Coy Hartley on Thursday, December 8, 1994. Details of that incident were obtained from Coffey in verbal form.

During this portion of the interview, Coffey stated that he was present when Bobby began hitting Coy in the face with his fists causing Coy to fall back onto the bed in the living room. Bobby then removed a sock containing a silver chrome trailer hitch and began beating coy in the head. During this stage of the assault. Coffey said he saw Coy's wallet fall onto the floor. While Bobby was beating Coy, he (Coy) fell into the floor face down. Bobby was not beating Coy anymore. Bobby got the wallet from the floor. He (Coffey) fled the trailer. SA Wilson asked Coffey to draw and indicate the position of Coy's body on a piece of paper. Coffey was hesitant and pointed to a location on the paper and stated that Coy's head was at the corner of the wall and his feet towards the middle of the living room. The 000023

body was lying beside bed. SA Wilson was aware that Coffey could not read or write based on his earlier reference to this fact. That original piece of paper bearing the sketch drawn by SA Wilson at the direction of Coffey has been retained by SA Wilson in his case file. A copy of the sketch has been made part of this interview report as an attachment.

At approximately 5:40 p.m., SA Wilson asked Coffey if he wanted to take a break. He stated that he would and exited the investigations area to the garage with open bay doors. Kenneth was unattended and returned inside the investigations area at approximately 5:45 p.m.

Coffey's statement was then obtained with SA Wilson taking notes. Coffey stated that he was at Joleen Latty's trailer on Wednesday morning. He went uptown. He got there by getting a ride with Jim Earp. He was taken to the pawnshop on King Street. He sold Jim a ring and the owner a ring for \$10 a piece.

He went to Diane Griffin's office to make an appointment. He left there walking to Murphy's to get his coat and medicine called anabuse (phonetic spelling). He left Murphy's walking to Bojangle's Restaurant to get a soft drink. It was right below McDonald's that the deputies stopped him and served the Subpoena on him. He then walked on to the Amoco and bought the 12-pack

of beer in 12 ounce bottles.

He then walked to Coy's trailer. When he arrived there was no one else there. He stayed with Coy for about an hour or so. He drank four or five beers and left the rest for Coy. He left Coy's and walked to Joleen's trailer (Phillip's Trailer Park). He walked back to Coy's at about 3:30 p.m. Coy asked him to go to the ABC Store. Coy gave him (Coffey) \$3.35 to go and buy Coy some liquor, Popov Vodka, 80 proof. He (Coffey) walked there and returned to the trailer park.

Upon arrival at the intersection of Winter Drive and Greenway Drivey he met Bobby Bragg and Joe (LNU), also known as Pretty Boy Joe supposedly from Mountain City, Tennessee. He told Bragg and Joe that he was going to Coy's to take him his liquor. They do not make conversation and he (Coffey) walks off towards Coy's leaving Bragg and Joe standing there. They then follow him up Winter Drive to Coy's trailer. Why share to the case of the c

Coy had the front door open when he arrived. He (Coffey) goes in the trailer. Bobby and Joe enter behind him. Coy sees Bobby and Joe and says to Bobby to the effect, "Get the hell out of my house you son-of-a-bitch." Bobby and Joe are inside the living room. Bobby then hits Coy in the face with both his fists maybe four or five times. Coy fell onto the bed. Bobby pulled a sock containing a chrome, silver looking trailer ball from his pocket. He (Coffey) has seen this weapon before and knows the sock to contain the trailer ball. He saw it taken from Bobby on this past Monday or Tuesday inside the jail by Danny (Jailer Danny Yates) and a brown headed girl.

Bobby hit Coy in the head with the sock and ball and blood splattered. Bobby only hit Coy with the ball once that he saw and he (Coffey) fled the trailer. It seemed like Bobby was still hitting Coy as he left. Bobby was not backing off. Bobby had got a black leather wallet of Coy's when it fell to the floor when Coy fell onto the bed. Bobby picked up the wallet and put it into his (Bobby) coat pocket that Bobby had on. It was then that Bobby pulled out the sock and hit Coy like he (Coffey) said. That is when he (Coffey) left.

He (Coffey) goes to the A & P and calls Shirley to come and get him. She said she would be there in 20 minutes.

While waiting on Shirley, Bobby and Joe walk up within ten to 15 minutes. Bobby removes Coy's wallet and unzips it. Bobby removed \$260 or so. The money included two \$100 bills, three \$20 bills and one \$5 bill: He does not have any of that money left and spent it last night. He gave Shirley \$20. Bobby told him that if he (Coffey) said anything he (Bragg) and his brothers would kill him. Bobby said to just take the money. He (Coffey) did not want the money, but Bobby threw it at him. Bobby and Joe walked off toward the old Rose's parking lot. ... He does not watch where they go . Shirley shows up and he and . Shirley, go to Woodlands and Ichabod's in Blowing Rock, North Carolina, to eat and drink. He and Faircloth then went to

Faircloth's home for the night.

He changed his clothes and took a shower. He gave his pants, a black T-shirt with something written on the sleeve, and a jacket, a blue and white jacket with writing on the back to Shirley. Shirley said she would wash them because he hadn't changed clothes in four or five days. He never talked to Shirley about what Bobby did. He told Shirley that he got the

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money from his disability check. She thinks he draws disability money. He has not told anyone else about what Bobby did except investigators.

At approximately 6:45 p.m., Coffey is shown the items of clothing seized from Shirley Faircloth's residence by Detective Shook on the afternoon of December 9, 1994. Coffey identifies the clothing as his and as the clothing he had on when the assault of Coy Hartley occurred. When asked about the blood on the jacket and Coffey stated that the blood possibly came from when he (Coffey) cut his finger.

At approximately 6:49 p.m., SA Wilson told Coffey in the presence of Detective Shook, that he was going to read from the notes prepared from details provided to investigators by Coffey. SA Wilson was aware that Coffey could not read based on his indicating so when asked by SA\_Wilson. SA Wilson then read from his notes the details provided by Coffey. SA Wilson asked Coffey if these details were accurate. He said that they were.

SA Wilson then added a written note stating to the effect that. Coffey was not drunk while giving this statement; that he understood the questions and what was going on during the interview and that investigators had not "put words in his mouth." Further that the above details were what he (Coffey) intended to say and is true as reviewed with SA Wilson. Further, that investigators were fair with him. Further, that he (Coffey) has completed the ninth grade in special classes.

SA Wilson read the previous paragraph to Coffey and he stated that he agreed with the contents:

Coffey stated that he would take a polygraph regarding the details provided by him in this statement.

This interview concluded at approximately 7 p.m.

After reviewing the statement, SA Wilson told Coffey that he needed to step out for a minute or so. Coffey stated that he is going back outside "to get some fresh air." Coffey asked if investigators needed anything else and if not, he was going to call his father to come and get him ... Investigators offered to arrange for Coffey a ride and he refused, stating that he would call his father. Coffey then used the telephone in Detective Harrison's office. SA Wilson last saw Coffey as he exited the 

interior of the building to the garage area with open bay doors.

After reviewing the statement, SA Wilson went to the traffic office and conferred with other officers to include Chief. R. Z. Tester, Detective Lieutenant W. S. Watson, Detective Harrison, and Detective Shook. This meeting was outside Coffey's presence and without his knowledge. Investigators also had a telephone conversation with District Attorney James T. Rusher and Assistant District Attorney Gerald Wilson. a free the con-

As stated above, SA Wilson was aware that Coffey had called his father for a ride home and that he had said that he was going to leave. At some point, Detective Shook advised that Coffey had left the building saying he was going to meet his father. SA Wilson nor any other officer made any attempt to stop Coffey or postpone his leaving to the knowledge of SA Wilson. DSW:lj series and the series of the series o

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

Kenneth has known Coy Hartley since he was about 70 years old. Coy is at the ABC Store several times a day. Hazel Byers had called and said that Coy is dead. Asked when last time he saw Coy was about 3:30 PM. Coy gave him \$3.35 to go to the ABC Store and get Coy a bottle of Vodka. Had Shirley Faircloth pick him up at the A & P at 3:45 PM. While at Coy's, Bobby Bragg was there and a Joe Cocker (?), blond headed guy was there, or actually they came up toward Coy's trailer. Doesn't really know Joe; has seen him twice. He used to date his wife. Bobby was wearing one of those long Ryder jackets. Kenneth said that Coy looked pretty drunk and Coy asked him to go to the ABC Store and Coy pulled the money out of his pocket and gave it to him. Kenneth states that he had just went by to say Merry Christmas.
Kenneth said that when he left that Coy was sitting at the table.
Hazel Byer called and told Shirley about Coy. Kenneth states that he never did see a wallet. Shirley's telephone number is 262-5408. Kenneth claims that he never has had any argument with Coy and they've never had any words. Kenneth said that yesterday that he was in A & P twice and he asked Mr. Swift what time it was (3:45) and Mr. Swift told him not be in there or he would call the police. Kenneth claims that he called Shirley from the A & P. Shirley picked him up at the A & P and they went to Woodlands a couple of hours and then to Icabod's for one to one and a half hours. Kenneth was asked how much money he had on him yesterday and he said he had a couple of hundred dollars. Kenneth was asked again about yesterday, December 8th, and he had went to the Amoco and bought a 12-pack of Budweiser beer in the bottles and he had drank it with Coy and he had bought it at the Amoco. He also said that he went and saw Attorney Diane Griffin. Coffey said that at

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
9:00 AM, that he caught a ride with Jim Earp; that Jim had picked him up at the A & P and took him up town to Golden Pawn, (High Country Gold & Pawn); that he sold two (2) rings. That he had to see Diane Griffin because she is working on his disability. Coffey said that he sold one of the rings to Jim Earp and the other ring to the pawn shop.

Coffey claimed that he did some work for Jeff Greene and Jeff had paid him on Wednesday and the amount was either \$280.00 or \$286.00 and he was paid in cash. Coffey claimed that he met with Jeff Greene behind Makoto's Restaurant and he couldn't say what time that it was but then he said between 9:00 and 9:30 AM and by Thursday morning, he had spent the money and he was broke. Coffey was asked where he did the work and he said it was in Blowing Rock. After leaving, Coffey said that he hitched a ride in a brown Bronco to Ahoe Motel and walked the rest of the way down to his trailer in Sampson.

Coffey said that on Thursday after the two deputies had served the subpoena's on him that he walked over to Murphy's Restaurant because he had left a jacket there and a bottle of medicine. When he got to Murphy's, they weren't open but he knocked on the door and a lady let him in and he asked them if they had seen his medicine and he saw a bottle on the back of the counter. He didn't get his medicine but he got his jacket and he walked down to Bojangles and got a drink. Kenneth Coffey said that he bought a twelve pack of beer in the bottles and he drank four or five of them and Coy drank the rest of them.

Kenneth Coffey was asked about Bobby Bragg and he said that Bragg is carrying a trailer hitch ball which is chrome, and it screws down on a stud and Bragg carries it in a white sock. Bragg also carries a knife with a handle like brass knuckles. Coffey was asked if he had seen Bragg hit anyone and Coffey said that Bragg had hit Dole Pitts and a Roger Winkler and Bobby Bragg had also hit Coffey's (estranged) wife, Louise Coffey and she had to get several stitches.

At 1152 hours, we arrived at the SBI office in Hickory. Kenneth and I stayed in the waiting room while Det. Harrison went with SBI Agent J. Jones.

At 1215 hours, Kenneth was taken into SBI Agent Jones' office. I stayed in the waiting room.

At 1445 hours, Agent Jones came into the waiting room and advised Det. Harrison and myself that Kenneth confessed to hitting Coy Hartley, along with Bobby Bragg, and taking money from Coy. Agent Jones also said that Kenneth said that he didn't want to talk to Det. Harrison or Agent Wilson but he wanted to talk to me. I went with SBI Agent J. Jones back to the room where Kenneth was. SBI Agent J. Jones went over what Kenneth told him during the polygraph test. He asked Kenneth if it was correct. He said it was. \*I asked Kenneth what he wanted to talk to me about. Kenneth said that he wanted to tell me what had happened at Coy's trailer. I told him that I was going to write this statement down and he said it was okay. Kenneth then told me what happened. At 1518 hours, I showed the statement to Det. Harrison. He and SBI Agent Jones went back into the office where Kenneth was. I asked him if he wanted to sign the statement. He said that that was the truth but his lawyer told him not to sign anything unless they were there to see it. SBI Agent Jones, Det. Harrison and myself signed the statement. We left the SBI office and took Kenneth Coffey back to the Watauga County Jail.

He had been transported from Central Prison and was presently housed in the Ashe County Jail pending his anticipated testimony in the trial of co-defendant Robert Charles Bragg Bragg s trial began with jury selection on Monday, February 5, 1996, in Watauga County Superior Court in

Boone, North Carolina.

Prior to Coffey's trial and subsequent conviction for the murder of Coy Hartley, he; through his attorney, Robert West, was offered a plea arrangement and which was contingent upon his truthful testimony in future court proceedings. Coffey refused the proposed plea arrangement and opted for a jury trial.

SA Wilson was advised on the afternoon of February 7, 1996, Coffey had requested through jailers to speak with Assistant District Attorney Jerry Wilson. SA Wilson was in turn instructed by Assistant District Attorney Wilson to contact Coffey at the Ashe County Jail instead. Assistant District Attorney Wilson advised Coffey was apparently wanting guarantees from the district attorney's office that his court disposition would be amended if he testified during Bragg's trial. SA Wilson was instructed to hear Coffey's statements and advise Coffey that no promises could be made to him in exchange for his true testimony in court proceedings.

SA Wilson met with Coffey inside the Ashe County Jail and advised him of his Constitutional Rights as they appeared on a Miranda Form. SA Wilson made a check mark beside each right as Coffey indicated he understood that statement. Coffey then signed the form indicating his waiver of his Miranda Rights.

against Bobby Bragg unless he was given a written promise of help in his case and which was signed by a judge. He had heard that Bobby may "walk" if he (Coffey) did not testify. He (Coffey) was already serving time for a guilty man (referring to Bragg) and what difference did it make if he continued doing so. He hoped that Bobby was convicted cause it was not right that he take all this by himself. However, he wanted a promise that he would get some help if he testified. Everybody, including the police and his lawyer, screwed him last time and he got convicted. The police were in on it with his lawyer and as much at fault for his being convinced he would be found not guilty. He was not going to do anything to help the prosecution now after what happened to him.

SA Wilson told Coffey he nor the district attorney's office could make him any promises. It was the state's desire that he, like any witness, testify truthfully regarding his knowledge of Hartley's murder if and when he was called to do so. SA Wilson also told Coffey that no one on the prosecution's side, including SA Wilson and other investigators, ever told him anything that was not the truth. The only thing he was ever encouraged to do by SA Wilson or other investigators was tell the truth regarding the murder of Coy Hartley and for the simple reason that telling the truth was the right thing to do. Coffey was also told that law enforcement nor anyone from the district attorney's office was involved in the decision by he and his attorney to require a jury trial. SA Wilson stated all he could tell Coffey was that he should be truthfullif he was called to attorney's office was involved in the decision by he and his attorney to require a jury trial. SA Wilson stated all he could tell Coffey was that he should be truthful if he was called to testify in court and that no promises could be made to him regardless of what he did or did not do in the future.

# **Bragg Interview & Arrest**

Bragg was arrested on Saturday, December 10, 1994 and interviewed in Mountain City, TN. This was the only statement that Bragg provided to law enforcement. The report of the interview with Bragg is included below. Bragg (and others) reference the arrest of James "Jay" Manuel on Wednesday, December 7, 1994. An arrest report and jail records for Manuel's arrest are included below.

Bragg appeared to do this. At the conclusion of SA Wilson reading each right, Bragg's verbal response was indicated in the right hand column. After being advised of his Miranda Rights, SA Wilson read the lower paragraph containing a waiver of those rights. SA Wilson told Bragg that if he wished to waive his Miranda Rights and talk with investigators, he should indicate same by placing his signature on the form. Bragg's signature was witnessed in writing by SA Wilson and Detective Harrison.

Bragg then made the following statement:

Bragg went to the residence of Coy Hartley on Tuesday night, December 6, 1994, at approximately 7 or 8 p.m. He asked Coy if he could spend the night there and Coy agreed. Coy lives in a mobile home in Greenway Trailer Park (in Boone, North Carolina) He went to the store for Coy Hartley and purchased a six-pack of Bud beer and a loaf of bread. He also went to Joe's (LNU). He then returned to Coy Hartley's mobile home. He and Coy ate supper together at the trailer. erret in the second of the sec

They both went to bed sometime between 10 p.m., and midnight. He (Bragg) slept on the couch and Hartley was in his bed. At about 3 a.m., Kenneth Coffey arrived. Coffey spent the rest of the night. Coffey never did go to bed. He (Bragg) and Coffey sat up and talked the rest of the night; they did not go back to sleep. Bragg played the guitar. Hartley slept and did not get up.

He (Bragg) left the next morning about 6 to 6:30 a.m. He and Kenneth Coffey walked to the A & P grocery store, which opened at 7 a.m. He and Coffey bought two bottles of wine. The manager of the grocery store asked Coffey if he had been in jail lately. When they left the grocery store, Coffey and Bragg stood beside the A & P building and drank the wine and talked until 10 or 11 a.m.

Coffey and Bragg then walked to a guy named Henry's (last name unknown, is German) residence, which is a blue and white mobile home located on the last row in Greenway Trailer Park. While they were at Henry's, Coffey called Joleen (LNU) to say that Bragg could not come there. Coffey stayed at Henry's, but Bragg left.

Bragg then took the Appalcart bus up to the Harris-Teeter grocery store. There he saw Gary and Darlene Edwards who works at the Harris-Teeter. Gary and Darlene had the motor running in their vehicle. Gary gave Bragg a ride at about 3 or 4 p.m. Bragg rode with Gary to 112 Walen Street in Mountain City, Tennessee. It may have been earlier than 3 to 4 p.m., when they left Boone. He was in Mountain City by 4 or 5 p.m.

Bragg arrived at 112 Walen Street which is a mobile home. James Manuel, who lives in that mobile home, was present. Bragg asked James if he could stay there for a couple of days. James agreed. Bragg left Boone because he was "tired of being harassed by the police." Bragg did not stay with Kenneth Coffey because Coffey was always getting Bragg into trouble.

(At 10:38 p.m., investigators asked Bragg if he wanted to take a

(At 10:38 p.m., investigators asked Bragg if he wanted to take a break from the interview, and he said yes. Bragg was allowed to go use the rest room at this time. Interview continued at 10:41 p.m., by SA Wilson.)

On Thursday, December 8, 1994, at 4 or 5 p.m., Bragg got with Judy (LNU), who lives in Mountain City.

On Wednesday night, John Shumake was with Jackie (LNU), at Jay's (LNU). John and Jackie left. Later, Bragg and Jay walked to the Town and Country bar and store in Mountain City. Somewhere during this time, he and Jay got separated.

Bragg walked by himself to the 24-hour store and bought a hamburger. He learned that the police later arrested Jay. So Bragg waited out on the street in Mountain City for Jay to get out of the Johnson County Jail. He and Jay then went back to Jay's residence. Big John (John Shumake) and Jackie later arrived at Jay's residence. John got into the residence with a key. John has a key to Jay's residence even though he does not live there are them. Bragg then went to his brother's residence with some friends, whose names he does not recall. There are three guys who knew his nephew. Bragg could not recall what they were driving, except that it was a two-door car, about six years old, he'd say the size was average. He thinks the car was light colored, but is not sure. To him, Fords and Chevrolets all look alike.

The three guys range were approximately 18, 18, and 25 years old. Bragg does not know their names. The oldest, approximately 25 years old, is 5.8" to 5.9", 150-160 pounds, has medium length straight dark hair, has no mustache, does not wear glasses, and was wearing jeans. The second guy, approximately 18 years old, was 5'7" to 5'8", about 200 pounds, had brownish curly hair that was not over his ears, had no facial hair, and was wearing blue jeans and some type of shirt. The third guy was about 18 years old, was 5'7" to 5'8", was slim, about 140-150 pounds, and can't say much more about him because he was sitting in the back seat of their vehicle along with the other 18 year old.

BLAVE YES THE SERVENCE These three guys took Bragg to his brother's residence, James "Jim" Bragg, who lives alone. Jim's phone number is 615-727-4360. Jim works at the Levi Strauss Company in Mountain City. They got to Jim's about 9:30 or 10 p.m. Jim had not gone to bed yet. Jim was watching a Clint Eastwood movie. Paul (LNU) came up to Jim's, and they sat and talked in the basement. They went to bed around 11 p.m., or midnight.

He played some songs and he and Judy walked back to Jay's house.

He, no wait. . .

When he left the General Store, he walked to the big Baptist Church on Main Street. He was wanting to go to Shady Valley to see his sister. A woman inside the church gave him a \$10 gas voucher. He then walked up to Jay's and got his guitar. It was then that he walked to Judy's. Now he is back on course with the details.

He and Jay walk to the store and run into Al. They ask Al if he would give them a ride to the Big Chief store if they gave him \$2 or \$3 for gas. Al put \$10 worth of gas in his pickup truck, paid with the \$10 gas voucher, and gave Bragg \$7 back. This is a routing way to get money using the church's gas vouchers. He agrees that this results in occasions that the church actually pays for an alcoholic's beer or other alcoholic drinks.

Al drove Bragg and Jay to the Big Chief store. Bragg bought two 12-packs of beer using the money he had gotten from the gas voucher. Al then drove Bragg and Jay back to Jay's where they sat around drinking and playing the guitar. Judy came back and

forth from her house to Jay's. John Shumake also came by.
At about 1:30 or 2 p.m., John asked Bragg and Jay if they wanted to go to John's house, which is on Highway 421 in Mountain City. Jackie had a car and drove them to John's place. They sat around and sang and drank beer. They ran out of beer. Some guy arrived with a load of firewood. Bragg and Jay unloaded the firewood. The man then drove Bragg and Jay to the shopping center in Mountain City to pawn his guitar. This was about 3 or 3:30 p.m. The pawn shop refused; however, because they already had two of Bobby's things. They left and returned to Jay's.

Bragg decided that he wanted to sell his watch. So Jay took Bobby's watch to some "niggers" in the trailer park, who bought the watch for \$10. They ("niggers") live a couple of trailers the watch for \$10. They ("niggers") live a couple of trailers down,

000033 Then Bragg and Jay got a ride from a guy next door. The guy does not live there, but his mother does. The guy drives a big white Lincoln. The guy drove Jay and Bragg to the Big Chief. Bragg bought two more 12-packs of beer with the \$10. They then returned to Jay's.

They continued to drink and Judy came back over. Jackie came back with the kids and John. They all played and sang until sometime between 8 and 10 p.m. They went to bed between 11 p.m., and midnight, right after John and Jackie left. Bragg slept with Judy in the middle room. Bragg did not leave during the night.

Bragg changed his socks because they were dirty and wet from a leak in his shoes. Bragg stepped in a mud puddle in the driveway at Jim's. Bragg asked Jim if it had rained. Jim said the puddle came from a leak in something. Bobby's socks may be on the porch. Judy told Bragg she would wash his socks. He told her she could just throw them away. They were plain white socks. Judy should remember this.

(Between 11:47 p.m., and 12:01 a.m., a break is taken for Bragg to use the rest room and receive a Pepsi after the offer is made by SA Wilson.)

Bragg last saw Joe Lee Cothron in June 1994. Cothron was in Boone and drinking a lot, for two or three days. His understanding was that Cothron left Boone and went to Bristol, and then to West Virginia to see his sister, Phyllis. Bragg has not seen Cothron since then. Everyone in Boone calls Cothron Pretty Boy Joe, because he keeps his hair combed and sometimes shaved. Cothron is from Wilkesboro. He goes to Coy Hartley's a lot. He comes from Wilkesboro and stays with Coy if he's drinking.

(At 12:56 p.m., Bragg was offered and took another rest room break.)

Bragg stated, "I ain't killed nobody. I was here since

Bragg stated, "I ain't killed nobody. I was here since Wednesday, I'm innocent." Bragg was provided with SA Wilson's business card and told to contact investigators if he wished. Bragg was returned to his jail cell at 1:25 a.m., concluding the interview.

Linda said that she remembers Thursday and she takes every Thursday off and when Jeffrey comes in from school, he has to do his homework first, or he doesn't go outside and play. Linda walked up to her mom's and got her sister, Beverly, age 21, and she got Beverly to come down to her trailer while she went to day care (Rainbow Pre-school) which is on Winklers Meadow and the time was between 4:50 and 5:00 PM. Linda states that she was gone maybe ten (10) minutes and she was back home. A few minutes later, Linda stated that Jeffrey had called her outside and Jeffrey told her that he wanted to know why that damn old Kenneth Coffey and Big Bob were following him (Coy) up the road and Jeffrey wouldn't shut up until she came outside and she saw Kenneth Coffey and the guy that she knows as Big Bob (that's the name that the boys used in the neighborhood). Linda said Coy was almost at his trailer and Bobby was saying something "ain't that right", "ain't that right, you son-of-a-bitch, Coy", and Kenneth Coffey was laughing and you could tell they were drunk. Linda said that Jeffrey got on his bike and he (Jeffrey) told her that he saw them go into the house. Linda states that she also saw Big Bob swinging something in his right hand and it had something round in it and the sock was dark in color and he had some kind of coat on that came past his waist and the color was a tanish-green. Kenneth was wearing something like a dark flannel shirt and the flannel shirt was tied around his waist and Kenneth was wearing a thermal shirt which was white in color.

Linda states that she later saw the police cars up at Coys and her mother told her that Coy either had a heart attack or stroke and he was dead. On Friday morning, Mr. Steve Wilson came by her trailer and he was from the SBI and Linda states that she told Mr. Wilson that she saw Kenneth Coffey but when Mr. Wilson told her that there had been a murder, she was too scared to say anything else. Linda said that she has known Kenneth Coffey about two years and Kenneth and his girlfriend named Rhonda got evicted by Mike Garlock and Kenneth thought she had said something to Mike and the time was around this

past July and Kenneth came over to her trailer, banging on it and he said he knew that she had called Mike and he would beat her god damn brains out and if she didn't stop fucking with them, they would beat the fuck out of her. She called her landlord and told himthis and they were run out of the trailer park within a couple of weeks. Linda said that she saw yesterday's newspaper, Watauga Democrat, and it was Big Bob. Linda said that she saw Bob walking back and forth up to Coy's before.

Jeffrey Nelson states that he goes to Hardin Park School and he went to school last Thursday. Jeffrey says that he remembers the day and he said that he was outside playing and he saw an ambulance and police car go up the road to where Coy Hartley lives; that he watched up the road for a while and he went inside and took a bath and then he said he put his shoes on and he went outside with his grandmother, Linda Wilcox.

Jeffrey remembers coming home after school and he said that he rides bus number 40 and he generally gets home at about 3:12 to 3:15 PM everyday. Jeffrey said that he went into the house and he had to do his math and weekly essentials and read. Jeffrey said that he can't recall what he had to read and he said that it didn't take him long to finish his homework. Some days, Jeffrey has to change clothes but he didn't on this day. Also, Jeffrey said that he went outside and he and some of his friends (Eddie Jones, Nick Gray, Steve Jones and Thomas Pope). Eddie lives in the trailer park with his dad, Harold Jones. Steven doesn't live in the trailer park because Steve lives with his mother out in Vilas. They were all playing soccer in Jeffrey's yard and he saw Coy go walking up the road and he saw Coy with his cane in his right hand and it just looked like a wooden stick. Jeffrey said that he saw two men come walking by when Coy was about halfway to his trailer. Jeffrey said that he knows their names because they go up to Coy's trailer all the time and their names are Kenneth Coffey and Bobby Bragg and everyone calls Bobby "Big Bob". Jeffrey said he is sure about these two men but he's not sure about what they were wearing but Bobby had something hanging out of his pants in the front that kind of looked like a stick. Jeffrey says that he saw them go up Coy's steps and open the screen door and Jeffrey says that he went back down the road and he stated that he never did see them leave Coy's trailer.

