**OPINION** 

THIS MATTER came on for hearing before the North Carolina Innocence Inquiry

Commission (Commission) on June 4, 2019 through June 7, 2019, pursuant to N.C.G.S. §§ 15A
1460 – 1475. After careful review of the evidence presented, the Commission hereby makes and enters the following findings of fact:

- On December 17, 1983, Arthur Wilson was found unresponsive in the street on Claremont Avenue and was pronounced dead by emergency medical personnel.
- On November 18, 1986, Merritt Williams (Williams) was pled guilty to second degree murder related to the death of Arthur Wilson and received a life sentence.
- 3. On March 8, 2011, Williams applied to the Commission claiming innocence in this case and the Commission began an inquiry pursuant to Article 92, Chapter 15A, of the General Statutes.
- 4. Throughout the Commission's inquiry, Williams has fully cooperated with Commission staff in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 15A-1467(g).
- 5. On June 4, 2019 through June 7, 2019, the Commission held a full evidentiary hearing in this matter pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 15A-1468.
- 6. During the hearing, the Commission considered testimonial and documentary evidence. The evidence included, among other things:
  - a. A 1604 page brief provided to the Commission by the Commission's Director prior to the hearing;

Supplemental documentation, in the form of handouts, a PowerPoint presentation,
 and video recordings provided prior to and during the hearing;

c. Live testimony by Commission Associate Director Beth Tanner, Commission Grant Staff Attorney Catherine Matoian, Commission Staff Attorney Brian Ziegler, reconstruction expert Casson Reynolds, trace expert Dr. Max Houck, trace expert Lindsey Admire, pathology expert Dr. Jerri McLemore, confession and psychology expert Dr. Sharon Kelley, and claimant Merritt Williams; and

d. Affidavits from Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Public Information Officer Christina Howell, defense attorneys Charles Redden, and Dennis Speaks.

 After carefully considering this evidence, the Commission has concluded by a vote of 6-2 that there is not sufficient evidence of factual innocence to merit judicial review.

WHEREFORE, pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 15A-1468(c), the above-captioned case is now closed and a copy of this opinion is filed with the Forsyth County Clerk of Superior Court and delivered to the Claimant through his counsel, the Forsyth County District Attorney's Office, and the Honorable L. Todd Burke, Senior Resident Superior Court Judge for Judicial District 21.