Interview with Linda Rene Nelson, WF, DOB: 11-14-69, at approximately 8:15am on Friday, December 9, 1994 at her residence in the Greenway Trailer Park, Lot #120, Boone, North Carolina, by SA D. S. Wilson:

She saw a lot of different kinds of people up at Coy Hartley's trailer.

Yesterday, sometime after 3:00pm but before she left to go to the day care at about 5:15pm, it was before dark, she saw Kenneth Coffey come out of Hartley's yard. He was walking fast toward Greenway Drive and looking wild. He did not say anything. He knows not to say anything to her. She does not like him and she thinks he is "trash."

Kenneth was wearing possibly a dark color flannel shirt or jacket. She does not recall any other of his clothing.

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
# V. Forensic Analysis

Several items of evidence were collected. Some of these items were submitted to the NC SBI Crime Laboratory for forensic analysis during the initial investigation. Blood analysis was conducted on items of clothing collected from Bragg and items of clothing collected from Coffey. The presence of human blood was revealed on the jacket and jeans of Coffey. Analysis of the remaining items of clothing from Coffey failed to reveal the presence of blood. All items of clothing from Bragg failed to reveal the presence of blood. Follow-up DNA testing of cuttings from the areas from which blood was detected on Coffey's jacket and jeans revealed a DNA profile. No DNA banding pattern other than that of Coffey was obtained from the cutting from Coffey's jacket and the cutting from Coffey's jeans.<sup>4</sup>


Nine latent prints were lifted from the Popov Vodka bottle found at the Victim's residence. Of those, one was determined to be an identifiable latent fingerprint. The SBI Crime Laboratory compared that print to the prints of the Victim, Bragg, Coffey and two employees of the ABC store who were working the day of the crime and handled the bottle during Coffey's purchase. All five individuals were excluded as matching this print. The print remains unidentified.

# VII. Private Investigation

# Timeline - Boone, NC

This timeline is intended to provide a detailed outline of what individuals observed in Boone, NC between December 6, 1994 and December 10, 1994, as they relayed that information to Private Investigator Jerry Vaughn.<sup>5</sup>

12/08/1994 2:00-2:30 PM	According to a 01/05/1995 Tony Triplett interview, he saw the Victim around 2:00-2:30 PM on Thursday, 12/08/1994, walking toward his trailer from the ABC store.
12/08/1994 3:00-4:00 PM	According to a 01/19/1995 Rhonda Carson interview, she was not with Coffey, but had seen him at the A & P. She stated that she did not see Bragg that day.
12/08/1994 5:45 PM	According to a 01/05/1995 Betty Triplett interview, she went to the A & P around 5:45 PM and saw Coffey sitting on the bench. She did not see Bragg anywhere that day.
12/08/1994	According to a 02/16/1995 Vaughn interviewed Nancy Horton and wrote "earlier in the day (12 08 94 ?) she had seen Bobby walking toward Coy's trailer carrying a beer in brown paper bag (this could have been on Tuesday 12 06 94). That on Thurs 12 08 94 Nancy had been to school

Nancy did see Kenneth Coffey in the trailer park 2 or 3 times that day (12 08 94) but he was alone. Nancy took Renee to the Rainbow Day-Care (Winklers Meadow Rd) at about 4:50 to 5:00 PM. That Rene talked with "Missy" Hampton about 15 to 20 minutes and they (Nancy, Renee & kids) arrived back at Nancy's trailer about 5:15-5:20 PM. Nancy said that shortly after the police/ambulance arrived at Coy's trailer Renee and Jeff came out of their trailer and to Nancy's yard asking "what's happened?" Nancy said she did "not" see Jeff playing in the street nor did she see Bobby and Kenneth following Coy toward his trailer."

## Timeline - Mountain City, TN

This timeline is intended to provide a detailed outline of when and where individuals in Mountain City, TN saw Bragg between December 7, 1994 and December 10, 1994, as they relayed that information to Private Investigator Jerry Vaughn.<sup>6</sup>

# VIII. Coffey Trial

### Introduction

Coffey's trial was held during the November 27, 1995 Session of Criminal Superior Court in Watauga County. The trial judge was the Honorable James U. Downs. The State was represented by Gerald Wilson, Assistant District Attorney. Coffey was represented by Robert West.<sup>8</sup>

#### State's Case

#### **Larry and Debbie Grimes**

Larry Grimes testified that at approximately 6:30 PM on Thursday, December 8, 1994 he walked up to his neighbor's (the Victim) house, to take him a plate of food, which he did whenever he and his wife Debbie had leftovers. He knocked on the door and did not get an answer. Mr. Grimes opened the unlocked door and went inside. As he turned to leave after setting the food on the table, Mr. Grimes saw the Victim lying face down on the floor of the living room near his bed, which was also in the living room. Mr. Grimes called out the Victim's name, put his hand on the Victim's lower back, and shook him. Mr. Grimes received no response. He left, went home, and told his wife that he thought something was wrong. 9

Debbie Grimes testified that after her husband came back from the Victim's trailer and told her that something had happened to the Victim, she went to the Victim's trailer. She found the Victim wedged in the corner of his living room, lying face down, with his hands by his side, and his palms facing up. Ms. Grimes went to the Victim, knelt down, shook the Victim's back, and asked if he was okay. The Victim did not respond. Ms. Grimes touched the Victim's forehead with her hand, then checked his hand for a pulse. She did not find a pulse in his hand and then checked for one in his neck. She did not find a pulse. Ms. Grimes then touched the Victim's face. When she took her hand away, it was filled with blood. Ms. Grimes instructed her husband to call 911 and remained with the Victim.<sup>10</sup>

#### First Responders

Officer Keith Ward of BPD testified that at 6:42 PM, he was called to the Victim's residence in reference to a possible dead on arrival. Officer Ward arrived at the scene within two minutes, following the ambulance up to the residence.<sup>11</sup>

EMTs Matt Williams and Gary Taylor accompanied Officer Ward into the home. A few seconds afterward, Lieutenant Curtis Main entered the trailer.<sup>12</sup> The EMTs checked for a pulse and determined that he had no pulse, was not breathing, and had already expired. The EMTs did not move the body.<sup>13</sup> Officer Ward secured the crime scene.<sup>14</sup> Detective Harrison and Detective Shook arrived on the scene at approximately 7:21 PM.<sup>15</sup> The EMTs left the home at

approximately 7:55 PM to allow investigators to complete their investigation prior to moving the body. 16

In addition to the Victim's body, Detective Harrison testified that he observed blood on the curtains above the Victim's bed, the bed, and the pillow. He also observed blood droplets on the linoleum. He located a BB or pellet gun and a toy gun under one of the pillows on the bed. He further testified that he did not find any signs of forced entry into the trailer.<sup>17</sup>

At approximately 7:40 PM, Doctor Brent Hall, the pathologist for Watauga County arrived at the Victim's home. According to Detective Harrison's testimony, Dr. Hall requested that the body be sent to the pathology lab once investigators were done taking photographs and measurements.<sup>18</sup>

The EMTs arrived back on the scene at approximately 9:57 PM to remove the body.

Upon rolling the body over, they noted severe wounds to the Victim's face and head. The EMTs removed the Victim from the home and transported him to the Watauga Medical Center

Morgue for the Medical Examiner's investigation and autopsy. 19

Crime scene photographs were taken by detectives during the initial investigation.

Several of these photographs were entered at trial; however, the Clerk's office has produced a Court Order showing that the trial exhibits were previously destroyed. All quality crime scene

photographs that the Commission obtained from BPD are included in the investigation section above.<sup>20</sup>

#### Autopsy

Dr. Hall testified that he performed an autopsy on the Victim at 10:30 PM on Thursday, December 8, 1994. Detective Harrison was there for the entirety of the autopsy. Dr. Hall and Detective Harrison removed the clothing of the Victim. Dr. Hall testified to the wounds he observed on the Victim's body and showed photographs of the injuries to the jury. Dr. Hall determined the cause of death to be blunt traumatic injury to the head. He estimated the time of death to be within the range of two to six hours as of 10:30 PM on Thursday, December 8, 1994.<sup>21</sup> Although not entered as an exhibit at trial, please see the autopsy below for a description of the wounds to the Victim. Several photographs taken by Dr. Hall which illustrate the injuries to the Victim are included below.

The left anterior descending coronary tery shows focal 25% stenosis by atherosclerotic plaque. The left cumflex and right coronary arteries are free of significant atherosclerotic descending coronary artery. Sectioning demonstrates mild left ventricular hypertrophy and dilatation as well as moderate atherosclerosis of the mitral and aortic valves. The cardiac valves, cardiac chambers and myocardium are otherwise unremarkable. The aorta shows moderate atherosclerosis with focal calcification.

Neck: The thyroid is of usual size and configuration. The hyoid bone and thyroid cartilage are intact. The larynx and upper tract are unremarkable.

Respiratory tract: Lungs: Right weight-760 grams, left weight-640 grams. The lower trachea and major bronchi are unremarkable. Sectioning demonstrates mild congestion.

Gastrointestinal tract: The gastrointestinal tract is intact throughout its length. The stomach contains approximately 100 cc of partially digested food. Unusual odor is not detected. The appendix is present. The large bowel contains a moderate amount of semisolid stool.



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# **Detective Jim Harrison**

Detective Harrison testified that he had been in law enforcement for 21 years.<sup>22</sup>

Detective Harrison testified about his role in the initial investigation at the crime scene. This included taking photographs and measurements as well as noting his observations.<sup>23</sup> He further testified about interviews that he conducted in connection with the homicide including those with Coffey, Rene Nelson, and Jeffery Nelson, among others.<sup>24</sup> See statements in law enforcement investigative section above.

On cross examination Detective Harrison testified that a conversation occurred among law enforcement officers about the description of an individual given by Nancy Horton during her initial interview. "From that information obtained, we knew that your client and Mr. Bragg were associates and they did run together." Around 5:00 AM on Friday, December 9, 1994, Detective Shook began trying to obtain photographs of Coffey and Bragg. Thereafter they began looking for Coffey and Bragg as they believed they were together. 26

Detective Shook further testified on cross examination that at around 8:00 AM, he and Agent Wilson began canvassing the trailer park where the Victim lived.<sup>27</sup> "We interviewed several people. A lot of people had claimed they didn't – at that particular point in time – claimed that they had not seen or heard anything. It was later that we learned that your client

and Mr. Bragg had been seen on the evening of December 8<sup>th</sup>."<sup>28</sup> Detective Harrison testified that he interviewed Coffey for five hours.<sup>29</sup>

As a result of this interview given by Mr. Coffey, he had implicated Mr. Bobby Bragg as being at the residence of the deceased, Coy Hartley. He, Mr. Coffey, had indicated that Mr. Bragg had hit Mr. Hartley with a trailer hitch ball. He indicated that he carried it in a sock; that Mr. Bragg had picked up a billfold and your client, Mr. Coffey, claimed that at some point in time that he ran. As a result of that information we contacted the district attorneys, Mr. Rusher and Mr. Wilson, to confer with them on our findings.<sup>30</sup>

Detective Harrison testified on that same day, a warrant was issued for Bragg. Bragg was arrested on Saturday, December 10, 1994 in Mountain City, TN. Detective Harrison interviewed Bragg. Bragg stated that he was in Mountain City, TN when the crime took place.<sup>31</sup> Detective Harrison testified that he interviewed Coffey again on January 6, 1994, and as a result of that interview, he swore out a warrant for Coffey's arrest for first-degree murder.<sup>32</sup>

# **Agent Steve Wilson**

Agent Wilson testified that he was a Special Agent with the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation and that he participated in the investigation of the death of the Victim.<sup>33</sup> He testified that he participated in a search of the Victim's home for money and that no money was located. He further testified that he located and interviewed Coffey on Friday, December 9, 1994.<sup>34</sup> Agent Wilson testified that during this interview, Coffey gave inconsistent

statements, giving one version of events and subsequently giving another version of events later in the interview.<sup>35</sup> At the conclusion of the interview, Coffey was allowed to leave.<sup>36</sup>

On cross examination, Agent Wilson testified that he accompanied Detective Shook to Shirley Faircloth's home after the interview with Coffey in an attempt to locate the clothing that Coffey was wearing on the evening of Thursday, December 8, 1994.<sup>37</sup> When asked whether he had found the clothes, Agent Wilson responded, "Yes, sir, apparently we did based on the description he had given us and indeed did later acknowledge that those, that the clothing that we had with us at the police department was in fact the clothing that he had had on and had worn."<sup>38</sup>

# **Jeffrey Nelson**

Jeffrey Nelson was called to testify about his recollection of events that occurred on Friday, December 8, 1994. His entire testimony is included below. Please note that portions of the copy of the transcript that the Commission was able to obtain from the North Carolina Supreme Court were illegible when printed from the microfilm machine. As such, some pages have been retyped by Commission staff.

# **Rene Nelson**

Rene Nelson was called to testify about her recollection of events that occurred on Friday, December 8, 1994. Her entire testimony is included below. Please note that portions of the copy of the transcript that the Commission was able to obtain from the North Carolina Supreme Court were illegible when printed from the microfilm machine. As such, some pages have been retyped by Commission staff.

THE STATE: Thank you, Jeffrey, you may step down. Renee Nelson.

RENEE NELSON, being first duly sworn, testified as follows during DIRECT EXAMINATION by the STATE:

- Q: Tell us your name, please, ma'am.
- A: Renee Nelson.
- Q: Ms. Nelson, do you know the young man who just testified?
- A: Yes, sir.
- Q: How do you know him?
- A: He's my son.
- Q: Ms. Nelson, you can pull that mike. I had it down for him and you can pull it up a bit if you need
- to.
- A: Okay.
- Q: Ms. Nelson, where do you and your son live?
- A: 120 Winter Drive.
- Q: Now, well, you told us, who else lives there with you?
- A: My two daughters and my other son.

Q: How long have you and your family lived there at 121 Winter Drive?

A: 120.

Q: I'm sorry. 120 Winter Drive.

A: About three years.

Q: Ma'am, did you know at the time where Coy Hartley lived?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: In relation to your home, where was that?

A: All the way to the other end of the street.

Q: Let me show you, ma'am, a photograph marked as State's Exhibit #8. It's been earlier testified that this photograph was taken from your yard towards Coy Hartley's trailer. Does that fairly and accurately depict a scene from your yard towards Mr. Hartley's trailer?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: All right. Now, ma'am, do you recall that day that Mr. Hartley was killed?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: Do you recall what day of the week that was?

A: It was on Thursday.

Q: All right. Ma'am, your older son, Jeffrey, had he been to school on that day?

A: Yes.

Q: Do you know what time he got home?

A: Around 3:15, 3:30, somewhere around there.

Q: All right. Now, your other younger daughters, do they, your other younger children, do they – were they at the time attending some school somewhere?

A: Rainbow Preschool.

Q: Okay. Now, what time was the Rainbow Preschool over that you had to pick up your children there?

A: You had to pick tm up by 5:30.

MR. WEST: Objection to leading.

THE COURT: Overruled.

Q: About what?

A: 5:30.

Q: Around 5:30. Ma'am, did you at the time have an automobile or transportation?

A: No, sir.

Q: Who did you depend on for transportation?

A: My great aunt.

Q: Does she- where does she live?

A: She lives on the same street I do.

Q: After Jeffery got home, ma'am, did you make some preparations, what preparations did you make to, first of all, what did you require Jeffrey to do upon his arrival home?

A: He can't even go out the door unless he does his homework.

Q: Do you know whether or not he did his homework on that days?

A: Yes, sir, he did.

Q: Do you know how long it took him?

A: Thirty minutes maybe.

Q: What did he do after he did his homework?

A: He went outside and played because one of his friend's Eddie Jones, come to get him to go out and play soccer.

Q: Do you have some concept, ma'am, of about what time that was?

A: 4:15 maybe.

Q: Now, did you make some arrangements thereafter to go pick up your other children?

A: Yes.

Q: Tell us what you did?

A: Well, my aunt always, always takes me to get my other three children anywhere between a quarter till and 5:00 o'clock every day. I went up to get my sister, Beverly, to come down and sit with Jeffery so I could go get them. He's – I mean he's responsible enough to be alone, but I don't like to leave him alone.

Q: All right.

A: And I was gone maybe ten or fifteen minutes.

Q: When you came back to the trailer, it would have been around what time, ma'am?

A: About 5:00

Q: Did you leave to go pick up your other children?

A: Yes.

Q: Prior to that, had you seen – prior to the time you left to go pick up your other children, where was your son, Jeffery?

A: In the yard.

Q: Had you at that point seen Coy Hartley?

A: Yes, Jeffrey was screaming for me because....

MR. WEST: Objection to leading.

THE COURT: Overruled.

A: Can I Answer?

THE COURT: Wait just a minute. When he objects, don't try to answer.

A: Okay.

THE COURT: Too much going on at one time.

A: Okay.

THE COURT: Overruled. Now, answer the question.

Q: What time did you hear Jeffrey hollering for you?

A: It was sometime between...

MR. WEST: Objection to leading.

THE COURT: Overruled.

Q: Ma'am, what time did you hear Jeffrey hollering for you?

A: It was between a quarter till 5:00 and 5:00.

Q: Okay, now, we're talking about p.m. here, is that right?

A: Yes.

Q: Where were you when you heard him?

A: In my house.

Q: What did he say if you remember?

A: He was screaming for me to come outside and he wanted to know why that Kenneth and Bobby were cussing. "That damned old Coy," was his exact words.

Q: Ma'am did you know at that time Bobby Bragg?

A: I know who he was. I had seen him in there before.

A: Did you know Kenneth Coffey?

A: Yes.

Q: Had you known, while you were there, Coy Hartley?

A: Did I know what?

Q: Did you know Coy Hartley?

A: Yes.

Q: Did you, in fact, go outside, ma'am?

A: Yes.

Q: When you went outside, where did you find your son?

A: Looking up the road.

Q: Who else did you see outside?

A: Well, mine and the other children, I saw the other children and I saw Coy walking up the road.

Q: Where was he, ma'am?

A: He was maybe two trailers up from me, but he was still walking.

Q: Did he have anything in his hands?

A: He had an old cane like thing.

Q: Had you seen his walking before?

A: Yes.

Q: Did he on occasion have a cane with him?

A: Yes. I didn't think he was able to walk without it. I didn't know if he was so drunk that he couldn't or he just wasn't able, but he always had it.

Q: Coy consumed alcohol, did he not, ma'am?

A: Yes.

Q: Did you see other persons behind him?

A: Yes, sir, I did.

Q: Who did you see behind him?

A: Kenneth Coffey and Bobby Bragg.

Q: What were they doing?

A: Cussing him.

Q: What were they saying, ma'am, if you recall?

A: I couldn't hear exactly what Kenneth was saying, if anything, but Bobby was looking at Kenneth and saying,

"Ain't that right." But he was saying it toward Coy. He was calling him a son of a bitch and things.

Q: Calling Coy a son of a bitch?

A: Yes.

Q: Did you see anything in either of Kenneth Coffey or Bobby Braggs hands?

MR. WEST: Objection to leading.

THE COURT: Overruled.

Q: Did you see anything in either of their hands?

A: Yes.

Q: What did you see?

A: I saw in Bobby's hand, he had a long dark object, kind of like a sock and it had something heavy in it because the sock was dragging.

Q: How far behind Coy were they when you saw them?

A: It was twenty or thirty foot.

Q: Did Coy look back at them or respond to them in anyway?

A: He never answered tem, but as he was walking, he would look just over his shoulder. Look back over his shoulder and keep going.

Q: What happened – excuse me. What happened then, Ms. Nelson?

A: Well, I kind of just ignored it because I mean I just figured he was drunk and they were just aggravating

Him. So, I went on up to my sister's and got her to come and sit with Jeffrey so I could go get my other children from day care.

- Q: Did you see about what time would this have been, ma'am?
- A: Between 4:45 and 5:00.
- Q: Did you see what your son did? Did he leave your yard?
- A: Yeah, he stood in the road to see them go up the street and he got his bicycle and he said, "I'm going to go up there and see what they're doing."
- Q: Do you know where he went to?
- A: When they got in Coy's yard. I could pretty much see the beginning of their yard there from my house.
- Q: Who did you see go into Coy's yard?
- A: Kenneth and Bobby and Coy.
- Q: At that point, how far ahead of Kenneth, Kenneth Coffey and Bobby Bragg and Coy.
- A: Twenty or thirty feet. Two trailer lengths.
- Q: Ma'am, I believe you said you went to get your sister Beverly, to watch your children?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: Did you do that?

A: Yes, sir, but my mom lives two trailers up form me. It took a minute to get from my yard up to her trailer and up to my sister's handicapped ramp.

Q: What did you do after you went to get your sister?

A: I went to my aunt's, just lives right across the street and went and got my other children.

Q: What time did you arrive back home, ma'am?

A: About 5:00. It didn't take but just a couple of minutes.

Q: Where is the Rainbow Preschool? Where is it?

A: On the same street I live. It's just – it on Winkler's Meadow. It's just right at the road.

Q: Later, did you remain at your residence the remainder of that night?

A: Yes.

Q: Did you later – were you later – did you later see emergency vehicles going into your road?

A: I saw an ambulance and some police cars – well, at first, I saw the police cars and then I saw an ambulance and my mom come and told me that they were up there. I didn't actually see them go up the road, no, cause she said that Coy had a heart attack or a stroke or something. That someone had told her he was dead.

Q: About what time was that you found out Cory was dead?

A: I honestly don't remember. It had to have been close to dark though, but I honestly don't remember what time.

Q: Did you later talk with someone, ma'am, about the events that you've described here to the jury?

A: Yes.

Q: When was that?

A: The next morning, I talked with – I don't remember what his name was, but he was from the SBI. I that his last name was Wilson.

Q: Okay, someone named Wilson from the SBI. Did you tell him – what did you – did you tell him what you've told us here today?

A: Some of it. I was kind of afraid to talk to him.

Q: Why were you afraid, ma'am?

A: Because I really didn't want to get involved. I was scared.

Q: Do you know whether or not the Wilson from the SBI talked with your son??

A: I think that Jeffrey was at school.

Q: Did you later, after the next morning, did you talk with someone?

A: Yes.

Q: Who did you talk with then?

A: Detective Mark Shook and Jim Harrison.

Q: The two gentlemen seated here to my right?

A: Um-um.

Q: When was that, Ms. Nelson, that you talked with them?

A: One afternoon. I don't remember what day it was.

Q: Okay. It was how long after Coy's death?

A: Just a day or two.

Q: A day or two, and what did you tell them, ma'am?

A: That I had seen Kenneth and Bobby go up the road after Coy and that they were cussing him.

Q: Did you tell them what you've told us here today?

A: Yes.

Q: Did someone, did your son talk to someone?

A: Yes sir.

Q: Who did he talk to?

A: He also talked with Mark Shook and Detective Harrison.

THE STATE: Thank you, Ms. Nelson.

# CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. WEST:

Q: Ms. Nelson, you testified that you usually pick your children up about 5:30?

A: No, sir, I have to have them picked up before 5:30.

Q: Before 5:30. I see. So, on this particular day, you picked them up at that time?

A: I always went to pick them up any time between 4:45 and 5:00 o'clock.

Q: Well, on this particular day, do you know when you picked them up?

A: I'm not sure of the exact minute I got to the day care, no, but it was around 5:00 o'clock.

Q: Do you know the defendant?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: How do you know him?

A: He used to live with Rhonda Carson. I don't know if he actually lived with her or it was just his girlfriend, but I've known him for two, maybe three years.

Q: Do you know what he was wearing that day?

A: I don't know what kind of pants, but I know what kind of shirt he was wearing. He was wearing like a white thermal undershirt and a flannel shirt tied around his waist.

Q: A flannel shirt around his waist. You stated that you saw Mr. Bragg carrying something in his hand?

A: Uh-um.

Q: And could you describe that?

A: It was dark. It was like a sock I suppose. It certainly looked like one and it had something heavy in it because it was sagging. I mean you could obviously tell it was sagging.

Q: But you didn't hear Kenneth cursing?

A: No, I can't say I honestly hear him say anything but he was laughing at what Bobby as saying.

Q: And you thought they were both drunk?

A: No, I didn't say that. I thought Kenneth or Coy was drunk.

Q: And they were following...

A: Coy up the road, yes.

Q: Thirty or forty feet behind him?

A: No, twenty, thirty feet maybe.

Q: Were they yelling at him?

A: Kenneth was not, no, but he was laughing at what Bobby was saying.

Q: And you can't understand what Bobby Bragg said?

A: No, I could. He was saying things like, "Ain't that right, Ain't that right, you son of a bitch," and stuff like that. Just nasty, vulgar stuff.

Q: Do you – what was the temperature like on that day?

A: It was a warm day for, for that time of year. It was a very warm day. It was warm as a matter of fact because Jeffrey wore shorts to school that day. I'm positive of that.

Q: Did you – did you see – you didn't see Coy go in his house, did you?

A: No, sir, I cannot see his door from my door. So, no, sir, I did not. I did not see either of them go inside the house.

Q: So, you were in your yard when you observed this?

A: Well, I as in my mother's, on my mother's yard when I actually seen them get to Coy's trailer. I can't see the door from their either, but I can see the beginning of Coy's yard from there.

Q: Where is your mother's trailer?

A: Just two trailers up from mine.

Q: So, you couldn't see Coy go into the trailer?

A: No, I couldn't see anybody go into the trailer, no, sir.

Q: And you didn't – did you see – you couldn't see anybody go in the trailer?

A: No, not from where I was. I couldn't see any – I could see them go into the yard but not into the trailer, no.

Q: How long did you observe them?

A: Just a couple of minutes. Five, maybe six minutes.

Q: Was it dark at that time?

A: No, sir.

Q: Broad daylight?

A: No, it wasn't – it was just like, like it is now. It would be right on the verge of getting dark. I mean

You could still see, but, yeah, it was still bright enough to see, yes.

Q: You've been living on Winter Drive for two years?

A: No, just a little over three years.

Q: Three years?

A: Uh-um.

Q: Coy drank a lot, did he not?

A: Yes, he did.

Q: Were you familiar with his habits, his drinking habits?

A: You never saw Mr. Hartley unless he ran out of booze because he would stagger to the store and get some more and he wouldn't have his bottle of liquor covered. I mean he would have it out in the open swigging out of it.

Q: Were they...

A: He mostly drank beer though, yes, I know that.

Q: Did he have a lot of company at this trailer? Did you see people going in and out?

A: Not very often.

Q: Did you see other people – do you know with whom he associated? Any of the people with whom he associated?

A: I know some people that have been up there just by looking at them. I wouldn't want to know some of the people he associated with.

Q: I couldn't understand you. I'm sorry.

- A: I know some of the people just by looking at them.
- Q: Are they what you would call street people?
- A: Yes.
- Q: Were there a number of street people who would visit Coy regularly?
- A: I don't think so. I don't know.
- Q: You do know Rhonda Carson?
- A: Yes.
- Q: Did she ever go to his trailer, do you know?
- A: I don't know. I think maybe I saw her there a time or two maybe. I really can't remember.
- Q: Did you ever go to Coy's trailer?
- A: I can't honestly say I never knocked on the door, no.
- Q: What is stored in the storage chest, storage at the end of the street?
- A: In the building there?
- Q: Yes.
- A: That I know of just some personal property like signs and things that belong to Randolph Phillip. He owns the trailer park.
- Q: You didn't have anything stored there?
- A: Huh-um.
- Q: You son had nothing stored there?
- A: No.

Q: So, you picked up your children at about 5:00 o'clock?

A: Uh-um.

Q: And then you drove from the nursery back to your trailer?

A: It didn't take – no, I didn't. My aunt did. It didn't take just a...

Q: You did not go with her?

A: No, I did not drive. She did.

Q: But you went with her?

A: Yes.

Q: Okay, and you came back, you say you came back about 5:15?

A: No, I was back way before then. I was home really close to 5:00. It doesn't take but just a couple minutes to get up there and back.

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# Officer Randall Rasnake

Officer Rasnake testified that he had been a patrolman with BPD for approximately four years.<sup>39</sup> He further testified that in early December 1994, he was called to the Longvue Motel in reference to a disturbance. When he and Officer Hayes arrived, they found Coffey and Bragg intoxicated. While searching Bragg, he located a black knife and a white athletic sock with a chrome trailer hitch ball in the sock. Officer Rasnake testified:

Q: Did you make some comment to him, sir, about his possession of that object?

A: Yes, sir, I did.

Q: What did you say to him?

A: I asked Mr. Bragg had he been using that as a weapon. It was in a sock where it could be swung as a weapon. I asked him what his purpose was for having the ball. He stated that he just had the ball, that he had found it and placed it in the sock. I didn't believe him and questioned him further and accused him of having it and carrying it for use as a weapon, to swing as a blunt object type weapon.

Q: Did he ever indicate to you whether or not he was using it as a weapon.

A: No, sir, he did not. He continued with his story that he just found it and placed it in the sock.<sup>40</sup>

On cross examination, Officer Rasnake testified that both Coffey and Bragg were taken to the Sheriff's Department for a twenty-four hour hold.<sup>41</sup>

# **Agent Jonathan Jones**

Agent Jones testified that he worked for the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation as a polygraph examiner and training coordinator.<sup>42</sup> He further testified that on March 21, 1995, Coffey was brought to his office in Hickory, NC for the purpose of taking a polygraph. While Coffey was with Agent Jones' he made comments to Agent Jones regarding the death of the Victim. After Coffey made the comments, Agent Jones asked Detective Shook to come into the room so that Coffey could provide a statement to Detective Shook. Agent Jones testified that Coffey had stated that he would not speak with Detective Harrison, but that he would speak with Detective Shook.<sup>43</sup>

Agent Jones testified that after Detective Shook took Coffey's statement, Agent Jones reentered the room. At that time Detective Shook went over the statement. Agent Jones signed the paper. Coffey stated to Agent Jones that the statements were true.<sup>44</sup> See the statements Coffey made to Agent Jones in law enforcement investigation section above.<sup>45</sup>

# **Detective Mark Shook**

Detective Shook testified that at the time of the crime he was a detective with BPD. At the time of trial he was a Deputy Sheriff with the Watauga County Sheriff's Department.<sup>46</sup>

Detective Harrison testified about his role in the initial investigation at the crime scene. He

testified that he spoke with Nancy Horton at 8:14 PM at her trailer on the night of the crime and testified that he participated in a neighborhood canvass the following day.<sup>47</sup> He testified for corroborative purposes about the interview he conducted with Rene Nelson and Jeffery Nelson on December 15, 1994.<sup>48</sup> He also testified about his January 6, 1995 interview of Coffey and noted the inconsistences between the original statement provided by Coffey and this statement.<sup>49</sup> Detective Shook then testified about his March 21, 1995 interview of Coffey at the SBI Office in Hickory, NC.<sup>50</sup>

# The Victim's Money

Additional testimony was heard regarding the wallets that the Victim carried. The Victim's sister-in-law, Barbara Jean Hartley, testified that the Victim carried a long wallet with a chain on it. He would keep the wallet in his back pocket and the chain through where his overalls buckled. She testified that he carried a wad of money and showed it to her and her husband, Grady, the Victim's brother. Tony Triplett, a friend of the Victim, testified that the Victim always wore bib overalls and kept a small billfold with a rubber band around it under the overalls. Triplett also observed the Victim with a chain billfold. Triplett testified that two and a half weeks prior to his death, the Victim asked him to count the money he had in his small

billfold. Triplett counted it. There was \$2,400 in \$100 bills.<sup>52</sup> Danta Huner of the Northwestern Regional Housing Authority testified that the Victim received \$446 per month in SSI benefits.<sup>53</sup>

# **Defense Case**

The defense put on witnesses to show Coffey's education and mental health status. William Eller testified that Coffey was given an IQ test in October 1979 when he was in ninth grade. The test was the Otis-Lennon Mental Aptitude Test. Coffey scored a 75. Eller further testified that 100 is normal or average and 75 would be twenty-five points below average. He testified that Coffey was below a low average and was classified as educationally mentally handicapped. Dr. William Knight testified that he gave Coffey an IQ test in June 1995. Coffey was given a Wechsler Adult Intelligence Scale, revised edition. Dr. Knight testified that Coffey has a verbal IQ of 62, a performance IQ of 61, and a full scale IQ of 60.55 Jim Thornton testified that when he began working at New River Mental Health in November of 1990, Coffey was on an outpatient commitment. He was being treated for depression and alcoholism.56

The defense also called John Combs, an employee of the ABC store. Combs testified that Coffey came into the store on Thursday, December 8, 1994 and asked Combs what kind of liquor the Victim buys. Combs told Coffey the type of liquor and Coffey then purchased a pint

of the liquor. Cash register tapes were introduced that showed that the purchase occurred at either 3:38 PM or 3:46 PM.57

# **DNA Stipulation**

A stipulation was entered regarding an SBI report which describes DNA testing on Coffey's jacket and jeans and concludes that "No DNA banding pattern other than that of the suspect, Kenneth Eugene Coffey, was obtained from the cutting of the nylon jacket and the cutting from jeans."58 A copy of that laboratory report is included below.

# Conclusion

At the conclusion of the trial, the jury convicted Coffey of First Degree Murder under the first degree felony murder rule. Coffey was given a sentence of Life Without Parole.

# IX. Bragg Trial

# Introduction

Bragg's trial was held on February 5-9, and February 12-13, 1996, in Watauga County.

The trial judge was the Honorable Charles C. Lamm. The state was represented by James

Rusher, District Attorney and Gerald Wilson, Assistant District Attorney. Bragg was represented by Jeffery Hedrick and Vincent Gable. 59

# State's Case

Several witnesses who testified in Coffey's trial also testified in Bragg's trial. Many provided testimony that was consistent with the testimony that they provided in Coffey's trial. These individuals include: Pathologist Brent Hall (regarding the Victim's injuries and autopsy)<sup>60</sup>, Larry Grimes (regarding finding the Victim's body)<sup>61</sup>, Debbie Grimes (regarding checking the Victim for a pulse and staying with him until authorities arrived)<sup>62</sup>, Barbara Jean Hartley (regarding the Victim and his money)<sup>63</sup>, and John Combs (regarding Coffey visiting the ABC

store to buy liquor for the Victim on the day of the murder).<sup>64</sup> A summary of the consistent testimony is not provided.

# **Kenneth Coffey**

Co-defendant Kenneth Coffey was called to testify. Coffey asserted his Fifth

Amendment privilege against self-incrimination and was ultimately given use immunity for his testimony. Coffey's mental capacity was questioned and he was deemed mentally competent to testify. - Q. But if you can't remember when somebody asks you a question, do you sometimes try to answer it even though you don't remember?
- MR. RUSHER: Objection, Your Honor. That's

1 general cross-examination. It has nothing --2 THE COURT: Sustained. 3 Do you, Mr. Coffey, understand now what is going on as far as your rights are concerned from the things -- I 4 5 don't want you to tell me what your lawyer said, but 6 from what she told you, do you understand what your 7 rights are? 8 A. Yes. 9 Do you think you understand what your choices are? 10 MR. RUSHER: Objection. 11 THE COURT: Overruled. 12 A. Yes. 13 Have you ever, Mr. Coffey, had trouble answering Q. 14 questions when you were in court in a true way based on 15 what you know? 16 MR. RUSHER: Objection. 17 THE COURT: Overruled. 18 Not that I know of. I might have took it the wrong way 19 the way they answered the question -- or asked me the 20 question. 21 I see. But as far as things that happened that you are 22 expecting Mr. Rusher to be asking about, some of that 23 stuff you say you don't remember? 24 MR. RUSHER: Objection.

Is that what you said?

1 THE COURT: Well, overruled. You may answer 2 the question. 3 Bits and pieces of it. A. 4 MR. HEDRICK: That's all. THE COURT: All right. 5 6 MR. RUSHER: Your Honor, we'd tender the 7 witness as competent. 8 THE COURT: Well, I'm going to wait till he 9 has an opportunity to talk to Dr. Knight. 10 MR. RUSHER: Could he come down and sit with 11 his lawyer? 12 THE COURT: Yes. 13 (The witness left the stand.) 14 THE COURT: Is Dr. Knight on his way? Do we 15 need to take another recess? 16 MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, I'll go make sure 17 that there's nothing that I can do -- that I haven't 18 done everything I need to do to get him here. THE COURT: I know you may not have any basis 19 20 for knowing it, but do you have any idea how long you think it might take to talk to Dr. Knight? 21 MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, I can report back in 22 23 ten minutes and I may or may not be finished by then. THE COURT: Okay, sir, if you would. The only 24 25 reason I want to know is to determine whether to go

ahead and let the jury go and come back after lunch so we'll know about how much time it will take us for these proceedings outside the presence of the jury.

MR. HEDRICK: Thank you.

THE COURT: So we'll take a ten-minute recess at this time. If you'll let us know as soon as you know something.

(Mr. Coffey exited the courtroom.)

(A recess was taken at 11:10 a.m., and court reconvened at 11:22 a.m.)

PROCEEDINGS IN THE COURTROOM OUT OF THE PRESENCE OF THE JURY

THE COURT: Okay, Mr. Hedrick.

MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, I have had a chance to visit briefly with Dr. Knight and am comfortable with proceeding with him as a witness on this voir dire. I would, however, would it get to the stage that cross-examination would be allowed after direct examination before the jury, need additional time to complete talking to Dr. Knight about the other issues that may be there. But with regard to the capacity question, I'm prepared to proceed.

THE COURT: Okay. Are you through with questions to Mr. Coffey at this time?

MR. HEDRICK: I am.

1 THE COURT: Is the State through with 2 questioning Mr. Coffey? 3 MR. RUSHER: We had already concluded our examination. 5 THE COURT: Do you have any other evidence you wish to present on voir dire? 6 MR. RUSHER: Your Honor, we would present the 7 file from the Kenneth Coffey trial. There was an issue 8 9 made during the course of the trial having to do with 10 the competency of the defendant then to proceed, and there was a determination, a judicial determination by 11 Judge Downs that he was competent. As I recall, there 12 13 were reports that Judge Downs considered, all of which I would expect to be in the file, and we would tender the 14 file to the Court for your consideration in this matter. 15 THE COURT: Let Mr. Coffey's file be admitted 16 17 for purposess of this voir dire. MR. RUSHER: That would be all the evidence 18 for the State. 19 THE COURT: Okay. All right, sir. Mr. 20 21 Hedrick, if you're ready to proceed. MR. HEDRICK: Yes, Your Honor. Our first 22 23 witness would be William Knight. The witness, WILLIAM H. KNIGHT, being first 24 duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

- DIRECT EXAMINATION (Voir Dire) (by Mr. Hedrick):
- 2 | Q. State, please, sir, your name and your occupation.
- 3 A. William H. Knight, psychologist.
- 4 Q. Are you a practicing psychologist at this time, Dr.
- 5 Knight?
- 6 A. Yes.
- 7 Q. You have a Ph.D. in the field of psychology?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. You've testified as an expert witness in the past?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 | Q. And you've testified as an expert witness in criminal
- 12 matters?
- 13 A. That's correct.
- 14 | Q. Have you testified with regard to legal capacity as to
- certain individuals as an expert?
- 16 A. Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. How long have you been a practicing psychologist, Dr.
- 18 Knight?
- 19 A. About 30 years in North Carolina.
- 20 | Q. Dr. Knight, have you had a chance to evaluate Kenneth
- 21 Coffey?
- 22 A. Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. At whose request was that done?
- 24 A. That was at the request of his attorney, Mr. Robert
- 25 West.

- Q. Did you in fact evaluate him?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. That was a psychological evaluation?
- 4 A. That was a measure of intelligence he was tested on as well as an interview.
- 6 Q. I'm sorry?
- 7 A. He was given an interview and a measure of intelligence.
  - Q. And were you able as a result of your studies and your training and work with Mr. Coffey to form an opinion satisfactory to yourself as a psychologist as to the extent of Mr. Coffey's ability to understand and to answer questions?
- 14 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Can you relate to Judge Lamm at this time what your opinion is in that regard, his ability to understand and answer questions.
- 18 A. I feel that he could understand only very simple questions.
- Q. Do you have an opinion satisfactory to yourself as a result of your training and work with Mr. Coffey as to his capability of understanding the obligation of an oath, that is, an oath to tell the truth?
- 24 A. Yes. I think he could.
- 25 Q. Do you have an opinion satisfactory to yourself as to

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- the extent of Mr. Coffey's capability of expressing himself when being questioned in a courtroom?
- A. I think he has problems with memory, and anything that is very complicated he would have difficulty in answering correctly.
- Q. Can you state whether that difficulty is the result of a difficulty in understanding or a difficulty of expression?
- A. I think that that's a difficulty related to his intellectual level, to his memory, and the fact that he has experienced several depressions.
- Q. With regard to -- when you say depressions, what do you mean?
- A. He did not describe his depressions and I was not asked to evaluate him on that, but I would say that they related to probably economic problems that he may have experienced. At the time he had had his trailer or house shot up and his child was taken away by his wife and her boyfriend.
- Q. With regard to his ability to answer, understand and answer questions, do you have an opinion based upon your studies with him and your training, an opinion as to whether Mr. Coffey when he makes a response is in fact being responsive to what is asked of him?
- A. I would have to say only on uncomplicated things where

adequate memory of events was not interfered with by his drinking.

Do you have an opinion as to whether Mr. Coffey's psychological mechanisms that are involved with his conversing in the sense of listening and answering would or do in fact with him cause him to make statements or answers simply for the purpose of answering without in fact knowing -- without it in fact being responsive or relevant?

MR. RUSHER: Your Honor, we object. As I understand, this person did a test for intelligence and that's all he did, and these questions go so much further than that.

THE COURT: Well, the objection to the last question is overruled.

- A. Would you care to restate your question.
- Q. I'll be glad to. If Mr. Coffey is asked a question and he has given an answer, does that necessarily mean, in your opinion, that he understood the question or how the answer might relate to the question?

MR. RUSHER: Objection.

THE COURT: Overruled.

A. I don't think that he necessarily would understand the question, and it's complicated by his drinking behaviors which have affected his memory, possibly also depression

for reasons that I already stated.

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·Q. In your work with Mr. Coffey, did you observe any psychological characteristics that indicate his ordinary or routine behavior in response to questions where he is required to make an answer as opposed to simply asked if he would mind doing so?

I think that a person functioning at the level of intelligence which he did tends to respond in a way that they think that a person wants them to.

MR. HEDRICK: I don't have any further questions.

CROSS-EXAMINATION (Voir Dire) (by Mr. Rusher):

- Well, now, Dr. Knight, you had a conversation with him and you understood him, did you not?
- A. Yes.
- Q. There was understanding in the conversation you had with him both on his part and yours?
- A. Right.
- Q. Do you have some special skills in terms of questioning a person that exceed that which lawyers or jurors or other people might have?
- A. No, I don't think that I would say that I do.
- He told you -- or did he tell you that his trailer had been shot up and that his child had been taken away by his wife and her boyfriend?

- 1 A. That's correct, sir.
  - Q. And you reported that as an event that happened, so apparently you believed what he told you, did you not, sir?
  - A. I reported it as an event which he said had happened.
- 6 | Q. Well, didn't you believe him?
  - A. I take everything a person says and put it down in a report without indicating that I necessarily believe it.
  - Q. He had the ability to converse with you about his situation, did he not, sir?
- 11 A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. And you had the ability to make him understand and elicit an answer when you asked him questions, did you not, sir?
- 15 A. That's correct.
- Q. And he gave the appearance of knowing what the truth was when he talked to you, did he not?
- 18 A. I wouldn't say that he gave the appearance of knowing
  19 what the truth was. He gave me the information as he
  20 perceived it.
- Q. Earlier you testified that you thought he could distinguish that which was truthful, did you not, sir?
  - A. That's correct.
- Q. Well, what makes you think that he can distinguish that
  which is truthful if there was no basis for that in your

conversation with him?

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- A. I think that probably he would distort something if he felt that it was to his advantage.
- Q. Well, you're talking about one who's consciously lying, are you not, sir?
- A. You might put it that way, yes, sir.
- Q. That fails to answer the basic question whether he can distinguish that which is truthful and that which is not, does it not, Dr. Knight?
- A. I think that for my part I would have to know what the situation was that he was asked to respond whether something was truthful or not or respond in a truthful manner to a situation.
- Q. You don't think a jury consisting of ordinary people could distinguish truth from falsity, Dr. Knight?

  MR. HEDRICK: Objection to what a jury can do.

  THE COURT: Well, sustained.
- Q. Now, Dr. Knight, how many sessions did you have with Mr. Coffey?
- 20 A. I had one session with him.
- 21 Q. How long did that one session last?
- 22 A. That probably lasted about an hour and a half.
- Q. During that one hour and a half he took a test, did he not?
  - A. That's correct.

- Q. How much of that one hour and a half was consumed by the taking of the test?
- A. Probably 40 minutes.

- Q. So you are saying based on something like 45 minutes of conversation with him that you know all these things about his personality?
- A. I didn't test him for personality. I tested him for intelligence.
  - Q. Well, what has intelligence got to do with whether he knows the truth from falsity?
  - A. It has quite a lot to do with whether a person knows the truth from falsehood. It depends on the way the question is placed to the individual. As I indicated earlier, a person functioning at his level is likely to respond if he can understand a question, to respond in a way that he feels would place him in a favorable light.
  - Q. Well, by the same token, if he responds in a way that places him in an unfavorable light, then it would seem to me that that would be believable. Is that what you're saying?
- 22 A. Yes, sir.
  - Q. In other words, if he testifies to involvement in a murder case, that would clearly place him in an unfavorable light, so you would tend to think that those

1 statements would be true? 2 MR. HEDRICK: Objection to what he thinks. 3 MR. RUSHER: I don't care to ask him anything 4 else. 5 THE COURT: Any further questions? 6 MR. HEDRICK: No further questions. 7 THE COURT: Thank you, Dr. Knight. You may 8 step down. 9 (Witness excused) 10 THE COURT: Any further evidence on the voir 11 dire? 12 MR. HEDRICK: No further evidence, Your 13 That would be all I have both as regards to the question of capacity and if capacity were found, as to 14 15 my position about the special instruction. 16 THE COURT: Okay, sir. Anything further from 17 the State? 18 MR. RUSHER: No, Your Honor. 19 THE COURT: Well, the Court, after considering and observing the demeanor of the witness Mr. Coffey on 20 21 the stand, his response to questions posed to him both 22 by the State and by the defendant, considering Dr. Knight's testimony, and considering the file of State of 23 North Carolina versus Kenneth Eugene Coffey, admitted into evidence for the purposes of voir dire, 95-CRS-121,

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specifically in that file the report from Dorothea Dix from the defendant's July 6, 1995 admission of Nicole F. Wolfe, forensic psychiatrist, and a psychological assessment and test administered which has a date at the top of July 10, 1995 -- I may have said '96 earlier, but I meant July 6, '95 -- July 10, '95, signed by Dorothy Humphrey, Staff Psychologist II, the Court finds from those examinations that as of the dates upon which he was evaluated and tested at Dorothea Dix that Mr. Coffey's thought processes were logical and goal-directed and his concentration, however, was impaired, his intellectual functioning appeared below average, and that the forensic psychologist Dr. Wolfe found after her examination and testing of Mr. Coffey that he was currently as of the date of the report capable of proceeding to trial, understood the charges against him in a position relative to proceedings, and is capable of working with an attorney in preparation of a defense, and that on July 10, 1995, when evaluated and tested by Ms. Humphrey, staff psychologist, that the test she administered, verbal performance, full scale IQs, placed him in the mild range of mental retardation, that, however, he was not always putting forth his best effort with the task of the test, that he was diagnosed at that time of having low borderline intellectual

functioning, but that there were no obvious signs of
memory impairment as of Mr. Coffey's test date.

Taking all that into consideration, including the Court's observation of Mr. Coffey's demeanor and his response to questions on the stand, the Court concludes that the witness Mr. Coffey is capable of expressing himself concerning matters about which he is to be questioned, that he understands the duty of a witness to tell the truth and understands the meaning of taking the oath, and based upon those conclusions finds that Mr. Coffey is competent, mentally competent to testify in this matter. Note the defendant's exception to the Court's ruling.

Are we ready for the jury?

MR. RUSHER: The State is ready.

THE COURT: Okay. If we can have Mr. Coffey brought back in. Advise Ms. Fannon of the Court's ruling, or I will when she gets here. And the Court will grant your request for an instruction, Mr. Hedrick.

(Ms. Fannon and Mr. Coffey entered the courtroom.)

THE COURT: Ms. Fannon, after conclusion of voir dire, I have concluded that Mr. Coffey is competent, mentally competent to testify as a witness in

this matter, so we'll proceed at this time. Do you need 1 a minute to tell him? 2 MS. FANNON: No, Your Honor. He's ready. 3 Okay. If we could have the jury, THE COURT: 4 please. 5 Mr. Coffey, if you'd returned to the stand, 6 and if we could have the jury, please, Sheriff. 7 (Mr. Coffey returned to the stand.) 8 (The jury entered the courtroom at 11:44 a.m.) 9 PROCEEDINGS IN THE COURTROOM IN THE PRESENCE OF THE JURY 10 THE COURT: Members of the jury, before we 11 proceed with the testimony of this witness, let me 12 inform you that this witness is testifying under a grant 13 of immunity from the State. If you find that he 14 testified in whole or in part for this reason, you 15 should examine his testimony with great care and 16 caution, deciding whether or not to believe it. 17 after doing so you believe his testimony in whole or in 18 part, you should treat what you believe the same as any 19 other believable evidence. 20 Okay, Mr. Rusher. 21 MR. RUSHER: Thank you, Your Honor. 22 The witness, KENNETH EUGENE COFFEY, having 23 been previously sworn, was examined and testified as 24 follows:

- 1 DIRECT EXAMINATION (Cont.) (by Mr. Rusher):
- Q. Mr. Coffey, you told me you had known Coy Hartley all of your life?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was he a neighbor? Did he live where you lived or near
- 6 where you lived or how did you know him, sir, all your
- 7 life?
- 8 A. I knowed him ever since I been a little boy, used to go 9 see him all the time.
- 10 | Q. Did he live somewhere near where you lived, Mr. Coffey?
- 11 A. Down on Hardin Road, yeah.
- Q. All right, sir. Do you know where Mr. Coy Hartley lived
- at the time of his death in December of 1994?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. Where was that, sir?
- 16 A. At Winter Drive.
- 17 Q. Is that in the Greenway trailer park in the town of
- 18 Boone?
- 19 A. Yes, sir.
- 20 Q. Did you see him at his trailer from time to time, Mr.
- 21 Coffey?
- 22 A. Yes.
- 23 | Q. How often did you go visit Mr. Coy Hartley?
- 24 A. I'd go see him sometimes two or three times a week.
- 25 | Q. All right. Now, do you know the defendant Bobby Bragg?

- 1 A. Yes.
  - Q. How long, sir, have you known Mr. Bobby Bragg?
- 3 A. About two years.
- Q. Mr. Coffey, you have been convicted of murder relating to the death of Coy Hartley; is that correct, sir?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. Where are you now serving that sentence?
- 8 A. Central Prison.
- 9 Q. Do you understand that you have been ordered to testify
  10 and that the things you say cannot now be used against
  11 you?
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection.
- 13 A. Yes, sir.
- 14 THE COURT: Overruled.
- Q. Mr. Coffey, please tell the jurors how Coy Hartley came to be murdered.
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection to the form of that question.
- 19 THE COURT: Sustained.
- Q. Mr. Coffey, do you know about the circumstances of Coy
  Hartley's murder?
- 22 A. Yes.
- 23 | Q. Were you there? Did you observe it, sir?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 | Q. Would you tell us what time of day or night it was.

- 1 A. It was around 3:30 in the evening.
- 2 | Q. Where was Mr. Hartley at the time?
- 3 A. He was at his residence.
- 4 | Q. Why were you at the residence of Coy Hartley?
- 5 A. It was almost Christmas and we was down there drinking,
- 6 you know.
- 7 Q. You and Coy were down there drinking?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. Was there anyone else down there drinking, too?
- 10 A. Bobby.
- 11 Q. Okay. Bobby Bragg, the defendant?
- 12 A. (Witness nods head)
- 13 | Q. Did Coy Hartley ask you to go someplace?
- 14 A. Yes. He asked me to go to the ABC store to get him a
- 15 pint of liquor.
- 16 Q. Did you do that, sir?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. What time of day or night was that, Mr. Coffey?
- 19 A. That was -- I ain't for sure -- between 3:30, 4:00.
- 20 | Q. How did you get to the ABC store?
- 21 A. I walked.
- 22 | Q. How long a walk would that be from where Mr. Coffey
- 23 [sic] lived?
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection.
- 25 | Q. Excuse me, Mr. Hartley. I said it wrong. I apologize.

- A. Probably ten minutes.
  - Q. All right, sir. Did you walk alone?
- 3 A. Yes.
- 4 Q. What type of purchase did you make for Mr. Hartley?
- 5 A. A pint of Popov vodka.
- 6 Q. Did you see Mr. Bobby Bragg then during that time?
  7 MR. HEDRICK: Objection to the form of the question.
- 9 A. On the way back.
- THE COURT: Overruled.
- Q. Where did you see Mr. Bobby Bragg on the way back from the ABC store?
- 13 A. In front of Winter Drive where the mailboxes is.
- 14 Q. In front of Winter Drive road?
- 15 A. (Witness nods head)
- 16 | Q. Is that the road Mr. Hartley lived on?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 | Q. And you said there's a mailbox there?
- A. There was a row of mailboxes where they got their mail.
- Q. All right, sir. Did you and Mr. Bragg talk --
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection to the form of the question.
- THE COURT: Overruled.
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 | Q. -- at that time? Tell us what you and Mr. Bragg talked

1 about.

- A. He just asked where I was going and I told him I was taking Coy some liquor and said --
- Q. "He," is that Bobby Bragg?
- A. (Witness nods head) -- we was going to go over there and drink that liquor. So I got to talking to him and he said -- he asked --

MR. HEDRICK: Objection.

THE COURT: Overruled.

- Q. You may answer, Mr. Coffey. He told you what?
- A. He asked was Coy drinking or drunk, and I told him yeah, he wasn't feeling no pain. So he wanted to walk up there and wanted to know if he had any more money, wanted to go up there and take his money. I said no. And he asked me again and —

THE COURT: Overruled.

- Q. Was anyone else present at that time other than you and the defendant Bobby Bragg?
- A. Well, Rhonda Carson, she was present that day, but she didn't go -- she was there --
- Q. Mr. Coffey, when you and Mr. Bragg were talking at the mailbox, at that time was anyone else present?

No. A. 1 MR. HEDRICK: Object, Your Honor. He's 2 interrupting the witness and he's in the middle of his 3 answer. 4 THE COURT: Well, don't interrupt the 5 The objection to the last question was 6 7 overruled. All right, sir. Continue telling us about the 8 Q. conversation, what you and Mr. Bobby Bragg talked about. 9 He was talking about getting his money. I said no, and 10 Q. he said, well, come on, Kenneth. I said, well, okay. 11 So we walked up there, went in the door, and apparently 12 Bob and Coy had been into it about something and --13 MR. HEDRICK: Objection. 14 THE COURT: Well, sustained as to what 15 16 apparently occurred. Please just tell us what was said or what happened, Mr. 17 Q. Coffey. 18 Well, we went up there and Coy wanted us to leave. 19 A. What did Coy say? 20 He said, get the goddamn hell out of my house. 21 MR. HEDRICK: Objection. 22 THE COURT: Overruled. 23 Speaking to you, speaking to both of you, or speaking to Q. 24

who, sir?

- A. Well, I first thought he was talking to Bob. I guess he was talking to both of us.
- Q. What happened after Mr. Hartley made that statement to you?
  - A. Well, I slapped Coy, slapped him with my hand. Next thing I knowed, Bob just went mad and started beating him.
- Q. Beating him with what, sir?
- 9 A. He had something in a sock. He had it in a white sock.
- 10 Q. How did he beat him, Mr. Coffey?
- 11 A. Just hit him (Indicating).
- Q. You made a motion. Could you describe how he hit him, sir.
- 14 | A. Just struck him in the forehead four or five times.
- 15 Q. In the forehead?
- 16 A. Yeah.

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- 17 Q. Is that what you said?
- 18 A. (Witness nods head)
- 19 Q. Four or five times?
- 20 | A. Uh-huh.
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection to the form of the question.
- THE COURT: Overruled.
- 24 Q. What did you do?
- 25 A. For a minute I was stunned. His wallet fell out.

- Q. Whose wallet fell out? 1 Coy's, out of the bib of his overalls. It was a long 2 wallet, and he got some money. Bob give me \$260 out of 3 the wallet and just told me to not say nothing. And I 4 went through the trailer park by that A&P through to 5 call Shirley Faircloth, and Bob come on through there 6 later and went around by the old Radio Shack there 7 8 behind. Mr. Coffey, what happened to Coy Hartley when he was hit 9 in the forehead four or five times? 10 He fell. He fell to the floor. You say blood flew from Mr. Coy Hartley? 20 MR. HEDRICK: Objection to the form of the 21 question. 22
- 23 A. Yes.
- MR. HEDRICK: He's leading the witness.
- THE COURT: Overruled.

- Q. At what point did Coy Hartley fall? Was it the first time he was hit?
  - A. Well, he was at the bed. He got up, he fell down once and got up, and he was struck several other times and he didn't --
- 6 Q. Struck by who, sir?
- 7 A. Mr. Bragg.

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- 8 Q. With what?
- 9 A. Something he had in his hand. I ain't for sure what it was.
- 11 Q. The same thing he had used earlier, sir?
- 12 A. Yes.
- Q. Could you tell whether or not this object had weight to it?
- 15 A. Yes.
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection to the form of the question.
- 18 THE COURT: Overruled.
- 19 Q. How could you tell that?
- 20 A. Because it looked baggy, heavy. It was something heavy,
  21 you could tell.

- 15 A. From here to you, I guess, or --
- 16 Q. Who picked up the wallet from the floor?

- 20 A. No.
- 21 | Q. What was the appearance of Coy Hartley at that time?
- 22 A. He was just laying there.
- 23 | Q. What position was he laying there, Mr. Coffey?
- 24 A. Face down.
- 25 | Q. In what room of his house?

- 1 A. In the living room, where his bed was there.
- Q. How long did you observe him lie in that manner before you left?
  - A. Maybe two to three minutes. I just ran out of there.
- Q. As he lay there, did you observe movement from Coy
  Hartley?
- 7 A. No.

- Q. Now, you have indicated that at some time you and Mr.

  Bragg divided the money or you were given money. When

  did that occur, sir?
- 11 A. Right after he got through hitting him, after he picked 12 the wallet up.

1 consideration at this time. And you must not make any 2 independent inquiry or investigation about the matter on 3 your own. As I've told each of you at one time or 4 another before, I think, it's necessary that each of you 5 obey these rules to the letter, because unless you do 6 so, there's no way that the State or the defendant can 7 be assured of absolute fairness and impartiality, and it 8 is your duty both while the trial is in progress and 9 while it is in recess to see that you remain a fair and 10 impartial trier of the facts. 11 So you're free to step out. We'll see you 12 once again after lunch at 1:30. Thank you.

- 21 Q. Where was that?
- 22 A. Winston.
- 23 | Q. Were you in the hospital for a while for that?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 Q. How long?

- 1 A. I can't recall.
- Q. What kind of plate are you talking about?
- 3 A. I don't know. It's just a metal plate is all I know.
- 4 | Q. Do you know whereabouts it is?
- 5 A. Yeah, right in front of the forehead.
- 6 Q. Okay. Have you got another plate in your head also?
- 7 A. Yeah, back here (Indicating).

- 21 Q. Where were you drinking wine on December 8?
- A. Me and Bob drunk wine three or four days before that, and beer, so I guess we were drinking all the part of

- 25 | Q. Well, I mean on Thursday, the 8th, did you drink wine?

- 1 A. I think I drunk a little bit that day, yeah.

- 16 | A. Yeah, I walked up the main four-lane right to the liquor
- 17 store.
- 18 | Q. But as far as the trailer park -- Coy's trailer is back
- in the back in that trailer park, isn't it?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. At the end of one of the roads?
- 22 A. Yes.
- 23 Q. Is the road that it's on called Winter Drive?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 | Q. And when you left Coy's trailer, what way did you go out

- of the trailer park?
- 2 A. I come straight up.
- 3 | Q. Out Winter Drive?
- 4 A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. Stayed on Winter Drive?
- 6 A. Yeah.
- 7 | Q. And at the end of it did you go right-handed?
- 8 A. Let's see. Yeah, it would have been right-handed, up by
- 9 the A&P.
- 10 Q. And up by the A&P?
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. And somewhere along the way you saw who?
- 13 A. Rhonda Carson.
- 14 Q. And is that your girlfriend who you just broke up with?
- 15 A. Used to be.
- 16 Q. Well, how long ago was it -- on December 8, how long had
- it been since you broke up?
- 18 A. About a month and a half.
- 19 Q. Okay. Where did you see her?
- 20 A. She was standing there at the Coke machine.
- 21 0. At the A&P?
- 22 A. Uh-huh, at the front.
- 23 | Q. Okay. You didn't stop to talk to her, did you?
- 24 A. Yeah. I said hello to her.
- 25 Q. You said hello?

- A. (Witness nods head)
- Q. Did you linger or did you go on to the liquor store?
  - A. I went on up to the liquor store and come back and she was still standing there.
- Q. You told the District Attorney it took you about ten minutes to get up there; is that right?
- 7 A. Yes.

- 8 Q. When you were there, how long did you stay?
- 9 A. Just went in, asked the fellow who run the cash register
  10 would he get me a pint of Popov vodka, and he said it
  11 was \$3.00 and I think 30 cents or a dime, something. I
  12 gave him the right change.
- 13 | Q. So how long did you stay?
- 14 | A. Just in there and out.
- 15 Q. Would it have been less than five minutes?
- 16 A. Probably two minutes.
- 17 Q. Okay. And when you came out, where did you go?
- 18 A. Went straight back.
- 19 Q. Did you stop on the way back?
- 20 A. Just for a minute.
- 21 | Q. Where did you stop for a minute?
- 22  $\mid$  A. Stopped there and talked to Rhonda just for a second.
- 23 Q. Was she at the A&P again?
- 24 A. She was still standing there.
- 25 Q. Where was she standing at the A&P?

- 1 A. In front of it.
  - 2 Q. Was anybody with her?
  - 3 A. There was a car there with a couple other people she was
  - 4 talking to. I don't know.
- 5 Q. Do you know who they were?
- 6 A. No, I don't.
- 7 | Q. Do you know what she was doing other than just standing
- 8 there talking to the couple people in a car?
- 9 A. No, I don't, not for sure.
- 10 | Q. What did you say to her?
- 11 A. I just told her I was sorry we broke up and stuff,
- 12 hugged her, and that was about it.
- 13 | Q. You were sorry that you broke up?
- 14 A. (Witness nods head)
- 15 Q. And you hugged her?
- 16 A. (Witness nods head)
- 17 Q. Did you leave then?
- 18 A. Yes, went and walked to the mailbox there where I met
- 19 Bob.
- 20 Q. Was that on Greenway Drive where you walked?
- 21 A. Yes, right up there where you cut -- Winter Drive,
- 22 whatever you want to call it, yeah.
- 23 Q. But you were on the street there?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 Q. And was Rhonda in the front or around the side of the

A&P?

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- A. She was at the front.
- Q. Okay. So when you walked away from the A&P, did you see

  Rhonda there at the A&P anymore after you walked around

  the side of it?
- A. No. I walked on up there and met Bob and he asked me where I was going, and I told him I was going up Coy's and told him I went to the liquor store and got him some liquor. He wanted to know if he had any money. I said, I don't know. He said, let's go over there.
- 11 Q. When you saw Bobby, who was with him?
- 12 A. He was by hisself.
- 13 | Q. And he was, you said, at the mailboxes?
- 14 A. Yeah.
- 15 Q. Did you see where he came from?
- 16 A. Apparently he -- I don't know if he come back from Coy's

  or -- he was just standing there.
- 18 | Q. Just standing there? Is that on Greenway Drive?
- 19 A. The road coming down where the mailboxes is. I don't know what you call it.
- 21 Q. What was he wearing then, can you remember?
- 22 A. Yes, one of them big heavy coats, raincoat.
- 23 Q. Heavy raincoat?
- 24 | A. (Witness nods head)
- 25 Q. Is that -- have you ever called that a long Ryder coat?

- 1 A. Whatever, yeah, or just a raincoat is what I call it.
- 2 Q. How long was it?
- A. It probably come down to past -- a little past your

  ankles -- or not down to your ankles but about that far

  from your ankles (Indicating).
- 6 | Q. About six or eight inches above your ankles?
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 | Q. What color was it?
- 9 A. I think it was tan-looking, brown, tan-looking.
- Q. Besides that tan, full-length raincoat that he was wearing, what else do you remember Bobby having on?
- 12 A. I know he had a couple shirts on underneath it and a cap

  13 and a pair of shoes. I think it was tennis shoes.
- 14 | Q. Can you say what color any of that stuff was?
- 15 A. I know he had blue jean pants on and I don't know whether it -- if his shirt was blue or what.
- 17 Q. But there was a couple shirts, you said?
- 18 A. Yeah, because it was in the wintertime. It was kind of cold that day.
- 20 Q. Could you say how cold it was?
- 21 A. It was probably -- I don't know, at least 30 degrees.
- 22 | Q. Do you think it was higher or lower than freezing?
- 23 A. It was probably higher than freezing.
- 24 Q. Do you remember how you were dressed?
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 | Q. How were you dressed?
- 2 A. Let's see, I had a pair of green Levi pants on and a 3 flannel shirt and --
- 4 | Q. What color was your shirt?
- A. It was all different colors. Well, red and blue, just striped -- no, it was a windbreaker that I had on that Shirley give me.
- 8 Q. A windbreaker?
- 9 A. Uh-huh. It had a hood on it, and I had a vest that Bob

  10 give me, a blue vest.
- 11 | Q. What was on top?
- 12 A. The vest was on top, the blue vest.
- 13 Q. And under it was a windbreaker?
- 14 A. Uh-huh.
- 15 Q. With a hood?
- 16 A. Yes.
- 17 Q. What color was the vest?
- 18 A. I don't know. It had writing on it.
- 19 Q. You don't know what it said?
- 20 A. Huh-uh.
- 21 | Q. What about the windbreaker, what color was it?
- 22 A. The vest I had on?
- 23 Q. The windbreaker.
- A. Oh, it was grey, I think, greyish. The one that had the hood on it?

- 1 Q. Yes, sir.
- 2 A. Had the hood.
- 3 | Q. Okay. And you had those on. What was under that?
- 4 A. I think I had -- I ain't for sure -- a T-shirt or
- 5 something.
- 6 Q. What kind of trousers or pants did you have on?
- 7 A. Green Levis.
- 8 Q. Green Levis? What kind of shoes?
- 9 A. Just regular boots, short boots, goes up to your ankle.
- 10 Q. Do you know what color they were?
- 11 A. Brown.
- 12 Q. And you say Bobby had a hat on?
- 13 | A. Yes.
- 14 Q. Do you know what color it was?
- 15 A. It was some kind of baseball cap. I ain't for sure.
- 16 Q. Baseball cap? Did you have a hat on?
- 17 | A. No.
- 18 | Q. Did you have anything tied around your waist?
- 19 A. No.
- 20 | Q. Did you have anything white that was showing on?
- 21 | A. No, because I had that blue vest and it didn't have no
- 22 arms on it and the windbreaker arms was sticking out of
- 23 it.
- 24 Q. And it wasn't white, the windbreaker wasn't?
- 25 A. I think it was grey. It might have been white,

- whitish-grey or something.
  - Q. Were you carrying that bottle of liquor?
- 3 A. Yeah, I had the bottle of liquor.
- 4 | Q. Was it in your hands or did you have it in a pocket?
- 5 A. I had it stuck down in here (Indicating).
- 6 Q. Did you ever pull it out?
- 7 A. No.

- 8 Q. Could you see it from where it was?
- 9 A. Huh-uh.
- 10 Q. Or could somebody else have seen it?
- 11 A. No.
- 12 Q. Did you have anything in your hands?
- 13 A. No, I didn't.
- 14 | Q. How about Bobby, did he have anything with him?
- 15 | A. He just had that coat on and he didn't have nothing in
- 16 his hands. He kept his hands to his side. I think he
- might have had his guitar that day, too.
- 18 Q. Does Bobby carry a guitar with him sometimes?
- 19 A. Yes, he does.
- 20 Q. Does he carry that in a case or just out?
- 21 A. In a case.
- 22 | Q. What color case does he use?
- 23 A. Black case.
- 24 | Q. Anything else about the case that makes it different
- 25 than any other guitar case?

- A. He had a string tied to it. I know he cut a hole out in it one day, tied a string in it, because the thing broke where you carry it.
  - Q. So it had a string for a handle?
- 5 A. More or less, yeah.
- 6 Q. Did he play the guitar?
- 7 A. Yes.

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- 8 | Q. How many guitars did he have, do you know?
- 9 A. One is all I know of.
- Q. Do you remember him using the guitar on the 8th of December?
- 12 A. I do the 7th, that night, because he was sitting

  13 there -- I come down there about 3:00 in the morning.

  14 He was sitting there at the kitchen table playing the
- 16 Q. Down where?
- 17 | A. At Coy's.
- Q. Do you remember for sure if he had the guitar when he was standing at the mailboxes?
- 20 A. I ain't for sure. I ain't for sure. I can't really --
- Q. How come you can't remember that? Was it because you were drinking?
- 23 A. I think he didn't have it.
- 24 | Q. Or is it because you hurt your head?

guitar drinking wine.

25 A. It's just been so long. I really ain't thought about

it.

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- Q. You hadn't thought about that since then?
- 3 A. I never even -- no, not that guitar.
- Q. But when you met Bobby, you and him agreed to go up there and rob Coy is what you testified to; is that right?
- 7 A. Yes. I didn't want to do it, but he wanted to.
- 8 Q. But you then agreed to do it, didn't you?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. Went with him?
- 11 A. Yes.
- 12 Q. Was anybody with you then?
- 13 A. Rhonda come up there, but she didn't come in the

  14 trailer. She was outside. I think she must have went

  15 up the bank or something.
- 16 Q. Did she come to the mailboxes?
- 17 | A. Yeah. She walked up there, but she never did go inside.
- 18 | Q. What went on while she was there at the mailboxes?
- 19 A. I don't know. Me and Bob went on in the trailer. The
  20 door was open. We went on up there.
- Q. Well, when y'all were making your agreement to go do this, was Rhonda standing there?
- 23 A. No. She was -- right when we started to walk up, she come in behind us.
- 25 Q. Did you go ahead and walk up? Did you talk to her

- before you walked?
- 2 A. I told you yeah, I said hello to her and I was sorry we
- broke up, and that was all I said.
- 4 Q. No, I mean there at the mailboxes.
- 5 | A. No.
- 6 Q. Did she come with you?
- 7 A. Did she what?
- 8 | Q. Did she come with you when you walked up Winter Drive?
- 9 A. She come in behind us, but there wasn't no conversation
- 10 between us.
- 11 | Q. When you say behind you, do you mean that she was
- 12 following you?
- 13 A. Uh-huh.
- 14 Q. How far behind?
- 15 A. I guess she was from here to middleways of that back row
- 16 there, the seats.
- 17 | Q. About half the length of the courtroom?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. And what was she wearing, can you remember that?
- 20 A. Yeah. She had Levis on, she had her white tennis shoes
- on, and she had her jacket on, red and grey jacket.
- 22 Q. Did she have any kind of hat on?
- 23 A. She didn't have no hat on.
- 24 | Q. Did she have anything in her hands?
- 25 A. No.

- Q. Was she walking behind you when you walked up Winter
  Drive with Bobby?
- 3 A. She was a distance from us.
- 4 | Q. Behind you?
- 5 A. Yeah.
- 6 Q. And did you know she was following you?
- 7 A. Yeah, you could tell, look back there.
- 8 | Q. And you'd noticed her back there?
- 9 A. Yeah.
- 10 | Q. When you and Bobby were walking up Winter Drive, were
- you one ahead of the other or side by side, can you
- 12 remember?
- 13 A. We was pretty close, I would say.
- 14 | Q. Do you remember anything about what side you were on?
- 15 A. Let's see. I ain't for sure. I think I was walking on
- the right-hand side. I ain't really for sure.
- 17 | Q. How long had it been then before you -- since you'd seen
- 18 Coy?
- 19 A. Just before I left to go get the liquor.
- 20 Q. Uh-huh. When did you next see him?
- 21 A. When we arrived at the trailer, went in.
- 22 | Q. What was he doing?
- 23 A. He was sitting there on the bed.
- 24 Q. Did you arrive together, you and Bobby?
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 Q. Where was Rhonda when y'all got there?
- 2 A. Well, I don't know. After we went in the house, she was
- just -- I guess she stood there for a minute and then I
- 4 didn't see her no more after that.
- 5 Q. Stood where?
- 6 A. She was close to Coy's trailer there.
- 7 | Q. Well --
- 8 A. It might have been the one down below it or something.
- 9 Q. Where was she standing?
- 10 A. You could see her in the driveway.
- 11 | Q. In whose driveway?
- 12 A. The main driveway.
- 13 Q. On the road there?
- 14 A. Where the road is.
- 15 Q. The road called Winter Drive?
- 16 A. Yeah.
- 17 | Q. Standing out on Winter Drive?
- 18 A. Yeah, there on the side.
- 19 Q. Was there a porch there at Coy's trailer?
- 20 A. Yes, there was.
- 21 | Q. Is that the way you went in, by going across the porch?
- 22 A. No. We went up the steps and through the front door.
- 23 | Q. But do the steps go up onto the porch?
- 24 A. Yeah.
- 25 | Q. And so you went across it?

- 1 A. We walked up the steps, yeah.
- 2 | Q. Uh-huh. Who went in first?
- 3 A. Bob did. I went behind him.
- 4 Q. Right behind him?
- 5 A. Yeah.
- Q. When you went in the door there, where was Rhonda, can you say?
- 8 A. She was standing out there on the street.
- 9 Q. Had you talked to her by then other than up at the A&P
  10 like you said?
- 11 A. Huh-uh. I thought her and Bob were dating or something. I don't know.
- 13 Q. You thought her and Bob had something going on?
- 14 A. Yeah.
- 15 | Q. What made you think that?
- 16 A. Because -- I don't know, she followed us up there. I
- just thought that they were seeing each other.
- 18 | Q. Anybody say anything to you about that?
- 19 | A. No.
- 20 Q. Were you upset with Bobby because of that?
- 21 A. I never did -- no, not really.
- 22 | Q. But you told her that you were sorry that y'all had
- 23 broke up?
- 24 A. Yeah.
- 25 | Q. Two days before that, would that have been a Tuesday?

- 1 A. Yeah.
- 2 Q. Can you remember what you did on Tuesday?
- 3 A. We stayed at -- I'll tell you exactly where we stayed.
- We stayed at the motel, Red Carpet Inn.
- 5 Q. The Red Carpet Inn?
- 6 A. Yes, we sure did.
- 7 | Q. Did you spend the night there, do you mean?
- 8 A. Yeah.
- 9 Q. Tuesday night?
- 10 A. (Witness nods head)
- 11 Q. Is that where you got up Wednesday morning?
- 12 A. No. We got up at Jolene's Wednesday morning.
- Q. I thought you said you got up at Jolene's Thursday
- 14 morning.
- 15 A. Well, it was Thursday morning. Okay.
- 16 Q. Okay. Tuesday, now, do you remember where you -- do you
- 17 remember Tuesday?
- 18 A. Yeah.
- 19 Q. Who were you with then?
- 20 A. Me and Bob and -- who's that fellow that got shot -- the
- 21 fellow -- I can't think of his name. He's over here in
- 22 jail. Had a big dog with him.
- 23 Q. You and Bob and some other man?
- 24 A. Yeah. I don't know his name. His mama shot him
- 25 anyway.

- Q. On that Tuesday did you go to Coy's?
- 2 A. Yeah.

- 3 | Q. Who went with you?
- A. Bob was -- well, Bob was already down there. I didn't go down there till later on. I slept.
- 6 Q. On Tuesday?
- 7 A. Yeah. Bob was down there all week.
- 8 Q. On Tuesday night didn't you get thrown in jail?
- 9 A. Yeah, we was down at -- let's see, me and Bob went to

  the liquor store and got two pints of vodka and just had

  opened one and the Boone PD come. Well, Rhonda was out

  there. I don't know what she said, and they called the

  police and they brought us to jail.
- Q. Okay. But did you stay at the Red Carpet Inn that night, too?
- 16 A. Yeah, that's where we went. Roger Winkler, yeah, and
  met Monroe and Roger Winkler. That's who was with us.
- 18 Q. Who is Monroe?
- 19 A. Monroe Brown.
- 20 Q. And you met him at the Red Carpet Inn?
- 21 A. No. He come up the jail to get me and Bob, see.
- 22 Q. And got you out of jail?
- 23 A. And we went down to Sollecito's and started drinking.
- Q. And did you -- had you already got your room at the Red Carpet Inn by then?

- A. Well, let's see. We stayed down there a while and Bob went on down to Coy's, I think. Yeah, he went on down to Coy's, and I went --
- 4 Q. How do you know where he went?
- 5 A. Because I went down there later on that night and he was down there.
- 7 Q. That was Tuesday night?
- 8 A. Yeah.
- 9 Q. Do you remember, did you spend the night at the Red
  10 Carpet Inn?
- 11 A. Yes, I did.
- 12 Q. Do you know where Bobby stayed Tuesday night?
- A. Well, he come back to the motel, him and Roger. I don't know how long he stayed. Then I woke up and they was gone.
- 16 Q. Now, what motel are you talking about?
- 17 A. The Red Carpet Inn.
- 18 Q. Okay. On Tuesday did you ever go down to the Longvue?
- 19 A. That evening we went down there.
- 20 Q. Now, was that before or after the Red Carpet Inn?
- 21 A. That was after.
- 22 Q. And what did you do down there?
- A. We just went down there to get some liquor. Next thing
  I know, we went to the liquor store and got some liquor
  and come back and we went to jail.

- Q. From the Longvue?
- 2 A. From the Longvue Motel. They pulled in there,
- Rattlesnake [sic] and three or four other officers, and
- 4 they searched me and Bob, I guess, and they took a knife
- and a sock and a bottle. Didn't take nothing from me
- 6 but my wallet.
  - Q. Did you see what was taken off of Bobby on Tuesday
- 8 night?

- 9 A. Yeah, because Pam and -- I think it was Danny or one of
- them, they took the bottle and stuff. But they give it
- 11 back to him.
- 12 | Q. Are you talking about the jailers?
- 13 A. Yeah.
- 14 | Q. What did you see them take from Bobby?
- 15 A. He had a knife with a grip on it and he had the trailer
- 16 hitch ball in his sock.
- 17 | Q. In a sock?
- 18 A. Yeah, white sock.
- 19 Q. Where did it come from? Did you see where it was on
- 20 him?
- 21 A. It come out of his coat pocket.
- 22 Q. What kind of coat did he have on that night?
- 23 A. That same jacket.
- 24 Q. That what, long raincoat?
- 25 A. (Witness nods head)

- Q. Did you spend Tuesday night at the jail, Mr. Coffey?
- A. No. We didn't stay for I guess about 30 or 40 minutes, called Monroe, and they said somebody sober could come and get us, and he come and got us and we went down there to Sollecito's and started drinking and stuff, just like I said. Bob went on down to Coy's later on
- 7 that night and I went to the Red Carpet Inn.

On Wednesday did you see Bobby?

9 A. Yes, I did.

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Q.

- 10 Q. Where was that?
- 11 A. We was drinking. Let's see, we left -- he was -- we

  12 left the Red Carpet Inn. We was down at Coy's that

  13 morning before the break of daylight. We was down there

  14 waiting and we got two bottles of Cisco wine and drunk

  15 it.
- 16 | Q. Did you get that at the A&P?
- 17 | A. Yeah.
- Q. And you saw -- you were drinking with Bobby in the morning on Wednesday; is that right?
- 20 A. Yeah, I was.
- 21 | Q. And was that at Coy's?
- A. We was at Coy's. We was drinking at Coy's, but we left because we run out of something to drink.
- 24 | Q. What time did you leave Coy's on Wednesday?
- 25 A. I guess it was -- it was pretty early, because -- I

guess just the time for the A&P to open. About 30
minutes me and Bob sat there and finished that bottle of
wine. Then we got two more and we went back and got two
more and --

- Q. On Wednesday what was the last time you saw Bobby, on Wednesday?
- A. Wednesday? Let's see. We went down to Henrick's, sat there drinking. I went up to Jolene's. That was about -- I don't know, it was in the evening. I ain't for sure what time it was.
- 11 | Q. Would you say it was in the middle of the afternoon?
- 12 A. Around -- I guess it was about 3:00 or 4:00. I know it

  13 was getting pretty late.
- 14 Q. And you went to Jolene's?
- 15 A. Yeah.

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- 16 Q. Do you know where Bobby went?
- 17 A. No, I don't.
- 18 | Q. Who was with him?
- 19 A. Who was with Bob?
- 20 Q. Yes.
- A. When I left, he was there at Henrick's and -- let's see,
  Mike Dare was down there and Cora Ann and Greg
  Richardson.
- Q. Did Bobby say anything to you about where he was going?
- 25 A. No.

- 1 | Q. Did he have his guitar with him then?
- 2 A. No, he didn't.
- 3 Q. Do you know where it was?
- 4 A. (Witness shakes head) I think -- yeah, he left it at Coy's, I'm pretty sure. He left it at Coy's.
- Q. Now, you have called a bunch of names who were at Henrick's. Who is Greg Richardson?
- 8 A. Supposed to be Cora Ann's boyfriend. I don't know.
  9 He's from Virginia.
- 10 Q. Who is Cora Ann?
- 11 A. She's my cousin, Cora Ann Teague.
- 12 | Q. And did you see Greg Richardson on that day?
- 13 A. Yeah, I seen him that evening.
- Q. Can you tell the folks here on the jury what Greg
  Richardson looks like.
- 16 A. He's about six foot, about Bobby's size, and he had long
  17 hair like Bobby. Bob's just a little heavier than him.
- That's just about it. They look just alike from the back.
- 20 | Q. What color hair does Greg have?
- 21 A. Black.
- 22 | Q. And that was Wednesday when you saw them at Henrick's?
- 23 A. Yeah.
- 24 | Q. Did you see Greg again that week?
- 25 | A. Yeah, I seen him and Bob that Thursday morning before I

went uptown. 1

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- Whereabouts did you see Bobby the Thursday morning Q. before you went uptown?
- Crossing the road to go to the liquor store. A. 4
- I'm sorry? Q. 5
- Crossing the road to go to the liquor store. A. 6
- They were crossing the road going to the liquor store? 7 Q.
- Getting ready to cross the road. A. 8
- Okay. What time of day was that? Was that before 9:00? Q. 9
- Yeah; because -- no, it was about 9:00. It might have A. 10 been 9:30, because I just woke up, took a shower at 11 Jolene's, and I had to go uptown. 12
- But didn't you go uptown at 9:00? 13
- Yeah, I went there and -- see, I walked down the A&P, Α. met Jim Earp there -- well, I first wanted to go out to 14 15 the flea market, get a ride back out to my dad's. He 16 said he wasn't going out there, he had to go open the 17 So I told him I wanted to go up there. I had an 18 appointment with my attorney and I had to see her.
- But you caught a ride downtown on Wednesday morning with 19 20 Q. Jim Earp, right? 21
- It was Thursday morning. A. 22
- I'm sorry, Thursday morning. You caught a ride downtown Q. 23 with Jim Earp and --24
- Uptown or whatever. Α. 25

- Q. Well, to Boone from down at Watauga Village Shopping
  Center?
- 3 A. Yeah, yeah.
- 4 Q. And that same Thursday morning you saw Greg and Bobby?
- 5 A. Yeah.
- 6 Q. Crossing the road to the liquor store?
- 7 A. Getting ready to cross the road.
- 8 Q. Was that before or after you went to Boone with Jim 9 Earp?
- 10 A. That was right when I was walking up to -- getting ready
  11 to get going up to the A&P. Well, I was going up there

- 17 Q. So you saw Bobby fixing to cross the road Thursday
  18 morning sometime before 9:00, didn't you?
- 19 A. Yeah, about -- it was probably 9:00, 9:15.
- Q. Okay. Did you see Greg any more after that point on Thursday morning?
- 22 A: No, I did not.
- 23 Q. When was the next time you saw him?
- 24 A. Last time I saw him was in jail.
- 25 Q. When was that?

- 1 A. That's been months ago.
- 2 Q. How long after December 8 was it?
- 3 A. I guess sometime in February or March. I ain't for
- 4 sure.
- 5 | Q. Is Greg good friends with your father?
- 6 A. He works for my dad, yes.
- 7 | Q. Do you know if he's still dating your cousin Cora Ann?
- 8 A. No, they ain't together no more.
- 9 Q. Now, when you went to Coy's trailer on the 8th after
- coming back from the liquor store, you say you were the
- first person to hit him?
- 12 A. Yeah, I slapped him in the face.
- 13 | Q. Did you hit him with your fist?
- 14 A. Well, I slapped him. I don't know. I didn't really hit
- 15 him. I slapped him.
- 16 Q. Was it with an open hand or a fist?
- 17 A. Open hand.
- 18 | Q. How did he react to that? Did it knock him down?
- 19 A. No.
- 20 Q. Was he already down?
- 21 A. No, he wasn't down. He was standing up.
- 22 Q. And you say that it was after that that Bobby hit him?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. When you hit him, do you remember what hand or which
- 25 | hands? Did you hit him with both hands or one?

- 1 A. I guess it was my left hand.
- 2 Q. How come you guess it was that?
- 3 A. Well, I usually use my left hand.
- 4 Q. What do you mean, usually?
- 5 A. I'm left-handed.
- 6 Q. Okay. And can you do things right-handed, too?
- 7 A. I guess, yeah.
- 8 Q. Well, I mean, you're not -- do you know what
- 9 ambidextrous is?
- 10 A. Huh-uh.
- 11 Q. You're not both right-handed and left-handed, are you?
- 12 A. Huh-uh.
- 13 Q. When you saw Bobby you say hitting Coy with a white
- 14 sock --
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. -- where was Coy?
- 17 A. He was standing up.
- 18 Q. All right. Standing where?
- 19 A. In front of his bed.
- 20 Q. In his trailer?
- 21 A. Yes.
- 22 | Q. Where were you?
- 23 A. Behind him.
- 24 Q. Behind Coy?
- 25 A. I was behind Bob.

- 1 Q. Where was Bob?

- 8 A. I remember Bob picked the wallet up and give me some
- 9 money and I ran out of there.
- 10 | Q. Well, after Coy was standing up, did anybody hit him any
- 11 more?
- 12 A. After he was -- that was the last time he was hit is
- when he was knocked down when Bob hit him.
- 14 Q. After he was down, nobody hit him?
- 15 A. Not after he -- no, after -- huh-uh.
- 16 Q. While he was getting hit, were they standing
- 17 face-to-face?
- 18 | A. Yeah, just like if you would stand and punch somebody in
- 19 the face, yeah.
- 20 Q. And were you watching the whole time?
- 21 A. Of course. I was there.
- 22 | Q. Okay. And in your panicked state did you notice what
- 23 happened with that white sock?
- 24 A. No, I don't know.
- 25 | Q. But you did notice the wallet?

- 1 A. Yeah. It was a long wallet.
- 2 Q. Can you describe what it looked like?
- 3 A. It was like one of them banker wallets, like that
- 4 (Indicating).
- 5 Q. A banker -- biker wallet?
- 6 A. No. It was like one of them First Union where you put
  7 your money in, the bank things.
- 8 Q. Bank bag?
- 9 A. Yeah.
- 10 Q. Had you ever seen that before?
- 11 A. Yeah, I think I have, yeah.
- 12 Q. Where did you see it before?
- 13 A. Sometimes he carried it in his back pocket.
- 14 Q. In his back pocket?
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. That day did you see him -- ever see Coy with it?
- 17 A. Not till it fell out of his bibs.
- 18 Q. It fell -- not until it fell out of his bibs?
- 19 A. His coveralls.
- 20 Q. You say the bibs had two pockets in them?

- 8 A. At 124 Cole Street.

  that's the one they found under his bed.
- 12 Q. Did you see where the bottle was when the fighting started?
- 14 A. Coy had it laying there on the bed. He always took -
  you notice when he drinks, he just takes a drink and

  he'll usually stick it back under his mattress.
- 17 Q. Did it get any blood on it?
- 18 A. I don't know.

- 19 Q. Did you -- where was Bobby when you last saw him?
- 20 A. When I last saw him?
- 21 Q. Uh-huh, on that day?
- A. He was going towards -- you know where the guitar place is? Around that way. That's the last time I seen him till we was arrested.
  - Q. Was that before or after you ran away when you saw him?

- 1 A. Oh, that was after I ran away, then he come through
- 2 there.
- 3 Q. Where did he come through?
- 4 A. He come straight through behind the A&P.
- 5 Q. And was that after you?
- 6 A. Yes, because I got out of there. I left.
- 7 Q. How long after you was it?
- 8 A. It might have been a minute or two. It couldn't have
- been no more. Two minutes.
- 10 Q. Was anybody with him?
- 11 A. No.
- 12 Q. Did you see his guitar then?
- 13 A. No, I didn't.
- 14 Q. How was he dressed then?
- 15 A. The same clothes he had on.
- 16 | Q. Did you see the white sock?
- 17 A. No, I didn't.
- 18 Q. Did you see the Popov bottle?
- 19 A. No.
- 20 Q. Did you see any blood?
- 21 A. I was in such a shock, I didn't really pay no attention.
- 22 Q. Was anybody with him?
- 23 A. He was by hisself.
- Q. Were you at the A&P when you say you saw him?
- 25 A. Yeah.

- 1 Q. Did you say anything to him?
- 2 A. I didn't say nothing to him, no.

- 8 A. Yeah. He was out of sight in I guess a minute.
- 9 Q. Was anybody with him ever?
- 10 A. He was by hisself.
- 11 Q. Do you know what time that was?
- 12 A. No, I don't.
- 13 Q. Was it dark yet?
- 14 | A. No, it wasn't dark.
- 15 Q. Was it getting dark?
- 16 A. It was getting dark.
- 17 Q. Was the A&P still open?
- 18 A. I think, yeah, it was.
- 19 Q. Was it busy over at the Chinese restaurant?
- 20 A. I didn't pay no attention to the restaurant over there.
- I know there wasn't many people there.
- 22 Q. Did you know if Coy had a ring?
- 23 A. No, I don't. I think he used to wear a watch, but I
- 24 don't know --
- 25 | Q. Wear one ring?

- 1 A. He used to wear a watch, but I ain't never seen him wear 2 a ring.
- 3 Q. Did you ever know about him having a gold ring?

- 12 A. No. First time I ever saw it, didn't even know Bob

  13 carried it. They took it from him at the jailhouse.
- 14 Q. But that wasn't that day, was it?
- 15 A. No, huh-uh.
- 16 Q. But on the 8th did you see it before you say he pulled it out at Coy's trailer?
- 18 A. I seen it two days before that.
- Q. Okay. But on the 8th, the first time you saw it on the 8th was there at Coy's trailer; is that right?
- 21 A. Yeah.
- Q. You said that you talked to Bobby at the mailboxes about whether Coy had any money?
- A. He asked me if he had any money, and I said, I don't know. I said, I'm going to take his liquor up there.

- 1 Q. You didn't know whether he had any money?
- 2 A. No, not at that time, because he give me \$3.35. I don't
- know whether -- he was pretty tight with his money,
- 4 so ---
- Q. How come you agreed to rob him if you didn't know if he had any money?
- 7 A. I don't know. I guess I'm just easy to talk into something. I don't know.
- 9 Q. This fellow you say that you were drinking with at one time during that week named Henrick, what's his -- is his last name Ossowski?
- 12 A. Yeah.
- 13 Q. Does he live there in that trailer park?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. Can you describe what he looks like?
- 16 A. He's got -- he's a German, blonde-haired, about five
- foot eight, five-nine, I guess, weigh about 140, 150
- pounds.
- 19 Q. What color is his hair?
- 20 A. Blonde.
- 21 Q. Does he have anything special he wears?
- 22 A. Yeah. He wears a leather jacket.
- Q. Anything special about that leather jacket different
- 24 than any other?
- 25 A. He's just got all different kinds of pins on it.

- 1 Q. Pins and things hanging on it?
- 2 A. Yeah.
- 3 Q. And is it black?
- 4 A. Yeah.

- Q. Do you know of anything that anybody else left behind there?
- 20 A. I don't know. There's people always coming and going.
  21 Ain't no telling.
- Q. How about -- did you know of anything Bob had with him when you say he was in there that he didn't come away with?
- 25 A. Not that I know of.

  - A. I didn't burn nothing. I didn't have no reason to burn nothing.
  - Q. The very next morning -- you spent the night at Shirley Faircloth's that night of the 8th, didn't you?
- 10 A. Yes, I did.
- Q. And it was the very next morning that you got woke up by the police at the door there?
  - A. I didn't get woke up by the police. Hazel Byers called and said they found Coy Hartley dead. Shirley asked me if I knowed anything about it, and I didn't say nothing. I said no. That's all I said. And the police come and they said they wanted to question me about a probation violation. I was going to go back to court or back to prison on the 3rd. And I come with them, and they asked me where my clothes was. I took a shower that morning. I wore them clothes to Blowing Rock. That man right there that's sitting behind you, he seen me that night with the same clothes on, that police officer right there. I don't know his name.
    - Q. The sheriff's deputy back there?

- A. I think it was him or his -- T.W. Caldwell, one of them. He was at the --
  - Q. Either Caldwell or Fletcher?
- 4 A. It was one of them. I didn't change clothes till that
  5 morning. I took a shower that morning.
- Q. But the next morning you got a phone call from Hazel saying that Coy was dead?
- 8 A. Yes.

- 9 Q. And Shirley asked you, she said, they're not going to blame that on you, are they, didn't she?
- 11 A. It was something like that.
- Q. And you said -- and you lied to her and told her you didn't know anything about it?
- 14 A. I said -- yeah.
- Q. And you say the police came there wanting to question you about a probation violation?
- A. Something about going back to court, because they were supposed to send me back to prison on the 6th.
- Q. Was it probably about 9:00 that they came up there and got you?
- A. I don't know what time it was. It might have been -- I know I had got up. I had took a shower. It was about 9:00 or 10:00. It might have been 11:00. I ain't for sure.
  - Q. Did they take you in then on the 9th?

- A. Yes, they did. They questioned me for about five hours,

  I think.
  - Q. That wasn't about a probation violation, was it?
  - A. No, it wasn't. And they asked if they needed a search warrant to go get my clothes, and I told them they was down there in the clothes hamper, so they went and got them.
  - Q. And you gave them a long statement telling them all about what you said you knew about Coy that day, didn't you?
- 11 A. Yes, I did. But a lot of it was false.
- Q. Did you give that statement because you wanted to or because they asked you about it?
- 14 A. Well, they asked me about it.

- Q. Can you describe for the jury there the way that they
  treated you that day, what kind of questions they asked,
  the way they treated you.
- A. Basically like the questions you was asking me. I guess
  they was trick questions, whatever. I don't know what
  you want to call them.
- Q. How many hours did you talk to them or did they talk to you?
- 23 A. I guess it was four or five hours.
- 24 | Q. Who was it that you were talking to, do you remember?
- 25 A. Mr. Shook and Jim Harrison and Steve Wilson, I believe.

- Q. And that was the day -- and you told them from the get-go that you saw Bobby and Joe Cothren?
- 3 A. Yes, I did.
- Q. You said you didn't have anything to do with killing
  Coy?
- A. Yeah. I said I wasn't there, yeah. I don't know if I actually said -- I don't know exactly what it was.
- Q. Do you know of anybody besides you and you say Bobby who saw any blood around that place before the police got there?
- 11 A. Could you -- repeat.
- 12 | Q. Over at Coy's trailer, you say that you saw blood?
- 13 | A. Yes.
- 14 | Q. And you say that Bobby was there?
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 | Q. And would you say that Bobby saw blood?
- 17 | A. I guess he did, yeah.
- 18 Q. And who else saw blood over there?
- 19 A. Me, and I guess when the police arrived, they seen it.
- 20 Q. What about Rhonda?
- 21 A. Rhonda didn't even come inside.
- 22 | Q. Did you talk to Rhonda about what was going on?
- A. I never did talk to her. I said -- I told you I talked to her twice that day, just said hello and that was it.
- 25 | Q. Do you know Bonnie Jean Crawley?

- 1 A. No, I don't.
- Q. Some woman that works at the Hospitality House some teaching named Bonnie Jean or Bonnie or Jean?
- 4 A. I don't know her.
- Do you remember seeing somebody down around Makoto's
  earlier in that week where you and Bobby were drunk and
  Bobby was asking about getting his hair cut?
- 8 A. No, I don't.
- 9 Q. You don't remember that?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 | Q. Do you remember drinking and being down around Makoto's?
- 12 A. Makoto's? Yeah, I remember being down there.
- 13 Q. When was that?
- 14 A. That was on that Tuesday before we got took to jail.
- Q. Was that the same night that you got took to jail and got out with Monroe Brown?
- 17 A. Yes, it was that evening. I don't know whether it was night. It was sometime in that evening.
- 19 Q. What were you doing down around Makoto's?
- 20 A. Well, we was just down there drinking, seeing Henrick
  21 and all of them. Wasn't nothing unusual going down
  22 there.
- 23 Q. Were you at somebody's place?
- A. Yeah, we was down at Henrick's for a while and I went up

  Jolene's, just like I said.

- 1 Q. And was Bobby there?
- 2 A. Yeah.
- 3 | Q. You remember yourself having a fifth of liquor?
- 4 A. I don't remember having no fifth of liquor. I know I got one that night I went to Jolene's.
- 6 Q. That was the same night, wasn't it?
- 7 A. Yeah, a fifth of Jack Daniels, yeah.
- 8 Q. And that was what night?
- 9 A. That was Wednesday night.
- 10 | Q. Wednesday night?
- 11 A. Yeah. That Tuesday night we didn't have no liquor. We had two pints of liquor.
- Q. Okay. Now, was that -- the night that you were at

  Makoto's, was that the night you went to jail or some

  other night?
- A. Makoto's? No, we didn't go to jail that night. We was at the Longvue when we went to jail. That was on Tuesday.
- Q. On Tuesday when you went to jail, Mr. Coffey, they picked you up at the Longvue?
- 21 A. Yes.
- Q. Had they come to see you and talk to you, the police,
  before then about giving some -- about being in trouble
  with people and you asked them to let you go to the
  Longvue so that you could stay there instead of go to

jail?

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- A. No. Bob asked them if we could go over there to see somebody, and they wouldn't -- they took us on to jail.

  They poured our liquor out.
  - Q. Where were you when he was wanting to go over there?
- 6 A. Where was we? We was right there in front of the Longvue Motel.
- 8 | Q. On that same side of the street?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. Is that across the street from The Peddler?
- 11 A. I don't know if it's The Peddler. No, the -- let's see,

  12 Longvue -- there's a Pantry right up above it. Yeah, I

  13 guess there is a Peddler there across there, that

  14 restaurant.
- Q. Had you been to The Pantry with Bobby on that Tuesday night?
- 17 A. To The Pantry?
- 18 Q. Yes, sir, there across from the Longvue?
- 19 A. I don't know if we went over there to get a chaser or
  20 not. I think we did. Yeah, we was over at The Pantry,
  21 that is right, went over there and got a chaser. And
  22 Rhonda, Rhonda was right there. She's the one that had
  23 the law come up there. I don't know.
  - Q. And that was Tuesday?
- 25 | A. Yeah. I didn't even say nothing to her. Then Bob was

- 310 1 walking, had our liquor, we we're going across the road, 2 and the next thing I know, Boone PD pulled in. 3 That's when they took you to jail? Q. Yeah. They poured the liquor out and put me and Bob in 4 A. 5 separate cars. I don't know. 6 Q. Can you name the people that you have talked to about 7 what -- made statements to about what happened at Coy's? 8 The people -- only people I've talked to is just Jim Α. 9 Harrison and Mark Shook and Steve Wilson and my lawyer. 10 Q. You talked to Jonathan Jones, didn't you? 11 Α. Was he SBI? 12 Q. Yes, sir. 13 I guess I did. 14 Q. You talked to your dad about it, didn't you? 15 Α. Yes, I did. 16 You talked to Shirley about it later on, didn't you? 17 Never did talk to Shirley about it. 18 0. If she said you said anything about it in front of her, 19 she wouldn't be telling the truth, would she?
- 20 MR. RUSHER: Objection.
- 21 THE COURT: Overruled.
- 22 I didn't understand that.
- 23 Q. If Shirley said -- was to say that you said something 24 about Coy's death in front of her about how it happened, 25 that wouldn't be true?

1 MR. RUSHER: Objection.

THE COURT: Overruled.

3 A. No.

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- Q. I'm sorry, what was your answer?
- 5 A. No, it wouldn't, because I ain't never said nothing to her about it.
- Q. Did you talk to the police or any SBI agents about this case while you were over in Ashe County jail before they brought you over here?
- 10 A. No, I have not -- yeah -- I didn't talk about it. He come -- what's his name come over, Steve Wilson, the blonde-headed one.
- 13 Q. Right.

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- 14 A. Wanted to know if I wanted to give a statement, and I

  15 said no. I signed a waiver. That was it. I didn't say

  16 nothing else to him.
- 17 Q. Didn't you tell him that Coy was sitting on the bed?
- A. Didn't tell him nothing about that when he come to see me over there, not that I know of.
  - Q. Have you made statements to a number of people over here in the Watauga County jail about it?
- 22 A. Just Mark Shook and Jim Harrison and Steve Wilson.
- Q. How long did you spend over there between that time until you were tried for that case?
- 25 A. Well, me and Bob was over there a year or so and talked

about it off and on, and he didn't want to testify. He
was wanting some -- he was wanting to see my handwriting
and stuff, and I give him two samples of my
handwriting. I don't know why he wanted to see my
handwriting, how I wrote, if I signed them statements.

And I told them about signing them statements on him,
but that was about it.

- Q. How long were you over in the jail before you were tried is what I asked you.
- 10 A. I was over there almost a year.
- Q. And you didn't talk to anybody over there the whole time?
- A. Me and Bob talked about it, I guess Lamont, and I don't know.
- 15 Q. Who is Lamont?

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- 16 A. That police officer they got charged. Him and Bob is
  17 good buddies, I guess. I don't know. They was right
  18 across from each other.
- 19 | Q. Who else did you talk to over there?
- A. There's been hundreds of people that's come in there. I
  mean, me and Bob, we've talked about the case off and
  on. Ain't no telling who's hearing what.
  - Q. Well, you have said that you told certain lies or untruths to the police about your case?
  - A. Oh, just about Joe Cocker, and that was basically --

- well, that was basically it and a few other things. I can't specifically remember exactly.
  - Q. Did you tell anything that wasn't true to anybody besides the police?
- 5 A. No.

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- Q. So the other people you talked to, you told them the truth?
- 8 A. I didn't talk to nobody else but my dad.
- 9 Q. I thought you said hundreds of people have been over there that you talked to.
- 11 A. I mean -- no, me and Bob was talking, yeah. No, just -
  12 he thought we was going to beat it and everything and go

  13 along with him, so --
- Q. Did you tell anybody a lie about your case except for the police?
- 16 A. Oh, yeah. I told my lawyer -- at first I told him a

  17 lie, yeah. I didn't tell him the truth.
- Q. Anybody over in the jail, just people that were there in jail like you?
- A. We didn't really go into it much. We was just talking
  about -- didn't have no evidence on it, no fingerprints
  or no blood or nothing. Just basically Bob said don't
  worry about it, everything's going to be all right.
  - Q. Did you talk to a man named Jonathan Harmon?
- 25 A. No, I never did talk to him. I know what you're going

to try to bring up. He's trying to say that I give him a statement, I said that I killed Coy. That's all a lie. Him and Bob, they had all that made up, him and Bob and all of them. That was all a big rumor.

Q. All right.

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MR. HEDRICK: I'd ask the witness be instructed to be responsive to the questions.

THE COURT: Well, sustained. Members of the jury, you're not to consider the witness's suspicions.

- Q. My question was, did you talk to Jonathan Harmon?
- 11 A. Yeah, I've talked to him.
- 12 Q. Did you lie to him or tell him the truth?
- A. I didn't tell him nothing. He made a bunch of lies up
  on me. I didn't like him anyway to start with. He was
  just a little old punk and I just didn't pay no
  attention to him.
- 17 Q. You say you talked to him, right?
- 18 A. Yeah.
- 19 Q. When you talked to him, the things that you said, were 20 they true or were they a lie?
- 21 A. If I talked to him, it was just nature. I just -22 depends on what we was talking about.
- 23 | Q. Did you talk to somebody named Shawn Delp?
- 24 A. Who?
- 25 Q. Shawn Delp.

- 1 A. No idea. I know Shawn Valdez.
- 2 | Q. Did you talk to him?
- 3 A. Yeah. He was supposed to come and testify for us
- 4 about -- apparently Linda Nelson was his wife or
- 5 something and --
- 6 Q. I just want to know if you talked to him.
- 7 A. Yeah, I talked to him, but it wasn't --
- 8 Q. Did you tell him the truth?
- 9 MR. RUSHER: Your Honor, counsel is
- 10 interrupting. I think he was telling --
- THE COURT: Well, he's answered the question.
- 12 A. Yeah, I talked to him.
- 13 Q. Did you tell him the truth?
- 14 | A. Tell him the truth about what?
- 15 | Q. Whatever it is, you told him about this.
- 16 A. I ain't told him nothing. I just told him that they
- had -- I didn't kill Coy. Yeah, I told him the truth.
- 18 I didn't kill him.
- 19 | Q. Did you talk to Roger Donald Worley?
- 20 A. I know Donald Worley. I didn't talk to him, no.
- 21 | Q. Did you say anything in front of him that you know of?
- 22 A. We was all out there together. We all might have said
- 23 something about the case. We was always talking about
- 24 it. I don't know.
- 25 | Q. Well, when you were always talking about it over there,

- did you tell the truth or were you lying?
- 2 A. Best of my knowledge, I guess I was telling them the truth.
- 4 Q. Do you remember giving six separate statements to the police?
- 6 A. I don't know how many I give. I know I give two or three. I don't know how many.
- Q. You remember the first time you talked to them was on the 9th of December, wasn't it?
- 10 A. Yeah.
- 11 Q. That very next day?
- 12 | A. Yeah, that morning.
- Q. And then about a month later on the 6th of January at about 2:00 in the afternoon you talked to the police
- 15 again, didn't you?
- 16 A. Yeah, I did.
- 17 Q. You hadn't been arrested up to then, had you?
- 18 A. No, I hadn't.
- 19 Q. But Bobby already had, hadn't he?
- 20 A. Yes, he had.
- Q. And you talked to them from about 2:00 until right at 4:30, didn't you?
- 23 A. Yes.
- 24 | Q. Who did you talk to then?
- 25 A. I ain't for sure. I think it was Jim Harrison and

Mark.

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- Q. Okay. What kind of -- how did they treat you when they asked you the questions on that occasion?
- A. I guess just -- just like you would be talking to me,
  but not -- I don't know if it was harsh or -- I don't
  know, I might have took it as being a little harsh. I
- 8 Q. Did they accuse you of lying?
- 9 A. Mr. Harrison did, yes.

don't know.

- 10 Q. Did you change your story when they accused you of that, 11 or part of it?
- 12 A. I think so, yes.
- Q. And on that same day, that first interview on the 6th of January ended about 4:30, didn't it?
- 15 A. I ain't for sure. I think so.
- Q. But then come about ten minutes after five you talked to
  Mark Shook again, didn't you, made another statement?
- 18 A. I think so.
- 19 Q. You talked to him up till about 6:00?
- A. Yeah, I think me and him talked by hisself, because I

  couldn't talk to Jim. I don't know whether I was having

  some kind of problem or -- well, it was me. I just

  couldn't relate with Jim. I don't know, he was kind of

  pressuring me and I could talk to Mark better.
  - Q. Mark was a whole lot friendlier to you?

- A. Well, I went to school with Mark, so I don't know, I could just talk to him better.
- Q. You talked the same kind of language? I think you'd used those words before, hadn't you?
- 5 A. Yes.

- Q. And then you talked to Mark Shook again on March 21, didn't you?
  - A. If that's the day we went and took the polygraph, yes, it was.
- Q. And you talked -- after you made a statement to Mark
  Shook that day, you made a statement to Agent Jones?
- 12 A. J.J. Jones.
- 13 | Q. SBI agent, didn't you?
- 14 A. Yes.
- Q. Then you made another statement after that to Mark
  Shook, too, didn't you?
- 17 A. I guess I did.
- Q. And on those occasions, on any of those times did you promise to tell them the truth?
- 20 A. Did I -- yeah, I eventually told him the truth, yeah.
- 21 Q. But each --
- 22 A. I didn't promise, no, but I told them.
- Q. And on each of those occasions, though, some of what you said wasn't true, was it?
- 25 | A. Yes.

- . 1 Q. And on each of those occasions you never said the same thing twice, did you?
- 3 A. No, I didn't.
- Every time it was --Q.
- 5 Well, I didn't fully understand them through all of it. I didn't understand a lot of it. 6
- 7 Q. How come?
- 8 A. I just didn't understand it.
- 9 Q. Well, I mean, was it because of the way they were asking 10 the questions or the circumstances that you were in or 11 what was the reason?
- 12 I don't know, I just wasn't -- I don't know. 13 on my medication there for a week or two and I don't 14 know if that -- I just didn't want to hear it, I guess, 15 or I just didn't care what I told them. I don't know.
  - Q. You were not able to pay attention to what they were asking you, is that part of it?
- 18 I'd say it could have been some of it.
- 19 Q. And when is it that you weren't on your medication?
- 20 Oh, I was out of it for a couple weeks.
  - Q. Can you say when those weeks were, what month it was?
- 22 Α. I don't remember.
- 23 Q. Do you remember which one of those statements you were 24 making during the time when you weren't on your 25 medicine?

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- 1 A. No, I don't.
- 2 | Q. What kind of medicine was it?
- 3 A. I take -- let's see, Prozac -- I don't know, I think I
- was on Prozac then and nerve medication, some other kind
- 5 of medication.
- 6 Q. What's the medication for?
- 7 A. It's for being depressed and I don't know what all. I take several different kinds of medication. I do now.
- 9 Q. Did you say you do now?
- 10 A. (Witness nods head)
- 11 Q. What kind of medicine do you take now?
- 12 A. I've just been on it about three months for -- I think
- it's seizures, and it's an antidepressant and I take
- 14 | something for -- hear voices, I don't know, some kind.
- 15 | Q. What do you take for hearing voices?
- 16 A. I don't know what the name of it is.
- 17 Q. Well, where did you get it?
- 18 A. Psychiatrist put me on it.
- 19 Q. Does it help?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. Are you taking that stuff now?
- 22 | A. Yes.
- 23 Q. Do they have to adjust it sometimes?
- 24 | A. No. It's been helping me good since I went on it.
- 25 | Q. Do you know the name -- you don't know the name of it?

- 1 A. I know one of them is Zoloft and the other one is
- 2 Cogentin and I don't know what the other one is.
- 3 Q. Have you ever heard of Haldol?
- 4 A. No, I ain't on no Haldol. That stuff locks you up.
- 5 Q. Do they give it to you in pills or shots or what?
- 6 A. Capsules.
- 7 Q. How often do you have to take that?
- 8 A. I take it once at breakfast, once at dinner, and I take 9 a Zoloft at night.
- 10 | Q. And today what have you had?
- 11 A. I've took my Cogentin and my other pill this morning and
- 12 I've took my other pill at dinner.
- 13 | Q. What did you take at dinner?
- 14 A. It's the same pill, Cogentin, and the capsule pill and
- 15 I'm taking an antibiotic pill, too.
- 16 | Q. What's the Cogentin for?
- 17 A. I don't know.
- 18 | Q. Did that get prescribed to you by the psychiatrist?
- 19 A. Yes.
- Q. And the other pills that you're taking besides the
- 21 antibiotic, who prescribed them?
- 22 A. The doctor, because they pulled some teeth and they got
- 23 infected.
- Q. I'm talking about besides that. Is that something --
- 25 are you taking an antibiotic because you had the tooth

pulled?

- 2 A. Yeah, I had to. Yeah, it was in my sinus up here that got infected (Indicating).
- Q. What else are you taking that's prescribed by the psychiatrist besides the Cogentin?
- 6 A. Cogentin and Zoloft and I don't know what the name is of the other pill.
- 8 Q. When did you take the Zoloft last?
- 9 A. I took it last night. I don't take it till tonight.
- 10 Q. Do you know what size dose it is?
- 11 A. It's a hundred milligrams.
- Q. And what about the Cogentin, how much of that do you take?
- 14 | A. It's 2.5. I don't know.
- 15 Q. And --
- 16 A. I take two of them a day.
- Q. While you were in jail, you quit taking your medicine for a while?
- 19 A. Well, I didn't quit taking it. They just couldn't get
  20 it. I run out and had to go back to the doctor.
- Q. On December 8 of '94 were you taking that kind of medicine?
- 23 A. I ain't for sure. They have had me on two or three 24 different kinds of medicine.
- 25 | Q. Were you supposed to be taking that kind of medicine on

December 8 of '94?

- A. I know they put me on it when I was -- and they changed it again. I went to see the doctor up here, so --
- Q. On December 8 of '94 do you know if you were supposed to be taking any medicine?
- A. I guess I was, but I don't remember if I took anything or not. I know I was supposed to be taking it.
- Q. Who helps you keep up with -- who back then was helping you keep up with your medicine?
- 10 A. Pam or whoever at work brings it to me.
- 11 Q. Who? I'm sorry, I didn't hear what you said.
- 12 | A. The head jailer over there, the jailer.
- 13 Q. I'm talking about on December 8 of '94.
- 14 A. Oh, '94? I wasn't even on no medicine in '94.
- Q. Had you been on medicine of that kind before December 8 of '94?
- 17 A. Yeah, but it's been a couple years before that.
- 18 Q. And you just quit taking that on your own?
- 19 A. Yeah. Well, I couldn't afford to pay for it, yeah.
- 20 Q. And was that medicine for voices?
- 21 A. No, huh-uh.
- Q. Was it medicine that had been prescribed by a psychiatrist?
- 24 A. Huh-uh.
- 25 | Q. What was the name of that kind of medicine before

- 1 December 8 of '94 you were taking?
- 2 A. I don't remember the name. I know it was an
- 3 antidepressant, that's all.
- 4 | Q. Do you know who prescribed it?
- 5 A. It was a doctor prescribed it.
- 6 | Q. Well, do you know where the doctor was?
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. Do you know the doctor's name?
- 9 A. No, I don't.
- 10 | Q. Where was the doctor?
- 11 A. At Banner Elk.
- 12 Q. Was it at Cannon Hospital?
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. Was that on the fourth floor of Cannon Hospital?
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. Were you committed over there?
- 17 A. No. I went voluntarily.
- 18 Q. Did you stay a while?
- 19 | A. Yes.
- 20 | Q. And when was it that you were last at Cannon?
- 21 A. Right after my place burned down. That's been -- I
- 22 can't remember.
- 23 MS. FANNON: Your Honor, may I interrupt and
- 24 be heard out of the presence of the jury?
- 25 A. About four or five year ago.

THE COURT: Members of the jury, we're going to take our afternoon recess in a few moments, so I'll let you take a 15-minute recess at this time. Please keep in mind and abide by the instructions I've given you as to your conduct. You're free to step out for a recess.

(The jury exited the courtroom at 3:14 p.m.)

PROCEEDINGS IN THE COURTROOM OUT OF THE PRESENCE OF THE

JURY

THE COURT: Okay, Ms. Fannon.

MS. FANNON: Your Honor, I feel this line of questioning is leading to what's already been addressed before, and that is that he is trying to get in the back door what he couldn't get in the front door earlier when he asked for records of Mr. Coffey's stays at Broughton and other places and his records from his attorneys, and I think since he didn't get it pursuant to subpoenas and motions, now he's trying to open the door to get it through Mr. Coffey, and I would advise Mr. Coffey now to invoke his privilege between him, his doctors, and lawyers again as we'd done earlier.

THE COURT: All right. As I said earlier, the privilege in that regard is Mr. Coffey's and it's up to him to invoke it if he wishes to.

MS. FANNON: Can I speak with him?

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THE COURT: I don't think an objection -- I know you didn't make an objection, but you asked to be heard. It's up to Mr. Coffey whether he wishes to answer it or not.

THE WITNESS: I'd rather not even talk about it, sir, but he asked me.

THE COURT: Well, your lawyer can explain to you what your rights are in that regard.

Do you wish to be heard at this time, Mr. Hedrick, before we recess as to --

MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, there's no privilege against him telling -- I mean, you can't keep from the triers of fact a witness's medical history coming from the witness himself. There's no privilege that he can invoke.

THE COURT: Not coming from the witness, but there is a physician -- a psychiatrist-patient privilege and depending on what a person is asked, they have the right to assert the privilege and not tell you. It's their privilege to give up or not as they wish.

MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, he's given it up, so the door is open. It's out. But I contend that these are -- even if there is a privilege, it should be quite apparent that this is of critical importance in a capital murder case. It's issues that he's voluntarily

talked about already that have been brought up in his own trial by his own attorney. The statute authorizes that to be overcome even if it exists, and I contend it's already been waived.

THE COURT: Ms. Fannon, do you wish to be heard with regard to whether or not what he's being asked is material and competent in this case and whether its disclosure to this jury outweighs the privilege of whether or not this Court should order the witness to testify in this regard?

MS. FANNON: I would, Your Honor. The particular instance that we have already started into here as I was objecting is something that was apparently several years ago that was not at a time when any of these incidents occurred, and it delves into background that is personal to just Mr. Coffey and is not in any way pertinent to this matter. I think he testified it was several years prior to that and he said he had a doctor and that he went to Cannon and that he's on medication, and I think that asking him why he's on it delves into things that he's just not willing to discuss, that it's not something that the import of it to this jury — I fail to see the importance of it to this jury, given the time lapse, and I just don't think the importance of it outweighs his right to that

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privilege. I think we would start causing people not to seek help if we start interfering with that privilege at some later date.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you, ma'am. Do you have something else you wish to say?

MS. FANNON: Your Honor, I don't know the numbers too well, but under 403 in the evidence code, seems to me that there's a question here of excluding it -- first of all, it is confusing, which is one of the areas. We have jumped back and forth from when he was in jail to the date of the incident all the way back to two or three years ago. And under 403, it says even if it's relevant, it may be excluded if its substantial -if its probative value is outweighed by his interest in asserting these things. We would contend that given the time period that it is certainly outweighed. relevant to this incident what he was taking two years before this incident occurred or whatever the time period was, and that he certainly has a right to not reveal that, knowing that once he reveals it, then his doctor can be brought in to testify.

THE COURT: The Court will find based upon the evidence before it at this time that a physician-patient relationship existed between this witness and any psychiatrist that may have treated him; that it's

apparent that this witness either gave or through testing the psychiatrist received information necessary to enable the health care provider to prescribe certain medications for this witness; that the treatment this witness received is competent and relates to a material fact in the trial of this case in that it may relate to his credibility as a witness wherein he contends he is an eyewitness to the crime with which the defendant is charged and being tried in the case, and up until this time the Court has been advised of no other competent manner by which this information may be brought before the Court.

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Based upon those findings, which also included the witness has already testified in response to questions that he had had a previous head injury which required a hospital stay of some days, surgery, has had two plates placed in his head, that he takes several kinds of prescribed medications, one of which is Prozac, that he's now taking medication for hearing voices, all prescribed by psychiatrists, and that he at some time prior to this occasion voluntarily admitted himself to the fourth floor of Cannon Memorial Hospital, which the Court will take notice that of the Court's own knowledge that's the psychiatric ward, and he stated that he has taken prescribed medication today.

1 Based upon those findings of fact, the Court 2 concludes that the disclosure of this information 3 through this witness is necessary to a proper 4 administration of justice and is competent evidence 5 bearing on a very material thing in this case, being the credibility of this witness's testimony. 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STATEMENT AGAI

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## **Detective Mark Shook**

Detective Harrison testified that he was a detective sergeant with BPD.<sup>67</sup> He further testified to his observations of the crime scene, items collected from the crime scene, his involvement in the investigation of the Victim's death, and his interviews with Rene Nelson, Jeffrey Nelson, Coffey, and others.<sup>68</sup>

On cross examination, Detective Harrison testified that at the request of defense attorneys, he processed the vodka bottle for latent prints and submitted the latent prints to the SBI for comparison. The lab noted one print of value for identification. The fingerprints of Coffey, Bragg, the Victim, and two employees of the ABC store were submitted for comparison. Detective Harrison further testified on cross examination that he did not have any laboratory analysis performed on the trailer hitch ball. I personally viewed and examined this trailer hitch ball to see if I could locate any presence of blood or any other matter, and I was not able to." Detective Harrison testified that he felt inside the pocket that

the trailer hitch ball came out of and looked for blood all over the clothing Bragg was wearing when he was arrested. As he recalled, he did not find any blood on the clothes and the clothes were somewhat soiled.<sup>72</sup>

With respect to what the Victim was wearing at the time of the autopsy, Detective

Harrison testified on cross examination that the Victim did not have on overalls.<sup>73</sup> Detective

Harrison testified that he did not show the photographs of Bragg, Joe Cothren, or Greg

Richardson to Rene Nelson on December 15<sup>th</sup>, and that he did not discuss with Rene Nelson any payment of funds from CrimeStoppers or any other reward-type agency for her testimony in the case.<sup>74</sup>

## **Agent Jonathon Jones**

Agent Jones testified that he was an agent for the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation.<sup>75</sup> He further testified about three statements Coffey made to him on March 21, 1995. These statements were introduced for corroboration purposes.<sup>76</sup> See the statements Coffey made to Agent Jones in law enforcement investigation section above.<sup>77</sup>

#### Officer Randall Rasnake

BPD Patrolman, Officer Rasnake, testified at both Coffey and Bragg's trials. His testimony regarding statements made to him by Bragg regarding the trailer hitch ball in a sock

that Officer Rasnake located during a search of Bragg in early December 1994 differed at the trials. At Bragg's trial Officer Rasnake testified as follows:

Q: Sir, did you make some comment to Mr. Bragg concerning the trailer hitch ball and the sock?

A: Yes, sir, I did.

Q: What did you say to him?

A: I asked him why he was carrying something like that around.

Q: What did he say?

A: As best I can recall, he stated, I never know when I might need to use it on somebody.

MR. HEDRICK: Move to strike if that's just the best he can recall.

THE COURT: Well, sustained unless you recall what he said. Members of the jury, you're not to consider—

Q: Did you make some notes as to what things were done and said on that night?

A: Yes, sir, I did.

Q: Are you able to look at your notes and refresh yourself as to what was said?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: What did he say?

A: I have written that Bobby said, I never know when I might need to use it on someone.<sup>78</sup>

On cross examination, Officer Rasnake was asked about the inconsistencies between his testimony at Coffey's trial and his testimony on direct examination at Bragg's trial. Officer Rasnake could not recall his testimony at Coffey's trial.<sup>79</sup>

# **Officer Gerald Hayes**

BPD Patrolman, Officer Hayes testified to seeing both Bragg and Coffey on Tuesday,

December 6, 1994 in the area of The Pantry and Longvue Motel. Officer Hayes observed Officer

Rasnake search Bragg and seize a white athletic-type sock with a trailer hitch ball inside. He

further testified: "There at the scene Patrolman Rasnake asked him why he was carrying

something like that around, and Mr. Bragg's statement was, you never know when you might

need to use it on somebody." Officer Hayes testified that while he and Bragg were traveling

towards the Sheriff's Department in his patrol car he asked Bragg the same question that

Officer Rasnake did and that Bragg's reply was "man, you never know, you might need it out

there." 12

# **Bonnie Jean Crawley**

Crawley testified that she saw Bragg and Coffey at 5:00 PM on Wednesday, December 7, 1994, the day before the murder. She saw them at a shed behind the old Pepper's restaurant. Bragg asked her to cut his hair and she agreed to do it on Friday morning. Crawley testified that both Bragg and Coffey were intoxicated. Crawley testified that she gave this statement to the DA's Office about ten days prior to her testimony in February 1996, which was approximately 14 months after the crime. She testified that she came forward after having a conversation with a friend at the Hospitality House.<sup>83</sup>

- 13 Q. How do you know Kenneth Coffey?
- A. He used to live in our neighborhood with this lady named Rhonda Carson.
  - Q. Where did they live at?
  - A. Like on the first street. But I could see straight across through my neighbor Harold Jones's yard straight across and see their trailer from my door, from my porch.
  - Q. While they were residents there, did you ever have any difficulties with them?
  - A. Yeah. It was more or less with Rhonda. She thought that I called her with the landlord and talked to him, but he even went and told her I never talked to him

1 about her.

- Q. Well, did you ever have any words with Kenneth about that?
- 4 A. He had words with me.
- 5 Q. What were those words?
  - A. That he would beat my brains out or something or another. I don't remember. It's been like two years ago almost since that happened. I don't remember.
- 9 Q. Were you ever in Kenneth's trailer?
- 10 A. In that trailer?
- 11 Q. Yes.
  - A. No, I don't think -- no. I went over there and got

    Jeffrey a couple times, but I was just at the door. I

    never actually stepped into the door. Jeffrey used to
    go over there and play with Rhonda's son TJ, I think.

    He used to like playing Nintendo with Jeffrey. He

    wasn't there long with his mom, though.
    - Q. And you say you'd seen Bobby, as you called him, or Big Bob, four or five times before?
    - A. Not on that day but in our neighborhood, yeah. I didn't know him except if I had seen him -- I mean, like I said, I've never had acquaintance with him. I never talked to him or anything like that, no.
    - Q. Do you recall giving a statement as to what he was wearing that day?

STATE V. BRAGG

- 1 A. I do not remember what he was wearing that day.
- 2 | Q. But you remember him carrying something in his hand?
  - A. Yeah, I can remember that it was dark like a sock and it
- had something round and heavy in it.
- 5 | Q. Did someone suggest that to you?
- 6 A. No, sir. That was --
- 7 | Q. No one has ever mentioned that to you?
- 8 A. No, sir.
- 9 MR. RUSHER: Your Honor, counsel interrupted 10 her.
- THE COURT: Let her finish her answer.
- 12 | Q. And you could tell it was round?
- A. You could tell it was round because -- dragging and sagging, like if you hold a sock up in the air and you can tell something round is in the bottom of it. You could see that something round was in it.
- 17 | Q. How long was the sock?
- 18 A. I don't know. It was a man's sock. A foot or so, I

  19 guess. It was just hanging.
- 20 | Q. Which hand did he have it in?
- 21 A. The right hand, I think. The right hand.
- 22 Q. Was he swinging it?
- 23 A. Well, it was moving back and forth. Yeah.
- 24 Q. And what color was it?
- 25 A. I don't remember. It was dark. I don't remember. It

- was dark. I don't remember if it was black or brown or dark blue.
- 3 | Q. Do you remember seeing a guitar?
- 4 A. No.
- 5 | Q. Do you remember seeing sunglasses?
- 6 A. I don't remember. No. No, he didn't have glasses on.
- 7 | Q. No glasses on?
- 8 A. Neither one of them did, no.
- 9 Q. What about a cap?
- 10 | A. I really don't remember.
- Q. Well, you say it was warm that day and you were in a short-sleeve shirt, correct?
- 13 A. Uh-huh.
- Q. Well, do you remember either one of them being in a long coat?
- 16 A. I think that Bobby had on like a military jacket, like 17 greenish-brown color, but I'm not really positive.
- Q. Like what they call a field coat, is that what you're talking about?
- 20 A. I guess that's what you call it, like a military coat.
- Q. Did you see anyone that had blonde hair that day in a leather jacket?
- 23 A. Do you mean with them that day?
- Q. No, in that area around that same time.
- MR. WILSON: Well, I object to that, Your

1 Honor, relevance.

THE COURT: Overruled.

- 3 A. No, I don't.
- 4 | Q. Do you know Henry or Henrick Ossowski?
- 5 A. I never heard the name.
- 6 Q. What about Greg Richardson?
- 7 A. I don't know that name either.
- 8 | Q. Did you see Rhonda Carson that day?
- 9 A. No.
- 10 | Q. Was anyone else behind them walking along that day?
- 11 A. No. There was no one else on that street.
- 12 | Q. Was Coy carrying anything?
- 13 A. I don't remember. I know he had his cane.
- 14 | Q. You saw him with a cane?
- 15 A. He always had his cane.
- 16 Q. Well, did you see him that day with his cane?
- 17 A. Yeah, he always had his cane.
- 18 | Q. Could you describe it.
- 19 | A. His cane?
- 20 | Q. Yes.
- 21 A. I don't remember if it was actually a cane or not.
- Sometimes he had a cane and sometimes he had an old
- 23 stick.
- 24 Q. How was Coy dressed?
- 25 A. I don't remember. I think his bib overalls. I really

- don't remember.
- 2 | Q. You think they were bib overalls?
- 3 A. I think. I don't remember.
- Q. And you watched him walk all the way up the street, correct?
- A. I watched them go all the way up the street, but as far
  as if they went into Mr. Hartley's house, I don't know.
  I couldn't see that far. I mean, I can't see his door
  from where I live.
- Q. Well, my question was, you watched them go all the way up the street?
- 12 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And approximately how far is it from the front of your trailer -- you were in the front of your trailer, correct?
- 16 A. Uh-huh, and I was in the road.
- 17 | Q. In the front of your trailer?
- 18 | A. Yes.
- Q. And how far is it from the front of your trailer to where you saw them disappear up by Coy's trailer?
- 21 A. I don't know. It's quite a way.
- Q. How long do you think it took them to walk that?
- 23 A. Just a minute. A minute, maybe two minutes.
- Q. And no one else was walking on that street at the time?
- 25 A. No, sir.

And you don't recall seeing a guitar? 1 Q. A. No. 3 Q. Have you ever been in Coy's trailer? 4 A. Not until after he died, no. Did you ever tell the police officer that you thought 5 Q. . 6 Coy was drunk that day? 7 Yeah, because he was staggering. A. 8 Q. Did he say anything? 9 A. No. 10 When he walked by you, did he say anything? 11 A. No. I don't remember. I don't think so, no. 12 Was Coy wearing a beard then? 13 A. I don't think so. 14 Q. He was clean-shaven at that time? 15 A. I think. 16 Do you recall if he had a hat on or not? 17 A. No, he didn't have a hat on. He hardly ever wore a 18 hat. 19 Ms. Nelson, is it at all possible that these events 20 occurred on Tuesday, December 6? 21 MR. WILSON: Object to what's at all 22 possible.

23 A. No, I --

24

25

THE COURT: Overruled.

A. The way I remember this day is because I didn't work

- that day. I never work on Thursday, period. That's how
  I remember that day. If it had been on Tuesday, I would
  have probably just then got home from work or been
  getting off from work around this time. I always take
  Thursday off.
  - Q. Ms. Nelson, did you receive any money or any promise of money for your testimony or information in this case?
  - A. No, sir, I did not. I was never offered anything. They never even asked me to talk with them.
- Q. Did you ever discuss a Crime Stoppers reward with anyone?
- 12 A. I've never been badgered or harassed by any of them.

  13 I've never been forced to do or say anything, no.
- Q. My question is, did you ever discuss with them anything about a Crime Stoppers reward at all?
- 16 A. No, sir, I have not.

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- 17 Q. Did you discuss it with anyone?
- 18 | A. No, sir, I have not.
- Q. The day you saw this happen in front of your trailer, did you hear Kenneth say anything?
  - A. No. He was laughing at whatever Mr. Bragg was saying.

    It was like they were whispering or talking quiet

    amongst each other. Whatever he was saying, Kenneth was
    laughing about it. But I don't know what they were
    saying.

- Q. When you finally did talk to Officers Harrison and Shook, where was that at?
  - A. Me and Jeffrey decided that we would call them and talk to them. We didn't know what we was saying would help.

    I mean, we didn't know. So they come and got us, because we don't have a car, and they took us to the police department.
- 8 Q. And what day was that?

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- 9 A. I don't remember if it was the next day or a couple days
  10 after.
- 11 | Q. Well, they showed you a newspaper at that time, correct?
- 12 A. After they talked to us.
- 13 Q. After they talked to you?
- 14 A. (Witness nods head)
- Q. Well, when you say after, was it the same day or did they come back at a later time?
- 17 A. No, it was the same day, but after we give them our statement and after we talked to them.
- 19 Q. So that must have been sometime on or after Monday,
  20 correct?
  - A. I guess it was like the next week. Like I say, it was the next day or a couple days after. That was Thursday, so I know we didn't talk to anyone on the weekend.
  - Q. And how long were you in the police station that evening?

- 1 A. I remember a couple hours.
- Q. And it took you a couple hours to tell them what you're telling us here?
- 4 A. Well, they kept asking us, you know, to make sure.
- Q. So they kept on asking you. How many times did you go over this?
- A. I know we give them our statement and they'd ask me if
  that was the truth what I told them, and they'd ask me
  again and who that I had seen and about what time it
  was, more or less the same what you're doing now.
- 11 Q. Well, you haven't been here for more than two hours.
- 12 A. Not yet.
- 13 Q. How old are your younger children?
- 14 A. They're three, four, six, and ten.
- Q. And except for the ten-year-old, the rest of them all go to day-care?
- 17 A. No. Amber goes to kindergarten. None of them are in
  18 day-care now. I been on medical leave of absence since
  19 July, so none of them are in day-care now.
- Q. But on December 8 of '94, you had two of them in day-care?
- 22 A. Three.
- 23 Q. You had three in day-care?
- 24 A. Uh-huh.

Q. And you sent them to day-care on days when you did not

1 work?

- A. I have been sick for about a year and a half. On days

  when I had doctors' appointments, I would send them -
  like I'd take them like about 12:00 and go back and get

  them. So no, they didn't spend all day at the

  day-care. And when I got off early, I'd go get them

  when I got off.
- 8 Q. So did you have a doctor's appointment that day?
- 9 A. I have a doctor's appointment every Thursday.
- Q. Every Thursday. What time was your doctor's appointment?
- A. That day? It was at 3:45. My appointments are usually always between 3:00 and 3:30 to 4:00.
- 14 | Q. What doctor do you go to?
- 15 A. Dr. Taylor. I see Dr. Taylor every Thursday.
- 16 Q. And you went to him at 3:45?
- A. I'm pretty sure, yeah. My appointments are always between 3:00, 3:30, and 4:00.
- 19 Q. How did you get there?
- 20 A. Walk.
- Q. All right. And how long were you at Dr. Taylor's office?
- A. Maybe thirty, forty minutes. Not long. Thirty
  minutes. I usually just go on and get like my wrist
  checked and my height and weight and blood pressure. I

Α.

I guess 12:00.

- 1 | Q. But you're not sure?
- A. I don't even remember.
- 3 Q. You don't remember?
- 4 A. You have me confused. I'm sorry.
- 5 | Q. All right. Do you remember how you got there?
- A. I ride the bus to the day-care almost every morning or afternoon. Whenever I take them, I ride the bus.
- 8 Q. Well, did you do so on December 8?
- 9 A. To get them to the day-care?
- 10 Q. Yes.
- 11 A. Yeah, I rode the bus.
- 12 | Q. And then you took the bus home?
- 13 A. No. I'd have to wait another hour. I walked home.
- 14 Q. You walked home?
- 15 A. Yeah. It takes like maybe ten minutes to walk from the day-care to where I live.
- 17 Q. Where is your day-care?
- A. It's on Winklers Meadow right next to the mall -- well, right before the mall.
- Q. That's that little road in the curve there the other side of Brendle's?
- 22 A. No. It's on up around the corner just a little ways.
- Q. Do you have to go past Brendle's to get to it?
- A. Uh-huh, and I usually walk behind Brendle's through the field, because it's quicker. It's about a ten-minute

1 walk.

- Q. Just a few more minutes, Ms. Nelson. You say you have seen Mr. Bragg before?
- 4 A. Just wandering around the neighborhood, yeah.
- Q. And that's all you have seen him, just around the neighborhood?
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 Q. You never had a conversation with him?
- 9 A. I've never spoken to him, never talked to him, nothing, no.
- 11 Q. Do you ever recall seeing him carrying a guitar?
- 12 A. I don't remember.
- 13 | Q. Do you ever recall seeing him wearing sunglasses?
- 14 A. I don't remember.
- Q. Are you absolutely sure it was him that you saw on these other occasions around the trailer park?
- 17 A. I remember him because he had bushy hair.
- 18 | Q. And that's the only reason?
- 19 A. Yeah. He was scary-looking. He looked evil.
- 20 | Q. And that's the only thing that you recall?
- A. Of how I know him? Yeah. I mean, I just know people -
  a lot of people I know just because I know the name or

  say hey or someone said that is someone. No, I didn't

  know him.
- MR. GABLE: Thank you, Ms. Nelson.

## **Jeffrey Nelson**

Jeffrey Nelson was called to testify about his recollection of events that occurred on Thursday, December 8, 1994. His entire testimony is included below.

1 MR. WILSON: Thank you, ma'am. You may step down. 3 (Witness excused) 4 MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, could the attorneys 5 approach? 6 THE COURT: Yes, sir. 7 (Counsel approached the bench and conferred 8 with the Court.) 9 THE COURT: Okay, Mr. Wilson. 10 The witness, JEFFREY NELSON, being first duly 11 sworn, was examined and testified as follows: 12 DIRECT EXAMINATION (by Mr. Wilson): 13 Now, Jeffrey, I may need to -- okay, don't talk right 14 into it. It will make your voice sound funny. 15 Tell us your name. 16 A. Jeff Nelson. 17 Jeff, where do you live? 18 A. Greenway. How long have you lived there in Greenway? 19 20 Since I was two. 21 Q. Two? How old are you now, Jeff? 22 A. Ten. 23 And do you go to school, Jeff? 24 A. Yes. 25 Where do you go to school?

- 1 A. Hardin Park.
- 2 | Q. Okay. What grade are you in, Jeff?
- 3 A. Fifth.
- 4 | Q. Now, how long have you been at Hardin Park School?
- 5 A. Since I was in kindergarten.
- Q. Since you were in kindergarten you have gone the whole time there?
- 8 A. Yeah.
- 9 Q. Jeff, I want you to think back to about a year or so ago. Do you remember Coy Hartley?
- 11 A. Yes, I do.
- 12 | Q. Did you know Coy Hartley?
- 13 | A. Yes.
- 14 Q. How did you know Coy Hartley?
- 15 A. He lived in my neighborhood.
- 16 Q. Okay. Did you ever talk to him or see him?
- 17 | A. Yes.
- Q. What occasion did you have to talk with him, get to know him?
- A. He usually gave us like baseball gloves and stuff. He was -- he used to aggravate us sometimes when we
- 22 wouldn't mind.
- Q. Now, when you say us, who are you talking about?
- 24 A. Me and my friend.
- 25 Q. Okay. The kids in the neighborhood?

- 1 A. Yeah.
- 2 | Q. Did you like Coy?
- 3 A. Yeah.
- 4 Q. Now, you live -- where did you say you lived?
- 5 A. In Greenway.
- Q. Were you living there -- do you remember the day that
  Coy Hartley was killed?
- 8 A. December 8.
- 9 Q. Okay. Were you living there in Greenway then?
- 10 A. Yes.
- Q. Who was living there -- who lived in your home there in Greenway?
- 13 A. Me, my mom, and my two sisters and my brother.
- 14 Q. Jeffrey, I want to show you some pictures. Do those
  15 three pictures look like your -- I want you to look at
  16 those three pictures. Does that look like your street
  17 where you live there in Greenway?
- 18 | A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Do you remember what Coy Hartley's house looked like?
- 21 A. Yes. It --
- 22 Q. Okay. Tell us what it looked like.
- 23 A. It was at the top of the road and it was like greyish.
- Q. Okay. Was it a house or a mobile home?
- 25 A. It was a mobile home.

- Q. I'll show you another picture that's marked as State's
  Exhibit 1. Does that look like where Coy lived?
- 3 A. Yes.
- 4 | Q. Okay.

- MR. WILSON: And the three pictures, for the record, that I showed him before, Your Honor, were State's Exhibits 6, 7, and 8.
  - Q. Jeffrey, on the day that Coy Hartley was killed, did you go to school on that day?
- 10 A. Yes, I did.
- 11 Q. What time did you get home from school?
- 12 A. About 3:15.
- 13 Q. Is that what time you normally get home?
- 14 A. Yeah.
- 15 | Q. How did you get home from school?
- 16 A. The bus.
- Q. Okay. When you got home from school, what did you do,
- 18 Jeff?
- 19 A. I did my homework.
- Q. Who was at your house when you got home?
- 21 A. My mom.
- Q. Okay. Where was your brother and your sister?
- 23 A. At day-care.
- Q. Okay. Did they normally go to day-care?
- 25 | A. Yeah.

- 1 Q. Was your mom working then?
- 2 A. No. She was working, but she was home.
- Q. Okay. Why was she home on that day?
- A. Because she gets off and then she goes to day-care to
- 5 get my brother and sister.
- 6 | Q. Okay.
- 7 A. And my other sister.
- 8 Q. Your other sister?
- 9 A. Yeah.
- Q. Now, Jeffrey, what time did you -- how long did it take
- you to do your homework after you got home?
- 12 A. I'm not for sure.
- Q. Okay. Well, did it take you five minutes or thirty
- 14 minutes?
- 15 A. No. Well, estimating, about thirty.
- 16 Q. About thirty? Okay. What did you do after you did your
- 17 homework?
- 18 A. I went out.
- 19 Q. You went out?
- 20 A. Outside.
- 21 | Q. What did you do outside?
- 22 A. I played soccer.
- 23 | Q. Who did you play with?
- 24 A. With my friends.
- Q. Now, where were you when you played soccer?

- 1 A. In my yard.
- 2 | Q. How long did you play soccer?
- 3 A. I'm not for sure.
- 4 | Q. Jeffrey, at the time did you know Kenneth Eugene Coffey?
- 5 A. Yes, I did.
- 6 Q. How did you know Kenneth Coffey?
- 7 | A. He used to go to Rhonda's house.
- Q. Okay. Did you know somebody that lived at Rhonda's house?
- 10 A. Yeah, TJ.

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- 11 Q. Okay. Did you used to play with him?
- 12 A. He used to be my friend at that time, but not no more.
- Q. Did you know the defendant here at the end of the -- or next to the -- the person next to the end of the table there, Robert Charles Bragg? Did you know him?
  - A. He used to go to -- he used to live -- my dad lives in

    Tennessee and my uncle's mom lives there and he used to

    go there and his name was Robert Greg Bragg or something

    like that and my uncle's arrested him before.
- 20 Q. Okay. What name did you know the defendant Robert Bragg 21 by?
- 22 A. Bobby Bragg.
- Q. Bobby? Had you heard people call him something in the neighborhood?
- 25 A. I'm not for sure.

1 Q. Okay. Have you ever heard the name Big Bob? 2 MR. HEDRICK: Objection. 3 MR. GABLE: Leading, Your Honor. 4 THE COURT: Sustained. 5 Now, Jeffrey, after you played in the yard for a while, 6 did you see Bobby Bragg and Kenneth Coffey? . 7 A. Yeah. 8 Q. Where did you see them? 9 A. Going up the road. 10 Q. Okay. Did you see anybody else there? 11 A. Yeah. 12 Q. Who else did you see? 13 A. Coy. 14 Q. Where was Coy? 15 Going up the road. 16 Now, who was in front, Bobby --17 YA. Coy, Coy. 18 Okay. Where on the road on your street was Coy when you 19 saw him? 20 I'm not for sure. A. 21 Q. Okay. How far behind him was the defendant and 22 Kenneth? Half the street, a third of the street, how 23 would you describe it? 24 I don't really know.

Okay. What were they doing -- what were Kenneth Coffey

- and Bobby Bragg doing when you saw them?
- 2 A. Walking up the road.
- 3 Q. Okay. Could you hear them say anything?
- 4 A. No.
- 5 Q. Could you see them doing anything?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 | Q. What did you do when you saw them going up the road?
- 8 A. I rode my bike up the road.
- 9 Q. Okay. Where was your mom?
- 10 A. She was going to get my -- she was in the house, but she
- was going to get my brother and sister.
- 12 | Q. All right. Did you tell her?
- 13 | A. She came outside.
- 14 Q. What made her come outside?
- 15 A. I went in the house.
- 16 | Q. .. Okay. What did you say to your mom?
- 17 | A. I told her to come outside.
- 18 | Q. Why did you want your mom to come outside?
- 19 A. To look.
- 20 Q. To look at what?
- 21 A. Him (Indicating). Bobby and Kenneth.
- 22 | Q. Why did you want her to look at Bobby and Kenneth?
- 23 A. Because I was confused.
- 24 Q. Because why?
- 25 A. I was confused.

- 1 | Q. You were confused? What were you confused about?
- 2 A. That they might do something to Coy.
- 3 | Q. Well, did she come outside?
- 4 A. Yes, she did.
- Q. When your mom came outside, what did you do?
- 6 A. I rode my bike up the road.
- 7 Q. As you rode your bike up the road, Jeffrey, what did you
- 8 see?
- 9 A. Them go in the house.
- 10 | Q. Saw who go in the house?
- 11 A. Bobby and Kenneth.
- 12 | Q. What house did you see them go in?
- 13 A. Coy's.
- 14 Q. Did you see where Coy went?
- 15 | A. In the house.
- 16 Q. After you saw that, how long after Coy went in was it
- that Bobby and -- the defendant and Kenneth Coffey went
- 18 in?
- 19 A. I'm not -- right after.
- 20 Q. Right after? Were all three of them together?
- 21 A. No.
- 22 Q. Were Bobby and Kenneth together?
- 23 A. Yes.
- 24 Q. Now, you need to answer --
- 25 A# Yes.

- 1 Q. Okay. Who was with -- if anyone, who was with Coy?
- 2 A. Nobody.
- Q. After you saw them go in, Jeffrey, what did you do?
- 4 A. I went back down the road.
- Q. When, Jeffrey, did you find out that Coy Hartley was dead?
- 7 A. When the ambulance went up the road and I went up there
  8 and Jay went to take him some food and he told us
  9 that --
- MR. HEDRICK: Objection to what somebody said.
- Q. Yeah, don't tell us, but -- when you went up there,
- someone -- that's when you became aware of it?
- 13 A. Yeah.
- 14 Q. Did you talk to the police about what you saw?
- 15 | A. Yes.
- 16 Q. When did you do that?
- 17 A. I talked with Mark Shook and the one behind you right there (Indicating).
- 19 Q. You're pointing and saying Mark Shook?
- 20 A. Yeah.
- Q. Are you talking about this person here in the blue coat?
- 22 A. Yeah.
- Q. And the one to my left in the striped coat?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 Q. When did you talk to them, Jeffrey?

- 1 | A. I'm not for sure.
- Q. Okay. Was it the same day that you saw Bobby and
  Kenneth go up the road or was it a later date?
- 4 A. I think it was a later day.
- 5 | Q. Did they come to see you or did you go to see them?
- 6 A. They come to my house. They come to my house.
- 7 | Q. Did they take you somewhere?
- 8 A. Yeah. They took me up to the police station or up -9 the police station, I think.
- Q. How did they know to come to your house and talk with you, Jeffrey, do you know?
- 12 A. (Witness shakes head)
- Q. Had you and your mom had some conversation about talking to the police?
- 15 A. Oh, yes.
- 16 | Q. What conversation did you and your mom have?
- 17 A. To -- we went up there. We was -- he was talking to us
  18 and asking us questions.
- 19 Q. Okay. But had you and your mom talked about whether or 20 not you should talk to the police?
- 21 A. I don't know.
- 22 Q. You don't remember?
- 23 | A. No.
- Q. All right. Now, you say you followed -- you saw the ambulance go up to Coy's house and you walked up there?

- 1 A. No, I was going up that way and Jay said that he --
- Q. Okay, don't tell what someone said. But you just started up there?
- 4 A. Yeah.
- Q. Was that the same day that you saw Bobby Bragg and Kenneth Coffey?
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 | Q. Is that the same day that Coy was killed?
- 9 A. Killed, yeah.
- 10 Q. How long was it after you saw Bobby and -- Bobby Bragg
  11 and Kenneth Coffey follow Coy up the road was it before
  12 you saw the ambulance go up there?
- 13 A. Can you repeat that?
- Q. From the time that you saw Bobby Bragg and Kenneth

  Coffey follow Coy up to his house, how long was it after

  that when you saw the ambulance going up to Coy's house?
- 17 A. It was like 6:00 or 6:30 when -- I don't know.
- 18 Q. At 6:00 or 6:30 that what?
- 19 A. At 6:00.
- 20 Q. That you saw what?
- 21 A. The ambulance. I think 6:00.

- 23 A. Yeah.
- Q. Do you know about what time it was that you saw Bobby and Kenneth follow Coy up to his house?

1 A. I'm not sure. MR. WILSON: All right. That's all. 3 MR. HEDRICK: Your Honor, may we proceed? 4 THE COURT: Yes, sir. 5 MR. HEDRICK: Thank you. 6 CROSS-EXAMINATION (by Mr. Hedrick): 7 Jeffrey, if that thing is in your eyes, you can pull it Q. 8 down lower, then it won't be in your eyes. Is that 9 better? 10 (Witness nods head) 11 Okay. Do you remember what day of the week the 8th of 12 December in 1994 was? 13 A. No. No, sir. 14 But it was a school day, wasn't it? 15 A. Yes. 16 And you're ten years old right now? ·Q. 17 A. Yes. 18 And when's your birthday? Q. 19 A. July 22. 20 So do you know how old you were on December 8 of '94? 21 I was nine. A. 22 Nine years old then? Q. 23 A. Yes. 24 And you went to school on that day? Q. 25 When -- the 8th? A.

- 1 Q. December 8.
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 | Q. And that was Hardin Park School?
- 4 A. Yes.
- 5 | Q. And you rode the bus back home?
- 6 A. Yes.
- 7 Q. And where does the bus let you out?
- 8 | A. It lets me off the end of the street of Winter Drive.
- 9 | Q. Are there some mailboxes down there?
- 10 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. And that day did you get off the bus there at the mailboxes?
- 13 A. Yes.
- Q. When you got off the bus at the mailbox, did you go straight home or did you go somewhere on your way home first?
- 17 A. Straight home.
- Q. Okay. How far down the road is it you have to go before you get to your house?
- 20 A. Two trailers up. Two trailers up.
- Q. Okay. When you're going down the road, is your trailer on the left or the right?
- 23 A. The right.
- Q. And if you look down at the end of the road down there, is Coy's on the left?

- 1 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. And do you know how far that is from where your trailer is down to Coy's?
- 4 A. No, sir.
- Q. Can you say, is it farther than the back of the courtroom?
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. A lot farther than that?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. Okay. And when you got home that day off the bus, do
  11 other kids get off there with you?
- 12 | A. Yeah.
- 13 Q. And do you remember who was with you that day?
- 14 A. There's a lot of kids that gets off the bus. I mean --
- Q. Do you remember anybody special for sure who was with you that day?
- 17 A. Eddie and Nick and Brittany, this girl, and Josh.
- 18 | Q. How old is Eddie?
- 19 A. Eddie?
- 20 Q. Yes, sir.
- 21 A. I think he's thirteen.
- 22 Q. Now?
- 23 A. Yeah.
- 24 Q. And how about Nick?
- 25 A. He's eleven.

- 1 | Q. And Brittany, how old is she?
- 2 A. I think she's nine.
- 3 Q. And Josh, how old is Josh?
- 4 A. He's eight.
- Q. And did they go with you when you left the bus up your road towards your place or did they go different ways?
- 7 A. They go to their trailers. They go up that way, but they go to the other side.
- 9 Q. Do they go down your road, Winter Drive?
- 10 A. When they go to the bus?
- 12 down Winter Drive with you?
- 13 | A. Yeah, they went up that way.
- Q. And besides the school kids that were there off the bus, did you see anybody else out there then?
- 16 A. I don't think so.
- Q. You don't remember seeing anybody else? And you went straight on to your house?
- 19 A. Yeah, to my house.
- 20 Q. And when you got there, who was at your house?
- 21 A. My mom.
- 22 Q. And you have some brothers and sisters there, too?
- 23 A. Yeah.
- 24 Q. Were they there then?
- 25 A. No, they was at day-care.

- 1 | Q. And is that over at Winklers Meadow?
- 2 A. Yeah.
- 3 Q. And what was your mom doing when you got home?
- 4 A. She was getting ready to go get my brother and my two sisters.
- 6 | Q. When you say getting ready, how was she getting ready?
- 7 A. She was going to go find somebody to take her to go get
- 8 my brother and sisters.
- 9 Q. Do you know who she was going to get to take her?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Do you know who she did get to take her?
- 12 A. No.
- 13 | Q. What time was it when you got home?
- 14 A. About 3:15.
- 15 Q. Okay. What time do you get off the bus?
- 16 | A. At 3:15.
- Q. Okay. So you went straight home. It didn't take you just a second to get to the house?
- 19 A. Yeah. I live two trailers from there.
- 20 Q. When you got home, what did you do?
- 21 A. I went and did my homework.
- 22 | Q. Did your homework?
- 23 A. Yeah.
- 24 | Q. Do you know how long that took?
- 25 A. About thirty minutes.

- Did you do that in your room or at your house? 1 Q.
- 2 Yeah, I did it at my house. A.
- 3 Took about thirty minutes? Q.
- 4 A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. Was your mom there while you did your homework?
- 6 A. Yeah.
- 7 Okay. Do you know, had your mom been at work that day? Q.
- 8 A. She -- yeah.
- 9 Q. Where did she work that day?
- 10 A. I'm not for sure.
- 11 Q. What --
- 12 I think she worked at Burger King, but I'm not for A. 13 sure.
- 14 Well, how come you know she went to work that day? Q.
- 15 Because she was at work and she comes home and she gets 16 ready, finds somebody to go get my brothers and 17 sister -- brother and sisters from day-care and then she 18

- Q. Does she wear any special clothes when she goes to Burger King?
- 12 A. She wears blue pants, a blue shirt, and a little name tag, her name tag.
- Q. Can you remember if she was wearing that that day when you got home?
- 16 A. No, because she takes her -- she takes her stuff off and
  17 she puts more clothes on and she goes --
- 18 Q. And do you remember what you were wearing that day?
- 19 A. Me? No, sir.
  - Q. When you got home from school, did you change clothes?
- 21 A. I'm not for sure if I changed or just went outside after
  22 I did my homework. I'm not for sure.

- 24 A. Yeah.

- 10 | Q. Did you stay there in your yard playing soccer?

- 3 | Q. Did you see your mom come out?
- 4 A. Yeah. No, I went in the house and got my mom.
- 5 | Q. Okay. Why did you go in and get her?
- 6 A. Because I seen Bobby and Kenneth go up the road.
- Q. Okay. When you went in there to get her, did you know where Coy was then?
- 9 A. He was going up the road.
- 10 | Q. Did you see him?
- 11 A. Yes, I did.
- 12 | Q. Where was he when you first saw him?
- 13 A. Going up the road.
- 14 Q. When you say up the road, do you mean in --
- 15 A. Up to his house.
- 16 Q. Towards his house?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 | Q. Was he coming from down towards the mailboxes?
- 19 A. I'm not for sure.
- Q. Was he at your house or already past it?
- A. He was going up the road. I'm not for sure if he passed it or he was right near or what.
- Q. Were you playing soccer when he went by?
- 24 A. I think so.
- 25 | Q. Do you know what time it was?

- 1 A. When I was playing soccer?
- 2 Q. When you saw Coy.
- 3 A. No.
- 4 Q. Well, was it daylight?
- 5. A. Yeah.
- 6 Q. And it was after you finished your homework?
- 7 A. Yeah.
- Q. And had your mom gone to get your brother and sister at day-care yet?
- 10 A. No.
- Q. What time does your mom go to get your brother and sister at day-care?
- A. I'm not for sure, because she has to be there before 5:30.
- 15 Q. Does she -- how much before 5:30 did she go that day?
- A. She usually leaves about 4:30 or something. She goes all different times. I don't know.
- 18 Q. You don't remember on that day when she went?
- 19 A. No.
- Q. But she hadn't gone yet when you saw Coy?
- 21 A. No.
- Q. And when you saw Coy, can you remember if he was past your trailer or coming to it or at it?
- 24 A. I don't know.
- 25 | Q. Did you talk to him?

- 1 A. No.
- 2 Q. Did he say anything?
- 3 A. No.
- Q. You said that he aggravated you sometimes. Did he aggravate you that day?
- 6 A. No.
- Q. What do you mean when you say he aggravates you sometimes?
- A. Like he played around with us. He like -- he tries to like say -- tried to like be mean, but he's not, you know, like tried to aggravate us, like say stuff and he don't mean it.
- Q. Okay. But he didn't do any -- say anything to you that day at all?
- 15 | A. No, sir.
- 16 Q. And did you see Coy's face that day?
- 17 | A. Yes.
- 18 Q. Was that before you went in the house to get your mom?
- 19 A. Yes -- no. No -- yes, yes.
- 20 Q. Okay. So you saw him from the front?
- 21 A. Uh-huh.
- 22 Q. Is that right?
- 23 A. Uh-huh.
- Q. How close were you to Coy when you saw him?
- 25 A. I don't know exactly.

- 1 | Q. You don't remember?
- 2 A. No.
- Q. Do you remember what the weather was like that day?
- 4 A. I think it was sunny. Sunny.
- Q. Do you know if it was hot or cold or warm or cool?
- 6 A. It was warm.
- 7 Q. Warm?
- 8 A. Warm, yeah.
- 9 Q. You don't remember what you were wearing that day?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Do you remember what Coy was wearing when you saw him?
- 12 | A. No, sir.
- 13 | Q. Do you remember if he had a coat?
- 14 A. No, sir.
- 15 | Q. Do you remember if he had a hat?
- 16 | A. I think he had a hat on.
- 17 | Q. What kind of hat did he have on?
- 18 A. I don't know.
- 19 Q. Did he have anything in his hands?
- 20 A. I think he had his cane.
- 21 | Q. You think he had his cane?
- 22 A. Yeah.
- 23 Q. What's his cane look like?
- 24 A. I'm not for sure now.
- 25 | Q. Okay. Did he have anything else in his hands except his

- 1 cane?
- 2 A. I don't know.
- Q. Okay. When you saw Coy there at first, did you see anybody else besides you and your friend?
- 5 A. Not at first, no.
- Q. Okay. Before you went in and got your mom, did you see anybody else?
- 8 A. I think so.
- 9 Q. What do you think?
- 10 A. I think I saw Bobby and Kenneth.
- 11 Q. You think you did?
- 12 A. Yeah, I think so.
- 13 | Q. Are you not sure?
- 14 | A. I'm pretty sure, yes.
- Q. Okay. And you didn't see them at first, though, did you?
- 17 A. No.
- 18 Q. How long was it till you saw them?
- 19 A. Like right when I saw them? Do you mean like when I saw them?
- Q. Yeah. How long -- you said that you didn't -- you saw
  Coy but you didn't see Kenneth and Bobby at first?
- 23 A. Not at first.
- 24 Q. But you saw them later?
- 25 A. Yeah.

- 1 | Q. How much longer was it?
- 2 A. No, it wasn't -- it was -- they were going up the road 3 but they were right there when he was right there.
- 4 Q. Okay. Where was Coy when you saw Kenneth and Bobby?
- 5 A. He was going up the road.
- 6 Q. Whereabouts was he according to your trailer? Was he next to your trailer or up towards his or what?
- 8 A. He was going up the road.
- 9 Q. Well, had he gone past you already?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 | Q. Was he close to his trailer?
- 12 A. No.
- 13 | Q. Was he close to your trailer?
- 14 | A. No.
- 15 Q. How close was Kenneth and Bobby to Coy?
- 16 A. I'm not for sure.
- 17 Q. Well, you say they were behind him?
- 18 A. Yeah.
- 19 Q. Was everybody walking?
- 20 A. Yeah.
- 21 Q. Coy walking?
- 22 A. Yeah.
- 23 Q. Kenneth and Bobby walking?
- 24 | A. Yeah.
- 25 | Q. Was anybody running?

- 1 A. No.
- Q. Were they walking slow or fast, could you tell?
- 3 A. I don't know.
- 4 Q. You don't know?
- 5 A. No.
- 6 Q. And did Coy say anything?
- 7 A. No.
- 8 Q. Did anybody say anything?
- 9 A. I'm not for sure. Coy didn't. I don't know if Bobby or
- 10 Kenneth did.
- 11 Q. Did you hear them making any noises?
- 12 A. No, I don't think so.
- 13 | Q. And so why did you go in and get your mom?
- 14- A. Because I was concerned.
- 15 Q. You were concerned? What made you concerned?
- 16 A. About Coy.
- 17 Q. You were concerned about Coy?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 | Q. Why?
- 20 A. I thought something might happen to him.
- 21 | Q. What made you think that?
- 22 A. Because they went up the road behind him and I was
- 23 scared.
- 24 Q. Had you ever seen Bobby before?
- 25 A. Yeah.

- Q. Where did you see him before?
- A. He -- in Shady Valley, because I go there with my uncle and his little -- his son, he goes to see his mom and --
- 4 | Q. Had you ever seen him in Boone or Greenway before?
- 5 A. Yeah, yeah.

- 6 | Q. How long had it been since you saw him?
- 7 A. I'm not for sure.
- 8 | Q. Had you ever seen him with Kenneth before?
- 9 A. I'm not for sure.
- 10 Q. Did you know Kenneth?
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. Did you have any -- what did you call Kenneth?
- 13 A. Kenneth.
- 14 | Q. That was his name to you?
- 15 A. Yeah.
- 16 Q. And had you ever seen Kenneth and Bobby and Coy together
  - 17 before?
  - 18 A. No, I don't think so.
  - Q. You say that the only thing you remember Coy having was
- 20 a stick?
- 21 A. Yeah, his cane.
- 22 | Q. Or a cane?
- 23 A. His cane.
- 24 | Q. Okay. And did anybody else have anything that you saw?
- 25 A. I don't know. I'm not for sure.

- Q. You don't remember? Did you tell him -- are you hot in your coat?
- 3 A. Yeah.
- ♣ Q. Do you want to take it off?
- 5 A. Yeah.
- 6 Q. Okay.
- 7 A. (Witness removed coat)
- 8 Q. Now, you can't say what it is that made you concerned?
- 9 A. No. Oh. I was scared.
- 10 | Q. But what made you scared?
- 11 A. That something might happen to Coy.
- 12 | Q. Okay. But had anybody done anything?
- 13 A. No.
- 14 | Q. Or said anything?
- 15 A. No.
- 16 Q. And nobody had anything except for Coy having his cane?
- 17 A. Yeah, I guess so. I didn't see anything else. I
- 18 mean -- you know.
- Q. And so what did you do when you -- did you go in and see
- 20 your mom?
- 21 A. Yeah.
- 22 | Q. Did you talk to her?
- 23 | A. Yeah.
- 24 | Q. Did you yell in the house for her or did you go in
- 25 there?

- 1 A. I went in there.
- 2 Q. Okay. What did you tell her?
- 3 A. To come outside.
- 4 Q. Did you tell her why?
- 5 A. Yeah.
- 6 Q. And what did you tell her about why?
- 7 A. To come outside and watch them go up the road.
- 8 Q. Did she do that?
- 9 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. What did you do when she came outside? Did you
- 11 | come back out, too?
- 12 A. Yeah, I came with her.
- 13 | Q. Where did she go?
- 14 A. She came outside, too, in the road.
- 15 | Q. Well, she walked out to the road?

- Q. Can you say if it was as far as the back of the courtroom here between him and where his trailer was?
- . 5 A. Yeah, probably.
- 6 | Q. Or was it closer or further?
- 7 A. I think it was closer.
- Q. He was -- well, can you say according to something in the courtroom how close Coy got to his trailer when you saw him?
- 11 A. About to that door right there down that way.
- 12 | Q. The side door that has the fire sign over there?
- 13 A. Yeah.
- 14 Q. And then did you still see Bobby and Kenneth?
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. And where were they then? Were they still behind Coy?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. And did Coy -- could you tell if he still had his stick?
- 19 | A. Yes.
- 20 Q. You could see up there?
- 21 A. Yeah.
- Q. And did you see -- were Bobby and Kenneth still together?
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. And where were they? How far behind Coy were they?

- 1 A. I'm not for sure. They were behind him.
- 2 | Q. Well, were they as close as you and me?
- 3 A. I'm not for sure.
- 4 Q. You don't know?
- 5 A. No.
- 6 Q. Okay. So what did you do when you saw them up there
  7 with your mom?
- 8 A. I rode my bike up the road.
- 9 Q. When you say up the road, did you go up to where they were?
- 11 A. Yes.
- Q. And did you see -- what did you do when you rode up there?
- 14 A. I rode up there and then I came back down the road.
- 15 Q. Hmm?
- 16 A. I rode up the road and came back down.
- 17 Q. Okay. But when you got up there, did you see Coy again?
- 18 A. He went in the house, in his house.
- 19 Q. Did you see him go in?
- 20 A. He went in his house.
- Q. Okay. Did you talk to some people about your mom getting some money to talk to the police and come to court?
- 24 | A. What?
- 25 | Q. Do you remember talking to some people about your mom

getting some money to come to court? 1 2 A. Money? 3 Q. Uh-huh. A. No, sir. You know a man named or a boy named Shawn Delp? Q. 6 A. Yes. 7 Do you remember talking to him about coming to court? Q. 8 A. No. 9 You don't remember that? Do you remember talking Q. sometime when he heard you talking about coming to 10 11 court? 12 A. No. You don't remember that? Did you ever see -- have you 13 14 ever seen Bobby's picture before? 15 A. No. 16 Q. Never have? 17 ·A. No. 18 Did you ever see a newspaper with Bobby in it? Q. 19 A. No. 20 How about -- did you one time go to the police Q. 21 department? 22 A. Yes. Did you and your mom talk to Mr. Harrison and Mr. Shook 23 Q. 24 here at the police department?

Yes.

- 1 Q. And there at that meeting did they have a newspaper?
- 2 A. No.
- 3 Q. They didn't have a newspaper?
- 4 A. I don't think so.
- Q. Did you ever hear anybody around where you lived talking
- about the newspaper, about what happened to Coy in the
- 7 newspaper?
- 8 A. Yeah, I think I've heard people talking about it.
- 9 Q. Okay. And was that before you went down to the police department?
- 11 A. I don't know.
- 12 Q. You don't know?
- 13 A. No.
- 14 Q. How come you went to the police department?
- 15 A. I don't know.
- Q. Well, did you talk to your mom about going before you went?
- 18 A. She -- she -- we just went up there and he -- the

  19 police, Harrison and Mark, came and got us and took us

  20 up there.
- Q. And did you call them to come get you?
- 22 A. I'm not for sure if my mom did or not.
- Q. Did your mom tell you before you went that you were going to go?
- 25 A. Yeah.

- 1 Q. Did she tell you why?
- 2 A. Yeah.
- Q. What did she tell you about why you were going down
- 4 there?
- 5 A. Because of Coy, the murder.
- 6 Q. Because of Coy?
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 Q. How come you were going there because of Coy?
- 9 A. The murder.
- 10 Q. Well, were you supposed to go talk to somebody?
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 | Q. What were you supposed to go talk about?
- 13 A. I don't know.
- 14 | Q. You don't know?
- 15 A. No.
- 16 | Q. Do you remember going down there?
- 17 A. Yeah.
- 18 Q. And you talked to Mr. Shook and Mr. Harrison?

- 1 Q. Were you there when your mom was talking to them?
- 2 A. Yes.
- Q. Do you remember who talked to them first, if it was you
- 4 or her?
- 5 A. I'm not for sure.
- 6 Q. You don't remember?
- 7 A. (Witness shakes head)
- 8 Q. Did they ever write up anything for you to read?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 | Q. Who did that?
- 11 A. I think Mr. Harrison did, I think.
- 12 | Q. You think Mr. Harrison did?
- 13 | A. Yeah.
- 14 | Q. Did you read it?
- 15 A. Yeah.
- 16 Q. Did you sign anything?
- 17 | A. I'm not for sure.
- 18 Q. What you read, was that what was your statement?
- 19 A. Yes.
- 20 | Q. And you read it?
- 21 A. Yeah.
- 22 Q. And did you sign it?
- 23 A. I'm not for sure if I signed it or not, but I read it.
- Q. Okay. And did you ever see where Kenneth and Bobby went after Coy went in his trailer?

- 1 A. In the trailer.
- 2 Q. They went in the trailer?
- 3 A. Yes.
- 4 | Q. Where were you when they went in the trailer?
- 5 A. I came back down the road.
- 6 Q. Were you at your place?
- 7 A. I came back down the road.
- 8 Q. Well, but where -- were you on your bike when they went
- 9 in?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. Okay. Did you see them go in the door or just see them
- 12 go around?
- 13 A. No, they was there and then I left.
- 14 Q. They were where?
- 15 A. On the porch, and I left.
- 16 | Q. On the porch?
- 17 A. Yeah.
- 18 Q. Do you know Rhonda?
- 19 | A. Yeah.
- 20 | Q. Did you see Rhonda?
- 21 | A. No. I'm not for sure.
- 22 | Q. When they were on the porch, did you see Coy?
- 23 A. No.
- 24 Q. Was he already in there?
- 25 A. Yes.

You didn't see them go in the porch door? Q. 2 I rode my bike back down the road. A. When they were on the porch, what were they doing? 3 Q. Going into the door, going up into the door, and  $\mathbf{I}^{\ldots}$ 4 A. 5 left. 6 Q. And did they have anything with them then? 7 A. I'm not for sure. 8 Do you remember what Bobby was wearing? Q. A. No. Have you ever seen him wearing sunglasses? 10 Q. 11 I don't know. Α. Have you ever seen him with a guitar? 12 Q. 13 A. No. Do you know somebody named Greg? 14 15 A. Who? 16 Q. .. Greg. 17 A. No. 18 Do you know somebody that looks like Bobby named Greg? Q. 19 A. Bobby? 20 Somebody that looks like Bobby whose name is Greg? 21 A. No. Do you remember, Jeffrey -- can you remember what Bobby 22 23 was wearing that day?

MR. WILSON: Objection, asked and answered.

MR. RUSHER: Objection.

# **Defense Case**

## The Victim's Money

The defense called Tony Triplett, a friend of the Victim, who testified that two and a half weeks prior to his death, the Victim showed him \$2,400 that was under his bib overalls in his shirt pocket in a small billfold with a rubber band around it. Triplett counted the money, which was all in \$100 bills.<sup>84</sup> On cross examination, Triplett testified that the Victim kept a "billfold bank deposit thing" in the back pocket of his overalls.<sup>85</sup>

### James Brown

James Brown testified that on Tuesday, December 6, 1994 he went to the jail around 5:00 PM and got Bragg and Coffey out of jail. They went over to Sollecito's and drank a pitcher of beer. Brown further testified that he told Bragg that since they had been picking Bragg up for drinking, Bragg should get out of Boone and stay awhile. Bragg told him he was going to stay that night at the Victim's house and leave town on Wednesday. Brown did not see Bragg on Wednesday.

### **Alibi Witnesses**

### **Gary Edwards**

Gary Edwards testified that he saw Bragg at the Harris Teeter in Boone on Wednesday,

December 7, 1994 around 3:00 PM. He testified that he knew it was 3:00 PM on that day

because he would pick Darlene Laney up when she got off work at Harris Teeter at 3:00 PM. He

knew Laney was paid on Tuesdays and he knew it was the day after she got paid that week.

Bragg approached him and asked him for a ride to Mountain City, TN. Edwards testified that he

told Bragg he could give him a ride after he took Laney back to her apartment. After taking

Laney home, Edwards came back to Harris Teeter, arriving around 3:30 or 3:40 PM. Bragg was

still there. They put Bragg's guitar and guitar case inside the back of the camper shell and

proceeded to Mountain City, TN. Edwards further testified that he gave Bragg a ride to

Mountain City, TN because he was involved in the ministry and would help anyone in the

surrounding area when he could. Edwards took Highway 321 to Mountain City, TN and

dropped Bragg off at a small trailer on Wayland Street. <sup>87</sup>

Private Investigator Vaughn testified with respect to his interview of Edwards. The information he obtained from Edwards was consistent with Edwards' testimony.<sup>88</sup>

#### **Darlene Laney**

Darlene Laney testified that she saw Bragg on Wednesday, December 7, 1994. He came into Harris Teeter, where she worked, a little before 3:00 PM that day. He made a purchase

and asked Laney if she could give him a ride to Mountain City, TN. She testified that she told Bragg she did not have transportation, but that Gary Edwards was coming to pick her up, and that Bragg could ask Edwards if he would take him. She was present when Bragg asked Edwards for a ride. Bragg told Edwards he would wait there for him to return.<sup>89</sup>

### Jim Bragg

Jim Bragg testified that he was Bragg's brother and that he lived in Mountain City, TN.

He saw Bragg on Wednesday, December 7, 1994 between 9:00 and 10:00 PM. Bragg came to his home while he was watching TV. When asked if he was watching a Clint Eastwood movie,

Jim Bragg answered "probably so." They talked and then he sent Bragg to the basement to play his guitar and sleep. He saw Bragg again the next morning. He gave Bragg a ride to town a little before 6:00 AM. He did not see Bragg again after that. 91

Private Investigator Vaughn testified that Jim Bragg had cable TV with premium channels in Mountain City, TN. He further testified: "In my research of December 7, 1994, a portion of a microfilm copy of the Johnson City Press Chronicle lists at 10:10 p.m., on the night of December 7, a movie starring Clint Eastwood came on Showtime, a premium channel, in Mountain City."92

### **Judy Thomas**

Judy Thomas testified that she knew Bragg. She testified that she had a counseling meeting between 5:00 and 7:00 PM on Wednesday, December 7, 1994 in Mountain City, TN and that her counseling meetings are always on Wednesdays. She further testified that after the meeting, between 7:00 and 7:30 PM, she went to Joe and Deborah Smith's house where she was staying. As she was going in, Bragg and Jay Manuel were on the porch. She spoke to them and went into the house. Bragg and Manuel left. Manuel did not come home that night and she was told that he had been picked up for public drunkenness. 93

Thomas further testified that she saw Bragg again in the morning hours on Thursday,
December 8, 1994 at Manuel's trailer. She saw him later that evening at Manuel's trailer
around 5:00 or 6:00 PM. That evening, Thomas also walked with Bragg to a payphone at the
Boone Trail Dairy Bar so that he could call his sister for money. She observed Bragg call his
sister Terri collect and ask her to send him some money. She believed that this phone call was
between 5:30 and 6:00 PM. Afterwards they went back to Manuel's trailer and she fixed dinner
for Bragg. Thomas testified that she spent the night and slept in the same bed with Bragg on
Thursday night.

On cross examination, Thomas testified that she was confused when she spoke to law enforcement on the Saturday after the crime and clarified that she now recalled when she saw

Bragg during the week of the crime based on the meeting she went to on Wednesday,

December 7th.94

Private Investigator Vaughn testified regarding his interview of Thomas. Although Thomas' testimony with regard to the events surrounding Bragg being in Mountain City, TN was consistent with this interview, some of the times that she recalled those events occurring were not consistent with her testimony.<sup>95</sup>

#### Jackie Shoemake

Jackie Shoemake testified that she knew Bragg. She testified that on Wednesday,
December 7, 1994, she and her husband, John Shoemake, went over to Manuel's trailer around
7:30 PM. Bragg was there, but Manuel was not. Shoemake further testified that on Thursday,
December 8, 1994, she saw Bragg around 12:30 PM at Manuel's trailer. Both Manuel and
Thomas were there at that time. Shoemake was with Bragg most of the day. At approximately
5:00 PM, she left to get food. She then saw Bragg at the Game Room and walked back to
Manuel's trailer with him. She left her son with Bragg and Thomas at Manuel's. When she
returned, they were still there. She left around 8:00 PM that evening. On cross examination
Shoemake testified that she did not go to law enforcement about Bragg's alibi. 97

### John Shoemake

John Shoemake testified that he knew Bragg. He testified that on the evening of Wednesday, December 7, 1994, he went to Manuel's trailer. Manuel wasn't there, but Bragg was. He and Bragg partied together that night. Shoemake further testified that he saw Bragg on Thursday, December 8, 1994 at Manuel's trailer. Early that afternoon, he and Bragg went to his house and played guitar. They later went back to Manuel's trailer and drank beer, then went down the street to play poker around 5:30 PM at "some colored guys' house" after they got off of work. Bragg did not have any money, and Shoemake let him borrow money so that he could play poker that evening. Shoemake testified that he was with Bragg until after dark that evening and that he was out of Bragg's presence for only 45 minutes to an hour at a time on that day. On cross examination, Shoemake testified that he did not go to law enforcement about Bragg's alibi. 99

### James "Jay" Manuel

Jay Manuel testified that he knew Bragg. He testified that prior to being arrested on Wednesday, December 7, 1994 he was with Bragg for nine to ten hours. After being released from jail on Thursday, December 8, 1994, Manuel walked to his trailer. The doors were locked, so he walked three trailers down and found Bragg at the neighbor's house playing his guitar. Geraldine Thomas was also there with Bragg. That afternoon, he and Bragg got money together and got Edgar Osborne to give them a ride to the beer store. From the beer store they went straight back to Manuel's trailer. Manuel testified that he later went and played poker for

a couple of hours with "some black people," couldn't win, and went back home. He ate dinner at his trailer around 6:00 or 6:30 PM with Thomas and Bragg. 100

On cross examination, Manuel was confronted with multiple inconsistencies between what he told law enforcement and what he testified to on direct examination. Manuel admitted to being intoxicated during that time period and testified that although he could not remember dates, he knew when he saw Bragg and when he was with Bragg based on when he was arrested for public intoxication on Wednesday, December 7, 1994.<sup>101</sup>

Private Investigator Vaughn testified regarding his interview of Manuel. Although Manuel's testimony with regard to the events surrounding Bragg being in Mountain City, TN was consistent with this interview, some of the times that he recalled those events occurring were not consistent with his testimony. Manuel provided additional information to Vaughn to which Manuel did not testify. This information is also consistent with Bragg being with Manuel on Thursday, December 8, 1994.<sup>102</sup>

### **Phyllis Smith**

Phyllis Smith testified that she was the sister of Bragg. She further identified two phone bills that correspond to a phone owned by her and her husband. Smith testified that the first phone bill showed a phone call from Boone, NC on Wednesday, December 7, 1994 at 1:14 PM. Smith testified that she took the call and that it was Bragg. Bragg wanted to borrow some money from her so that he could leave Boone. Smith testified that the second phone bill

showed a phone call from Mountain City, TN on Thursday, December 8, 1994 at 6:45 PM. Smith testified that she took the call and that it was Bragg. Bragg wanted to let her know he was in Mountain City, TN.<sup>103</sup>

Private Investigator Vaughan testified that he confirmed that the number on the first phone bill corresponded with a pay phone at the west end Pantry on Highway 421 in Boone.

He further testified that he confirmed that the number on the second phone bill corresponded with a pay phone at the corner of the Boone Trail Dairy Bar in Mountain City, TN. 104

#### **Tom Horne**

Tom Horne testified that he worked for the Mountain City Pawn Exchange. He testified that Bragg pawned a Harmony guitar on November 8, 1994. The guitar was due to be picked up on Thursday, December 8, 1994, but no one picked it up. He further testified that sometime during the week that Bragg was arrested he came into the pawn shop and attempted to pawn a Stella guitar. The pawn shop did not take the guitar on pawn. The pawn shop is closed on Wednesdays and Sundays.<sup>105</sup>

#### **Belinda Reece**

Belinda Reece testified that she worked as a secretary at the Department of Human Services in Johnson County, TN.  $^{106}$  Reece testified that she saw Bragg in December of 1994 when he came into the office to ask for an application for TennCare (formerly Medicaid). She

could not recall the date, but testified that there was a weekend in between when she saw

Bragg and when she met with the detectives after Bragg's arrest. Reece further testified that
the week before she met with the detective, she worked every day except Thursday. She later
testified that she had told law enforcement when she originally met with them that she had
worked on that Thursday and that Bragg came in during the latter part of the week and
therefore it was either Thursday or Friday of that week. She testified that he came in during
the morning, not long after she got to work. She arrived at work at 8:00 AM. Reece testified
that Bragg asked for a couple of dollars and she gave him \$2.00.107

# Jewel Triplett and Violet Eller

Jewel Triplett testified that she worked as a secretary at the Mountain City First Baptist Church in December of 1994. Her hours were Monday through Thursday from 8:30 to 4:00 PM. The church would provide food vouchers, medication, and gas vouchers as charity to people in the community. Triplett testified that she was in charge of the issuance of the vouchers and that the custodian, Violet Eller, and the pastor were authorized to give them out and to sign her name. She testified that the handwriting on a gas voucher dated Friday, December 9, 1994 (State's Exhibit 45) was the custodian's. 108

Violet Eller testified that she worked as the custodian of the First Baptist Church,

Mountain City on Friday, December 9, 1994. She further testified that a man in a tan overcoat

came in between 8:30 and 9:30 AM on that day, while she was sweeping the sanctuary. She

could not identify Bragg as that man and testified that all she could remember was seeing a tan

overcoat. Eller testified that the man in the tan coat asked for money and that she filled out the gas voucher (State's Exhibit 45) and gave it to the man in the tan coat. 109

## Coffey and Bragg on Thursday, December 8, 1994

Linda Wilcox, Rene Nelson's mother, testified that she lived in the Greenway Trailer Park, that she was home all day on Thursday, December 8, 1994 and that she saw Coffey walking in the direction of the Victim's trailer before 3:00 PM that day, and that no one was with him. She further testified that she had seen Bragg in the trailer park one time and that was before Thanksgiving 1994.<sup>110</sup>

Betty Triplett testified that on Thursday, December 8, 1994 she was at the Greenway

Trailer Park visiting her daughter-in-law and grandbaby. She left her daughter-in-law's at 5:50

PM. As she walked home, she saw Coffey sitting on a bench at the A & P. She did not see anyone else while she was walking. 111

David Brown testified that he lived in the Greenway Trailer Park. On Thursday,

December 8, 1994, Brown did not see Bragg. He did not recall ever seeing Bragg before trial.

Brown further testified that he saw Coffey on that day and that he observed him going up and down the road four or five times throughout the day. Coffey did not have anyone with him when Brown saw him. The last time he saw him that day was around 5:00 PM or a little after. 112

Rhonda Carson testified that she got off work at about 1:00 PM on Thursday, December 8, 1994. After work she went to the Scottish Inn where she was living. She stayed there until around 4:00-4:30 PM when she walked to the A & P to wait on her new landlord. She stood in front of the store. Between 4:30 and 4:45 PM she saw Coffey walking from behind the A & P. He approached her and got in her face. He walked away and went toward the liquor store. Carson testified that she is not sure where Coffey went. Coffey was by himself. Shortly thereafter, her friends came by. She got in the car with them. As she was getting ready to get out of the car and use the pay phone to call her new landlord, she saw Coffey at the payphone. She remained in the car and observed him pick up the phone, dial a number, and hang up the phone. Carson testified that Coffey saw her in the car, but did not talk to her. Coffey then went around the back side of the building. No one was with Coffey. That was the last time that Carson saw Coffey that day. Carson did not know what time this occurred, but testified that her landlord picked her up just before dusk, about 5:00 PM or so. 113 Carson denied telling anyone that there was blood in the Victim's trailer. Carson testified that she first found out about the Victim's death after work on Friday, December 9, 1994.114 She further testified that the last time she saw Bragg was Tuesday, December 6, 1994. 115

## **Impeaching Rhonda Carson**

Coffey implicated Carson as an observer of the crime in his statements to law enforcement and his testimony. The defense called several co-workers of Carson's to impeach the portions of Carson's testimony in which she denied seeing blood in the Victim's home and first learning of the crime after work on Friday. Kathy Rayfield (Martin) testified that she worked with Carson. She further testified that at approximately 8:30 AM on the morning of Friday, December 9, 1994, Carson said "the person had gotten beat real badly and that there was blood splattered everywhere."

Beatrice Segall testified that she worked with Carson. She further testified that at approximately 8:30 AM on the morning of Friday, December 9, 1994, Carson told a group at work about an old man that had been hurt very badly and about how the blood flew everywhere. Carson did not tell her who the man was, but did tell her that she used to live with him when she had no other home.<sup>119</sup>

Laura Hicks testified that she worked with Carson. Regarding approximately 8:30 AM on the morning of Friday, December 9, 1994, Hicks testified:

Well, when she came in, she was all excited and said that -- told us that Mr. Hartley had been murdered...she said that she was afraid that she might be murdered, too, and she said there was blood splattered all over the place. And then she was saying that her boyfriend didn't have any money and then he had money after this took place. Then I

remember her saying – I can't get this straight, because it's – just get bits and pieces of it – that she could hear what was going on inside but she couldn't see. <sup>121</sup>

# **Coffey's Statements to Others**

Jim Earp testified that on the morning of Thursday, December 8, 1994 he gave Coffey a ride to town around 9:00 AM. During the ride, Coffey offered to sell his ex-girlfriend's ring to Earp for \$20. Initially Earp declined, but later agreed to buy the ring for \$10. Coffey called Earp the following morning and asked if Earp had that ring. Earp told Coffey that he had sold the ring. Coffey said, "I wish you hadn't done that; I wanted to get it back. I come into some money." 123

Jonathan Harmon testified that he was in the Watauga County Jail with Coffey during
August of 1995. Coffey told Harmon that he went into the trailer of a man named Cory or Coy,
that he knew the man had money, that he went to take the money, that when he did the man
tried to stop him, and that they wound up getting in a fight and Coffey hit the man. He further
testified that Coffey said that when he hit him, he got scared and didn't know what to do so he
got the money and left. Coffey told Harmon that he didn't mean to kill him. Coffey further said
that he went home, got scared, took a shower, and burned his clothes behind his house in
Sampson. Harmon testified that the next day, Harmon was talking to Duane Barksdale who had
overheard some of the conversation. Coffey overhead Harmon and Barksdale's conversation
and got mad. Coffey called Harmon a lying SOB. Coffey threatened Harmon and Harmon

reported this threat to the jailer. Harmon then gave a statement to Detective Harrison.

Harmon testified that he agreed to take a lie detector test, but was never given one. Harmon also testified that Detective Harrison asked him if Coffey mentioned anything about Bragg and that Harmon told Detective Harrison that Coffey didn't mention anything about Bragg. 124

### Trailer Hitch Ball

Gary Potter testified that between Thanksgiving and the early part of December 1994 someone attempted to sell him a trailer hitch ball at his place of employment, Ashe Lake Garage, in Boone, NC. He did not know who the person was and did not see the person in the courtroom. He did not identify Bragg as the individual.<sup>125</sup>

Dwight Moody testified that in early December 1994, Bragg came to his place of employment, Ashe Lake Garage. Bragg asked him if he would be interested in buying a trailer ball hitch for \$3. Moody did not purchase the item. Bragg said he wanted the money to buy himself something to eat. 126

### **Discrediting Rene Nelson**

The defense called several witnesses to impeach the character of Rene Nelson. Shawn Valdez testified that he had two children with Nelson and that she was a "conniving liar." On cross examination, Valdez admitted that at the time he wasn't seeing his children. 128 Valdez

was later recalled as a witness and testified that on the Saturday after the crime, he asked Rene Nelson if she knew anything about the crime. She stated that "she didn't know anything about it, that Jeffrey had seen two people walking up through the trailer park on Tuesday, and that the police had used him for questioning, had already drug him in for questioning – and this was on Saturday – or were going to be using him for questioning, one of the two." 129

Julie White testified that she lived in the Greenway Trailer Park and knew Rene Nelson and that Nelson was "a compulsive liar." On cross examination, White admitted that Rene Nelson had recently taken a warrant out against White for assault. 131

Teresa Delp testified that she knew Rene Nelson and that she "has a reputation for what I know for untruthfulness." 132

# **Discrediting Jeffrey Nelson**

The defense called Shawn Delp to testify regarding a conversation that he had with Jeffrey Nelson. Delp testified that approximately three months before Bragg's trial he spoke with Nelson. This conversation took place a couple of weeks prior to Coffey's trial. During this conversation, Nelson told Delp that he was getting a new bicycle. Delp testified that he asked Nelson how and that Nelson said his mother was getting money from the CrimeStoppers for putting Bragg and Coffey away. Nelson told Delp his mother was getting \$1000. Delp further testified that Nelson told him that he was testifying for his mom.<sup>133</sup>

Delp also testified that he was in jail with Coffey in November of 1995, prior to Coffey's trial. Delp testified that he overheard Coffey on the phone. He did not know to whom Coffey was talking.<sup>134</sup> Delp testified that Coffey told the person on the phone that "he knows that Bobby didn't do this and Bobby did not deserve what was going on and whatever he got, he deserved."<sup>135</sup> An objection was made by the prosecutor and it was sustained.

# Conclusion

At the conclusion of the trial, the jury convicted Bragg of First Degree Murder under the first degree felony murder rule. Bragg was given a sentence of Life Without Parole.



# X. Coffey Post-Conviction Recantation

On November 4, 1996, Coffey wrote a notarized letter in which he recanted his statements and testimony regarding his involvement in the crime and his knowledge of Bragg's involvement in the crime. The Honorable James L. Baker, Jr. treated the letter as a Motion for Appropriate Relief for Coffey. On December 11, 1996, Judge Baker denied Coffey's Motion. The letter and corresponding Order are included below.

May 4,1996 - My name is Kenneth Eugene Coffey and - wort to tell the Truth don't the marde of Coy Hartley Dec \$ 1994. And the reason's they I lied about me and Bobby Breag' volvement. My whole life The been is and out of mental hospital's 'e got plate's in my head and have took large amaint's of edicine for as long as I can remember. And the day the red come and Questioned me, they had me so sound to rath, I would have said my mother did it. Just so they ruld leave me alone. The Low Kept on threatening me telling I would go to death row are spend the rest of my Lat I done. I lied and said I son Boby Bragg Kill Cay. Feeld I had No other choose but to say what the Law roded to hear from Me, I didn't understand half of what ey where telling me. I was scard for my like so I lied. Then I testited against Bobby Braga in Court I lied, the and police told me it I didn't I would never get t of prison the rest of my Life. They framised me Ip If I would lie on Bobby Bragg, so, I did and sais had they wanted me to. Even though it was wrong I at Want to spend the rest of my lite in prison. The Truth of the students, me and Bobby Bragg war Lilled Cry, he was all the best of Friend's, I can

Comes now the undersigned Superior Court Judge, and enters this Order pursuant to a handwritten letter (attached hereto) purportedly written by and sent by the Defendant in this case to "Presiding Judge, Watauga County Courthouse."

This Court, having reviewed the correspondence, feels it proper to treat the letter as a Motion for Appropriate Relief, pursuant to Article 89 of North Carolina General Statute Chapters 15A, in that it contains allegations and a prayer for post-trial relief.

This Court finds, however, that the case is currently under appeal to the Appellate Division, and that the Defendant is represented by the Appellate Defender's office in that appeal.

Pursuant to N.C.G.S. 15A-1418, this Court finds it has no authority to hear or entertain a Motion for Appropriate Relief at this time, and therefore Defendant's Motion as presented requesting this Court "look into this case" is DENIED.

The Court further ORDERS that a copy of Defendant's letter and this Order by furnished by the Watauga County Clerk of Superior Court to the Defendant; to the Appellate Defender's office; to the District Attorney; and to the Attorney General's office.

# XI. Appeal

Bragg filed a direct appeal through his trial attorney, Jeffrey Hedrick. Notice of Appeal was filed on February 28, 1994.<sup>136</sup> The appeal was heard in the Court of Appeals on November 19, 1997. On February 17, 1998, the North Carolina Court of Appeals issued an opinion finding no error and upheld the conviction.<sup>137</sup>

Attorneys Phillip Griffin and Kristin Parks of North Carolina Prisoner Legal Services filed a Petition for Writ of Certiorari to the North Carolina Supreme Court on February 12, 1999. The North Carolina Supreme Court denied Certiorari on June 24, 1999. The North Carolina Supreme Court denied Certiorari on June 24, 1999.

# XII. Other Post-Conviction Efforts

Attorney Phillip Griffin of North Carolina Prisoner Legal Services, filed a Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus in the United States District Court, Western District of North Carolina on September 15, 1999. On December 24, 2000, the Court entered an Order granting the Respondent's Motion for Summary Judgment and dismissing Petitioner's Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus. 141

In September 2006, Attorney Kristin Parks referred the case to the North Carolina

Center on Actual Innocence (Center), a non-profit innocence organization. The Center assigned

the case to students in the UNC School of Law Wrongful Convictions class, as well as conducted a limited investigation.

# XIII. Referral to Commission

The Center referred the case to the North Carolina Innocence Inquiry Commission in 2010. The Commission received Bragg's questionnaire dated January 6, 2011. On March 25, 2011, Bragg's case was moved into formal inquiry and he signed a waiver of procedural safeguards and privileges with the assistance of his appointed attorney, Carteret County Public Defender, Jim Wallace. The Commission has conducted an investigation and DNA testing in this case. The entirety of the Commission's investigation will be presented in a hearing to the Commissioners on August 31-September 2, 2016.

# XIV. Conclusion

A hearing will be conducted before the North Carolina Innocence Inquiry Commission on August 31, September 1, and September 2, 2016. At that time, the Commission staff will present the evidence discovered during their investigation and other postconviction investigations. Multiple witnesses are expected to testify before the Commission.

The Commission is charged with considering "credible, verifiable evidence of innocence that has not been previously presented at trial or considered at a hearing granted through postconviction relief." <sup>142</sup> Each Commissioner shall determine whether "there is sufficient evidence of factual innocence to merit judicial review." <sup>143</sup>
